

POLITICAL POLARISATION AFTER GRENADE ATTACKS

Discord, indecision hobble anti-govt agitation

A discord in the left alliance and indecision of the main opposition Awami League (AL) on agitation strategy are hobbling the efforts of the mainstream opposition parties to launch a broad-based anti-government movement.

The AL, 11-party left alliance, Jatiya Samajtantrik Dal (JSD) and the National Awami Party (NAP) have agreed to join forces to topple the Khaleda Zia government, but are divided over the objectives, next course of action and the modes of movement, leaders of the parties said.

They said some left parties were in favour of adding more agendas to the movement including fight against fundamentalists, some were against frequent use of hartal as a tool of movement and many demanded a blueprint detailing joint steps in the wake of the government's fall.

The AL, JSD and the Workers Party (WP), a constituent of the left alliance, are staging nine days of simultaneous programmes, but 10 other parties of the left coalition maintained a distance with them.

The AL, WP and JSD are determined to gear up the movement and bring other opposition parties to the antigovernment movement, while the left alliance and the Jatiya Oikya Mancha led by Dr Kamal Hossain are also trying to gear up a movement with the same objective on their own.

"We will keep up the movement from our position," AL General Secretary Abdul Jalil said. "The opposition parties might have difference of opinions, but our goal is the same: ouster of the fundamentalists-allied government through a mass movement."

The AL is trying to bring the second largest opposition in parliament, the Jatiya Party led by former president HM Ershad, to the

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BNP desperate to keep AL isolated from minor parties

The BNP policymakers are as busy as a bee to keep the minor political parties, specially the left-leaning ones, away from forging alliance with the main opposition Awami League, which has launched a movement to unseat the coalition regime.

Highly placed sources said the BNP high command is desperate to keep its arch-rival isolated and has assigned several top-ranking BNP leaders who have leftist political background to talk with the leaders of left-leaning parties and persuade them to keeping a neutral stance.

Instructed by the prime minister, they said, since the August 21 grenade attack on an AL rally, around half a dozen BNP top brass have sat down with some important left political leaders and succeeded to keep their parties from joining the AL-planned alliance.

"We have set some leaders within the left political arena, who brief the BNP high command on

every meeting they hold with the Awami League leadership. We are closely monitoring the main opposition's moves and trying our best to keep the leftist parties away from it," said an important leader of BNP.

Besides, all intelligence agencies have been directed to take measures that would hinder the AL from forming an effective alliance or launching a vigorous movement against the government.

BNP insiders said the ruling party leaders do not consider an alliance between the AL and the lesser political parties, who do not have any vote bank as such, ahead of a general election would cause any significant harm to the 4-party coalition. But, they said, the BNP does not want the lesser parties join forces with the AL in its out-government movement, which it believes might damage the government's image.

Sources said the BNP policymakers assigned to keep the AL isolated are in constant contact

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Russians weep, bury siege victims

Toll nears 400

Mothers with tears flowing down their faces and men trying hard to hide their emotions buried their children and relatives Sunday as the death toll from Russia's worst ever hostage crisis climbed towards 400.

Dozens of well-wishers laid red carnations and plastic bottles of water at the wreckage of School Number One, its charred remains a haunting memory to a three-day standoff that ended with some of the most violent scenes in modern Russian history.

The water bottles were a stark symbol of how the children were left without water or food by captors who were demanding independence for separatist Chechnya.

"Why? What for? What for?" wept one woman over one of two coffins set under a blue tarp in a courtyard in this town of 40,000, where seemingly everyone knew someone who was affected by the attacks.

Under overcast skies, the men

Uttara arrestee remanded for 10 days

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Cops clueless to 16 Sylhet blasts

Sixteen bomb blasts have ripped through Sylhet region since 1997 claiming 26 people, but most investigations found no leads.

Cases were filed after each incident and the Criminal Investigation Department (CID) or the Detective Branch of Police carried out investigations, but no mastermind was arrested.

Only one officer, Assistant Superintendent of Police Munshi Atiqur Rahman of CID, carried out investigations into five bomb explosions in the northeastern district since January.

A morning bomb blast in a suburban house in Pierebazar Kachubabhor killed 35-year-old Anwar Hossain, a day worker, and his 11-year-old nephew and

wounded seven others yesterday.

Sylhet City AL Publicity Secretary Mohammad Ibrahim was killed and 40 others injured in a grenade blast close to Gulshan Centre on the night of August 7.

A minor boy was killed and at least seven others were injured in the blasts in two cinema halls on August 5.

A grenade attack killed three people and injured 70 others, including British High Commissioner to Bangladesh Anwar Choudhury, at Hazrat Shahjalal Shrine after Friday prayers on May 21.

On the night of January 12 were killed five people and injured 50 others at the same shrine. The police

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Two homemade bombs found at Airport school

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Robber killed in shootout

One robber was killed and at least six including five cops were injured in an hour-long police-robbers shootout in Nishan Khali in Dakop upazila Saturday midnight.

Robbers Jahangir Alam Gazi, 42, was killed and Abdul Kader, 40, hurt. He is receiving treatment at Khulna Medical College Hospital under custody. Police arrested three robbers – Kader, Rafiqul Islam and Humayun Kabir – and recovered six foreign-made guns and 80 live bullets.

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SC stays bail to a lifer

The vacation bench of the Supreme Court yesterday stayed for five days the bail granted by the High Court to a person sentenced to life imprisonment for murdering a businessman in Dhaka.

Chamber judge also asked the Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University to set up a 4-member medical board for run a medical check-up on Abdur Razzak (Thandu) who was granted bail on health ground. The medical report should be placed before the court by September 10.

The order came upon a petition filed by Acting Attorney General Abdur Razzak Khan.

Signs of discord at Kashmir talks

Signs of discord have emerged between India and Pakistan as foreign ministers from the nuclear armed rivals meet to review and advance a peace process that has faltered recently over Kashmir.

Pakistan's Foreign Minister Khurshid Mehmood Kasuri and his Indian counterpart Natwar Singh shook hands and said they were committed to friendly relations before entering two days of talks. But tensions are already emerging.

India's Prime Minister Manmohan Singh complained on Saturday that Pakistan had failed to keep a promise to prevent Islamic militants sneaking into Indian Kashmir to join a revolt there, and to

scrap guerrilla training camps on its soil.

Pakistan fears that India, which controls the heart of Kashmir, is dragging its feet and is unwilling to engage in a serious dialogue over the region.

But Islamabad's attempt to force the pace and focus attention on Kashmir drew an angry response from India.

"A resolution of the Kashmir dispute alone will guarantee peace and security in South Asia," Kasuri said shortly before leaving Islamabad, adding that Kashmiris also had to be involved.
