## Dravid a team man

India are likely to continue swapping their wicketkeeper, with Rahul Dravid saying he is happy to take the role.

A run of six losses in eight games was halted when Dinesh Karthik was handed a debut behind the stumps as India beat England by 23 runs at Lord's.

Preparing to face Kenya on Saturday, Dravid said: "We will decide the day before the game our team and strategy.

"I'm used to doing both (keeping wicket and batting) so whatever the team requires I'm happy to do."

Dravid was on Tuesday named international player of the year at the ICC Awards ceremony, after hitting three Test double centuries in the last year.

He has kept wicket in 71 of his 240 one-day matches, but has struggled this year until he was relieved of the gloves and hit 51 in the last NatWest Challenge match.

# Abdullah, Eva sprint to glory

Abu Abdullah and Ishrat Jahan Eva extended their reign as the country's sprint monarchs when they grabbed the 200m men's and women's golds on the opening day of the Ninth Summer Athletics Championships yesterday.

Abdullah of Bangladesh Army, who won the national men's 200m sprint last April, clocked 21.60 seconds at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur.

He outran two BKSP athletes

Tanjil Akram and Imran Hossain Bhuiyan who finished with 22.20 and 22.30 secs respectively.

The 16-year-old Eva, who also owns the national 100-metre title, won her second 200m title with a time of 25.10. The BKSP track star was followed by BJMC's Khurshida Khatun who had to settle for silver in 26.70. Najmunnahar Laboni of Rajshahi took bronze in 28.40.

Now Abdullah and Eva will be hoping to complete a sprint double when they line-up for today's 100 metres trials in the afternoon.

The services teams dominated the men's events with Bangladesh Army making it a 1-2-3 in the marathon after Hemyaet Kazi took gold in

2:24.37s while Faruk Mia and Shesta Hossain bagged silver and bronze.

Bangladesh Navy's Manjur Morshed won the long-jump gold with a leap of 7.19m while Army's Liton Rahman won the hammer-throw with a hurl of 49.72m. The honours in the men's 800m run also went to Army with Anisur Rahman winning gold in 1:56.30.

However, BJMC topped the women's events bagging five golds. Hajera Akhtar Dolly won the shot-put and javelin golds, Sathi Parveen the high-jump while Sumita Rani Das clinched the 100m hurdles in

# Wright's spin theory

India coach John Wright is backing spinners Harbhajan Singh and Anil Kumble to have a major impact during the Champions Trophy in England.

India, co-holders of the trophy after 2002's washed-out final against Sri Lanka in Colombo, begin the defence of their title against Kenya at the Rose Bowl in Southampton on Saturday.

And while many sides, India included, will be expecting much from their pace attacks, the Asian giants know they can count on two of the best slow bowlers in the game today.

On Sunday, in the final match of India's warm-up series against

England at Lord's, off-spinner Harbhajan took a masterful three for 28 in 10 overs to end the hosts' hopes of a 3-0 clean sweep.

Meanwhile leg-spinner Kumble, whose ability to mix fast, flat deliveries with googlies makes him an

# India suffer Balaji blow

The Indian team suffered another setback as Laksmipathy Balaji was ruled out of the ICC Champions Trophy with an abdominal injury. He will return to India shortly. The team management has sought a replacement.

Balaji has been in good form of late, taking two for 37 against England in a warm-up game and three for 27 against Pakistan.

Balaji has become the second Indian to drop out, after Sachin Tendulkar's tennis elbow did not recover in time. Speaking to reporters at the indoor nets at the Rose

awkward opponent, kept things tight in a spell of 10 overs for 36 runs.

The Lord's pitch was labelled "sub-continental" by England captain Michael Vaughan and if the current hot, dry spell continues the India pair could be a huge threat.

Both men have fine one-day international records with Kumble taking 321 wickets at just over 30 runs each in 259 matches and Harbhajan 113 wickets in 88 matches at a touch above 28 apiece.

Harbhajan shot to fame in 2001 when, as a then 20-year-old and in the absence of the injured Kumble, now 33, he took an astonishing 32 wickets in the three home Tests against Australia.

His haul was a highlight in one of the all-time great cricket campaigns as India came from behind to win the series 2-1, a result that ended Australia's world record run of 16 consecutive Test wins.

## Rain ruins BD warm-up

Bangladesh's final warm-up match ahead of their Champions Trophy commitments against a Warwickshire XI was abandoned because of rain after just two overs of play at the Walmley CC Ground in Birmingham yesterday.

Bangladesh had reached 12 for one in the two overs bowled after deciding to bat first. Opener Mohammad Ashraful (3) was the man out.

The Tigers play their first Champions Trophy fixture against South Africa tomorrow (Sunday) at Edgbaston. Their second and last Pool B game is against the West Indies at the Rose Bowl in Hampshire on September 15 (Wednesday).

# USA bashed baseball-style

Nathan Astle's 145 not out steered New Zealand to a record 347 for four after the USA took two shock early wickets at The Oval here on Friday.

In the ICC Champions Trophy Pool A opener, New Zealand hit the highest score in the tournament's history, beating South Africa's 316 for five against Kenya in Colombo in 2002.

New Yorker Leon Romero caught Black Caps skipper Stephen Fleming for 15 then had Hamish Marshall caught off his fourth delivery to leave New Zealand shocked at 43 for two.

But after surviving a strong lbw appeal on 32, opener Astle swiftly restored Kiwi superiority with Scott Styris, the partnership hitting 163 off

166 balls before some very sloppy bowling saw 110 runs come off the last five overs and Craig McMillan reach 64 not out with seven sixes and two fours off 27 balls.

Before a spartan crowd, New Zealand were at full strength but the Americans had to do without right-arm quick Naseer Islam, out with a pulled groin muscle.

Tournament outsiders USA qualified for the Trophy via winning the ICC Six Nations Challenge in Dubai in February and March.

Following a 90-minute rain delay, USA captain Richard Staple's side took to the field after winning the toss.

On the third ball of the sixth over, Fleming cut 42-year-old right-arm medium-pacer Charles Reid past the slips for a boundary and drove him through mid-wicket for another four next ball.

But with the last delivery of the over, the left-hander miscued a shot to provide Romero with an easy

catch at point to leave New Zealand 25 for one.

Opener Astle soon found himself partnering Styris when Marshall went for 11, the right-hander carving a shot to third man.

Jignesh Desai, Romero's only fellow American-born player in the USA line-up, gave the vocal USA supporters plenty to cheer with his catch that left New Zealand 43 for two after 12.4 overs.

Astle was lucky to survive an lbw appeal following a delivery from 42-year-old Clayton Lambert, who made five Test and 11 one-day appearances for West Indies. Umpire Billy Doctrove gave not out but television replays showed the ball would have struck the stumps.

The USA fielded sluggishly, several times failing to prevent a four when stopping the ball at the boundary rope.

# No American standing

Sweden's Joachim Johansson left Andy Roddick shell-shocked after beating the

defending champion in five sets on Thursday to reach the US Open semifinals.

After Andre Agassi's hopes were ended by Roger Federer earlier in the day, Roddick was left to fly the American flag but he lost 6-4, 6-4, 3-6, 2-6, 6-4 in an explosive match featuring 64 aces.

It is the first time since 1986 that no American has reached the last four of the men's event here.

Second seed Roddick, who blazed through his four previous matches without losing a set, fell two sets behind as the 6-foot-6 Johansson let rip with lethal serves

and forehands.

Roddick, who cracked 34 aces to Johansson's 30, hit back to win the next two sets and with the fans going crazy he looked ready to pull

off a stunning rally.

But Johansson, 22, a former junior doubles partner of Roddick, showed remarkable calm in the storm, staving off break points in the first game and then at 4-4.

The Swede then went 40-0 up as Roddick served to stay in the championships and held his nerve to clinch victory on his third match point as the American hit a back-hand long.

The 28th seed, who goes out with Lleyton Hewitt's sister Jaslyn, now plays the Australian fourth seed for a place in the final after the 2001 champion thrashed Germany's Tommy Haas 6-2, 6-2, 6-2.

"You can't pick your brother but you can pick your boyfriend, so I hope she'll be supporting me," Johansson told reporters following the first five-setter of his career.
