

Franchising to change bus service

Green Fuel Limited, an enterprise of Nitol Group has been selected for operating buses under a route franchise, the first of its kind in Dhaka, between Uttara and Azimpur.

Dhaka Transport Coordination Board (DTCB) officials said the Ministry for Communication had decided to lease out the 30-kilometre route between Uttara and Azimpur via Banani, Mohakhali, Bijoy Sarani, Khejur Bagan, Manik Mia Avenue, Kalabagan and Science Laboratory.

Sources in the DTCB informed that a tender was floated in December 2003 following which three companies submitted their bids. Considering their financial capabilities, business status and the proposal, Green Fuel Limited appeared as the most reasonable bidder. The two others -- Green Arrow Express Limited and Amicus Transport Limited -- lost out.

Under the existing system, a large number of buses belonging to different private owners run on the same

route and this fragmented ownership prevent them from investing in the sector, believe DTCB officials. At present around 5,800 buses owned by at least 1,000 private owners ply the city roads.

"They never want to invest for enhancement of the service as their business is not ensured," said one of the top officials of DTCB.

The official said the DTCB planned to introduce route franchise for private owners to ensure quality service for the commuters.

"When a single company is given franchise of a particular route, it knows that all passengers of the route would commute in its buses and therefore would feel secured from a business standpoint."

The franchise is also expected to end the ugly competition that exists between bus owners.

"Buses are always seen blocking the paths of one another while they trying to lure commuters to get on board. We think the franchise system would put an end to this practice," said the official.

DTCB sources said the route franchise would be introduced as a

pilot project and if it proves to be a success, the remaining 105 bus routes would be leased out to private owners too in phases. Number of buses on a route would be decided according to the requirement of the people.

Officials said that they picked the route from Uttara to Azimpur for test runs because no buses currently ply on that route.

According to DTCB sources, an operator has to have a minimum fleet of 50 buses with half of them air-conditioned to bid for franchise of a route in future. At least half of the routes will be leased out initially for seven years as the cost benefit ratio shows that at least six years were necessary to reach breakeven point. An agreement might be extended for a period not exceeding three years at a time depending on the performance of the bus company.

"Operators should be making profit from the seventh year," said one of the officials.

DTCB officials were also prompt

to quell fears of business monopoly.

"Operators will not be able to rip off the commuters as the agreement would prevent them from increasing fare for at least two years unless there is an unusual fuel price hike or unexpected devaluation of the local currency," said one of the officials.

The fare would differ according to the quality of service. The government has fixed a fare of 65 paisa per kilometre for average service. But Green Fuel Limited has proposed a flat rate of Tk 10 per passenger regardless of the distance they travel in non-AC buses.

Regarding the prospect of a large number of people involved with different private bus companies suddenly becoming unemployed because of the franchise, DTCB officials said they did not consider that a problem.

"The government can not introduce franchising on all the routes overnight. It is a long process," said an official who believed that workers of different bus companies will be easily absorbed in the new enterprises taking lease of routes as they would require more manpower.

Mohakhali flyover now ready to open on Nov 7

The first flyover at Mohakhali crossing, aiming to ease traffic congestion in the capital, will be opened for traffic on November 7.

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia will inaugurate the flyover, costing Tk 113 crore, now at the final stage of construction. It is financed jointly by the government and the World Bank.

The decision was taken at an inter-ministerial meeting yesterday at the communications ministry on the progress of different projects under the Annual Development Programme. Communications Minister Nazmul Huda presided over the meeting.

The meeting was informed that almost 95 percent of the construction of the one-kilometre Mohakhali flyover was complete until last month under the Dhaka Urban Transport Project.

Fixing a Shock Transmission Unit (STU) would be completed in October to save the flyover from earthquakes, the meeting was told.

First Metallurgical Construction Company of China is constructing the 17.9-metre wide and 1.12-km long bridge.

The flyover will have four lanes on each direction and is expected to ease traffic congestion at the busy Mohakhali intersection.

The meeting also decided to start the construction work of Kalurghat road-cum-rail bridge as well as the fourth Kamaphuli bridge at a cost of Tk 410 crore.

Construction of an alleviated expressway is expected to begin in the capital before 2006 with the financial and technical cooperation of the Thai government.

DU polls deferred in grenade attack fallout

The elections to the syndicate, academic council and finance committee of Dhaka University (DU) have been rescheduled from August 30 to September 5 because of the grenade attacks on the Awami League (AL) rally on August 21.

Because of the strike called by Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL) to protest the grenade attacks, the DU election commission could not send the list of candidates to the teachers on time, which is five days to the election date -- a procedure mandatory under the DU rule. Some 1,100 teachers are expected to cast their votes.

"We tried our best to send out the list. But most departments and institutes were closed because of the strike," said Syed Rashidul Hassan, DU treasurer and chief of the election commission.

The syndicate changed the elections date in a meeting on August 26.

The two-year tenure of the syndicate expired in April. Although the authorities attempted to hold the elections several times, teachers' internal politics prevented all attempts.

DU teachers will elect six members to the syndicate in the voting that will take place from 9:00am to

1:00pm at Teacher-Student Centre (TSC).

Two panels of teachers -- Blue backed by the Awami league (AL) and White backed by the Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP) -- are contesting the polls.

The white panel candidates are Prof Sadrul Amin, Dr Tajmeri Selima Akther Islam, Prof. Abul Khair, Dr Borhan Uddin Khan, Dr. Muhammad Rafiqul Islam and Mohammad Alamgir Hossain Shamrat.

Blue panel candidates are Prof. RIM Aminur Rashid, Prof. Nasrin Ahmed, Prof Kazi Shahidullah, Associate Professor Sadeka Halim, Assistant Professor Sikder Monwar Morshed and Dr Rahmat Ullah.

White Panel leader and Provost of Shahidullah Hall Prof. Abul Khair told The Daily Star that his panel would expand teachers' facilities and discipline the administration.

Blue Panel leader and Dean of Science Faculty Prof. RIM Aminur Rashid told The Daily Star that his panel's first target would be to bring back the glorious past of the university.

"We want to uphold the university rules and regulations and interest of teachers and students," Prof Rashid said, adding that his panel would provide more facilities to the teachers.
