

## Saifur sees AL rally attack blow to economy

US envoy for thorough probes into all blasts

Finance and Planning Minister M Saifur Rahman yesterday said Saturday's grenade attack on an Awami League (AL) rally has dealt a severe blow to the economy, which has been put on a solid footing over the last three years.

Saifur told reporters that the grisly attack has dented Bangladesh's image abroad at a time when foreign direct investment has started flowing in and the country just started recovering from the loss.

## 2 more upazilas to be formed

UNB, Dhaka

The government yesterday decided to create two more new upazilas in Moulvibazar and Comilla districts to strengthen local administration.

The 90th meeting of National Implementation Committee on Administrative Reorganisation (Nicar) took the decision to create the new upazilas named Juri and Monohorganj in Moulvibazar and Comilla districts.

Juri, the 471st upazila of the country, consists of four unions of Kulaura and four unions of Baralekha upazilas while Monohorganj, the 472nd upazila, consists of 11 unions of Laksam upazila.

The 470th upazila of the country named Titas was created in Comilla in the Nicar's 89th meeting held on February 22 this year.

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia, also the chairperson of Nicar, chaired the meeting at International Conference Centre (ICC). The meeting took a number of decisions.

## Ten N'ganj shops looted

Robbers looted cash and valuables worth about Tk 8 lakh from 10 shops of a Narayanganj co-operative market at Chasharay yesterday.

The robbers looted Tk 1.26 lakh in cash and valuables of Tk 6 lakh from the shops at 3:00am, the shopowners claimed.

A gang of eight armed robbers held three night guards of the market hostage at gunpoint and taking the keys of market gates they entered into it, the guards said.

"The shops sold readymade garments and sarees. Polo Fashion, Mohona Fashion, Modern Fashion, Lily Saree House, Shathi Fabrics are among the burgled ones," they said.

The robbers fled the scene by a pick up van after an hour of robbery, the guards added.

Police however picked up the guards identified as Shamsuddin, 60, Ismael, 55, and Habibullah, 44, for interrogation and the owners of the looted shops are also preparing to file a case.

# MPs plan to impeach Blair over Iraq war

Eleven members of the British parliament plan to invoke a parliamentary procedure last used more than 150 years ago to impeach Prime Minister Tony Blair over the war in Iraq, newspapers say.

Led by Adam Price of the Welsh nationalist Plaid Cymru party, the MPs allege that Blair was less than honest when he insisted that the US-led invasion of Iraq in March 2003 was needed to halt Saddam Hussein's pursuit of weapons of mass destruction. No hard evidence of such weapons have been uncovered since Saddam's regime collapsed.

Details of the MPs' impeachment

bid were to be announced at a press conference in London later Thursday.

With Blair's own Labour party enjoying a healthy majority in the Commons, the motion is unlikely to pass, but it would force the prime minister to submit to a fresh debate on why he joined the US-led offensive on Iraq.

One of the MPs behind the motion, Boris Johnson of the main opposition Conservative party, said it would "at least force Blair to come clean and say why he felt it was necessary to be so reckless with the truth".

"It is not so much that he lied; it is rather that he used all his lawyerly

## Move to coax trade bodies to rally round govt fails

A move of the Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FBCCI) to rally the business community behind the government in the current volatile political situation appears to have stumbled as it failed to persuade key business leaders to attend a meeting with the prime minister yesterday.

Sources said the BNP-leaning FBCCI leadership sought more time to lead a business team comprising chairs of the country's major trade bodies to a meeting with the PM apparently to strike a balance with the business leaders' visit to the opposition leader a day after the August-21 grenade attack.

FBCCI President Abdul Awal Minto and other directors yesterday met Prime Minister Khaleda Zia and discussed the country's current

# 74 killed in Kufa violence

## Sistani-Sadr talks begin, crowd breaks Najaf shrine siege

Talks have started between representatives of rebel cleric Moqtada Sadr and Iraq's Shia spiritual leader Grand Ayatollah Ali al-Sistani in Najaf, a spokesman for Sistani said yesterday.

"We have started contacts with Moqtada Sadr and in the coming hours we are waiting, hoping that we will succeed in saving the city from destruction," said Ahmed al-Khaffaf.

The format of the talks was not clear or whether Sistani and Sadr themselves had or were expected to meet face-to-face.

"Once again I'm calling upon people wanting to enter Najaf to stay where you are if possible," Khaffaf added.

"Demonstrators outside Najaf will only be admitted to the city after they have been searched," he finished.

Iraq's Shia spiritual leader Grand

Ayatollah Ali al-Sistani arrived in Najaf yesterday as a huge crowd forced their way into the city's holy shrine calling for peace in the city.

A 24-hour ceasefire began immediately upon his arrival on the orders of Prime Minister Iyad Allawi -- although the local governor said hostilities would resume if a solution to the standoff against Shia militia was not found by then.

# CID lacks explosion investigation ability

## Only 3 inspectors have little training; department has no sophisticated equipment

The Criminal Investigation Department (CID), the only agency in police department to deal with bomb blast incidents, has little capability to deal with post-blast situation and carry out investigation as it lacks trained manpower and sophisticated equipment for the job.

In case of need, only three CID inspectors who had a mere 15-day

training in US on post-blast situation are withdrawn from their regular duties and given the task to ascertain the nature of the explosives, bullets and splinters, CID sources said.

"When any such incident (bomb blast) takes place, we look at each other helplessly as we do not have the expertise and equipment to probe it," said a top CID officer seeking anonymity.

"We only have kits to take finger-

print and footprint and video camera to take snaps of the scene of occurrence to find out the nature of the explosives," he said.

When needed, the CID team takes assistance from the army and Department of Explosives to ascertain the nature of the explosives, bullets and splinters.

An official of Detective Branch of

## Bigots to capture Ahmadiyya mosque today

Civil society vows to resist, Babar promises safety

Dhaka is bracing for a probable confrontation, as religious fanatics march today to capture the Ahmadiyya headquarters in Bakshibazar and the civil society gathers there to resist the bigots.

Amnesty International, expressing concern about the safety of people in a press release posted on its website on August 24, said the Ahmadiyya religious community has been the target of a hate campaign by Islamist groups.

Different groups of anti-Ahmadiyya fanatics led by Aamra Dhakabashi, a city-based cultural organisation-turned-Islamist outfit, vowed to say Friday prayers in the Ahmadiyya mosque there and replace its signboard.

"We will say our prayers there

## AIR-POWERED MOTOR VEHICLE A REALITY NOW

An Australian inventor claims to have made the world's first commercially-viable motor vehicle powered by compressed air.

The vehicle is being tried out by contractors in Melbourne's parks and gardens over the next 12 months as an alternative to conventional diesel or petrol engines.

The engine's designer, Angelo Di Pietro from Melbourne company Engineair, said the engine produced no pollutants and had only two moving parts, increasing its efficiency over conventional designs.

Di Pietro said it used compressed air to drive a rotary engine, abandoning the pistons and cylinders seen in regular designs.

The vehicle being tested in Melbourne has reached 50 kilometres an hour (31 miles
