Ivy laid to eternal rest

Country sees her off in tears of rain

Thousands of mourners braved downpours to lay Ivy Rahman to eternal rest at Banani Cemetery last night, after a huge procession escorting the veteran Awami League leader's body wailed across the city from her namaaj-e-janaja to the

Family, kin, friends and colleagues of the late AL women's affairs secretary filled the front lawn of the Baitul Mukkarram National Mosque, crying and sobbing as her body arrived there for janaja.

"This rain is the nation's tears for her," said Ziaul Hassan, an AL activist and one of the multitude that spilled onto the surrounding avenues. They came to pay their last homage to the Ivy Apa, who succumbed early Tuesday to fatal injuries received in the Saturday's grenade attack on an AL rally on the

adjacent Bangabandhu Avenue. The chant of Kalima Shahadat mingled with the sound of rain and a low-pitched voice describing her life over a loudspeaker as a heavy police escort brought the slain leader's body to the national mosque before

Shops and businesses brought down their shutters in fear of riot as law enforcing agencies cordoned off the surrounding roads and kept vigil over the proceedings from building tops under grave security concerns. No public transport was allowed into the area after the end of the halfday hartal at 1:00pm.

Her co-freedom fighters, fellow partisans, women's rights activists, political leaders and a mammoth crowd of mourners placed wreaths at her coffin at Baitul Mukkarram. Others later flooded into the Banani

Thousands escorted Ivy's body

Hasina first

Amidst a new threat of assassination from an Islamist militant organisation, Leader of the Opposition Sheikh Hasina yesterday made the first public appearance since the Saturday's deadly grenade attack to pay her last tribute to veteran Awami eague leader Ivy Rahman at the deceased's residence.

AL leaders and personal staff of Hasina maintained utmost secrecy until the last moment about the visit. The AL president even avoided SEE PAGE 11 COL 1

Arrests, cop actions on pickets mark hartal

Police action on peaceful processions and widespread arrests of opposition activists yesterday marked the last day of a two-day nationwide hartal called by 13 opposition political parties protesting grenade attack on an Awami League (AL) rally in Dhaka.

Law-enforcers picked up about 250 opposition activists and injured at least 26 others during the largely seven-hour hartal that closed schools, businesses, stock exchanges, took most traffic off the road and stopped cargo handling at seaports, virtually crippling life.

The main opposition AL, 11 left parties and the Jatiya Samajtantrik Dal (Inu) reduced yesterday's hartal, originally planned for 12 hours, to seven hours to enable people attend the namaz-e-janaza and burial of

slain AL leader Ivy Rahman. But the Chittagong AL enforced the strike

Ivy died from her wounds at the Combined Military Hospital in Dhaka early Tuesday fighting for her life for three days after suffering grievous injuries in Saturday's enade attack on the AL rally on ngabandhu Avenue. Fearing mob attacks on trains

like on Tuesday, railway authorities did not run any train on busy Dhaka-Chittagong, Dhaka-Sylhet and nartal yesterday, officials said.

In Dhaka, police charged baton to disperse a procession of women AL leaders and activists on their way to Russell Square from Dhanmondi Road No. 32, injuring five activists.

Police also picked up Nazma Akhker, president of Juba League,

At 10.45am, AL lawmakers led by Chief Whip Abdus Shahid, KM Jahangir, Shahjahan Khan, Dr Abdur Razzak, Panchanon Biswas and Jahid Ahsan Russell brought out a procession from the Sangsad

Police blocked the procession at Russell Square where the lawmakers and party activists sat on the street and staged a rally.

Dhaka City AL at a press release claimed the leaders and activists of each ward brought out processions despite 'police clubbing and blanket

The unit held a Qurankhwani at the AL headquarters for Ivy and 18 others killed in the grenade attacks. The Communist Party of

AL president pays homage to Ivy

Leader of the Opposition Sheikh Hasina yesterday said the government refused to take international help to probe grenade attacks on an Awami Legue rally (AL) on Saturday as 'it would expose their real charac-

Hasina, also the president of main opposition Awami League, made the comment when she went to the house of Ivy Rahman, women's affairs secretary of her

party, to pay her last respect to her. Ivy died from her wounds at the Combined Military Hospital in Dhaka early Tuesday fighting for her life for three days after suffering grievous injuries in Saturday's

grenade attack on the AL rally on Bangabandhu Avenue.

With tears rolling down her cheeks, Hasina said Ivy was like one of her family as their girlhood relations consolidated year by year.

"Her killing by grenade, a battlefield weapon, was violence at its worst," she said. Holding the 'Khaleda-Nizami

administration responsible for the bloodbath' she alleged the government did not arrest anybody after the attacks that killed 19 people, Ahmadiyaas. including Ivy, and injured over 200
