SPEAKERS' HOUSES ON JS COMPLEX

SC stays order declaring constructions illegal

The Supreme Court yesterday stayed unopposed a High Court (HC) order that declared illegal the residences of the speaker and deputy speaker in the parliament complex, as lawyers opposing the construction were boycotting the court.

The stay order issued to the surprise of legal experts cleared way for the speaker and deputy speaker to move into the new buildings that many deemed as contrary to the original design of architect Louis I Kahn's 1973 masterpiece.

The stay order will remain in force until one week into court

starting tomorrow.

The Appellate Division led by Chief Justice Syed JR Mudassir Husain could not hear the lawyers of the opposition side, as the Bar boycotted his court to protest the appointment of 19 additional judges to the High Court on what they said were political grounds.

The advocate on record (AOR), who coordinates between the appellant and the respondent, was also absent in court, as he was elevated to a High Court judge, Barrister Tanjib

Lawyers boycott CJ's court

Leading lawyers yesterday refrained from attending the chief justice's court in accordance with the boycott decision taken by the Supreme Court Bar Association (SCBA).

Barely two cases were heard during the first session when about a score of cases scheduled for hearing could not be taken up as the lawyers for the petitioners or respondents did not appear.

About the appearance in the chief justice's court by the attorney general violating the SCBA decision, ts president Barrister Rokanuddin Mahmud said: "We will see whether the attorney general appeared in court under compulsion... We will not take action against him hastily."

The boycott decision was taken at the SCBA meeting on August 29, as the chief justice ignored the lawyers' demand for cancellation of the swearing-in of 19 additional judges appointed on what they said SEE PAGE 11 COL 4

Tk 225cr lost to graft in Jul-Dec 2003

Reports TIB; communications sector tops list

The government lost Tk 225 crore in just 253 out of a total 1,115 corruption incidents reported by newspa-pers in the last half of 2003, with the communications sector topping the graft-list, according to the Corruption Database Report of Transparency International Bangladesh (TIB) released yester-

day. The Berlin-based transparency

India offers probe help, US renews proposal

Morshed rules out UN, C'Wealth-run investigation

The US yesterday renewed its offer to assist Bangladesh in investigating the August 21 grenade attacks while India made a formal offer of assis-

In another development, Foreign Minister M Morshed Khan termed the Awami League (AL) demand for a UN- and Commonwealth-run probe 'unrealistic and impossible'.

US Ambassador in Dhaka Harry K Thomas renewed the offer during his meeting with Local Government, Rural Development and Cooperatives Minister Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan at the latter's Secretariat office yesterday

Mannan, also the secretary general of ruling Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP), told report-

ers after the meeting that they discussed, among other issues, the August 21 blasts. Thomas told him that the US government is always ready to aid Bangladesh in probing the grenade blasts.

Mannan informed the US ambassador that the Interpol has already begun investigation into the incident in parallel with the police and other intelligence agencies.

They won't return to normal life

Most victims of the August 21 grenade attack on an Awami League (AL) rally are unlikely to return to normal life as they will carry splinters in their sensitive organs, health experts said.

Many of the seriously injured are writhing in hospital beds in pain from blown off limbs, damaged kidneys and livers, lost eyesight and impaired hearing.

Most of them will survive as handicaps, the experts feared. A series of grenade explo-

sions at the rally near the main

ters on Bangabandhu Avenue in Dhaka killed 19 people, including AL Women's Affairs Secretary Ivy Rahman, and

injured over 200 others. The patients will not fully recover from the injuries if shrapnel remains lodged in their sensitive and vital organs, said NK Alam, consultant of the Casualty Department of Dhaka Medical College Hospital


Doctors fear multiple surgeries needed to remove the shrapnel from the patients' bodies

may deteriorate their condition and even threaten their lives.

"Splinters have already caused the damage. If we now try to take them out it will be more dangerous," said Dr Saiful Islam, emergency medical officer at Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University and Hospital (BSMMUH).

Brigadier General Nazmul Huda, director of the DMCH, also echoed the same view.

"It is not be possible to take out all the splinters from their bodies as any such attempt will SEE PAGE 11 COL 1
