

Panthapath businessmen take on extortionists

Localresidents and businesspeople of both sides of Panthapath Road have decided to take their own security measures to protect themselves from extortionists and criminals after reportedly becoming frustrated with lack of cooperation from the police.

The root cause of this desperate initiative is confusion regarding where to seek help as the north and south sides of that road fall under two different police stations. In emergencies, people get into difficulty figuring out which police station they should go to. Besides, the lawenforcers also allegedly try to shift the responsibility on the other station often. But a recent rise in criminal activities in the area called for immediate resistance and the community united in combating the terrorists.

Locals said that after top listed terrorist Pichhi Hannan was killed a couple of months ago, his brother-in-law, another hoodlum planned to take control of the entire locality which had been Hannan's crime domain. 
ties, many business people have left this area," said Faridul Islam Bahadur, president of the Panthapath Business Association.

"On August 21, some extortionists were caught by locals and one was beaten to death. We then formed our association to fight extortion.

'We now have regular meetings of the association in the first week of every month. All the owners of businesses are present at the meeting. We plan to install sirens with calling bells soon. A good number of guards have already been recruited to work in night shifts. We have been receiving death threats on telephone after taking the security measures and there has been some bomb attacks too. That is why we have been demanding the presence of a permanent police contingent in the locality," added Bahadur.

Toilet construction stalled as controversy sparks

The construction work of a public toilet in the English Road Shishu Park has come to a halt reportedly because of a bitter ongoing dispute between two local ward commissioners and the contractor.

The toilet is an initiative of the Dhaka City Corporation (DCC)'s Urban Primary Health Care Project (UPHCP).

Now, its contractor is alleging that the commissioners and their supporters had forcibly demolished the constructed portion of

23 "We have sent letters to the DCC Mayor and the minister for LGRD informing them about this problem a few days ago. We have requested them to suspend construction work until they reach a decision," added Suraiya.

On July 11 the Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakkha (Rajuk) filed a GD against the DCC with the Motijheel police station for stopping construction of another public toilet in a park on the east of the Shilpa Bank Bhaban under the same project.

The DCC also had to cancel the construction of a toilet at Shirajuddoullah Park in old Dhaka following complaints.

The Rajuk feels that the DCC is violating the Open Space Protection and Wet Land Protection Act 2000 by constructing such toilets in parks. It is also planning to take

back a number of parks from the DCC because of the City Corporation's apparent failure to maintain their true characteristics.

Most of the 47 parks under the DCC's control are owned by Rajuk which had handed them over to the DCC in the 1980's for better maintenance

the toilet while the commissioners of DCC's ward 22 and 23 are claiming that they had protested against the construction peacefully with the locals.

The ward commissioners and the contractor have filed separate general diaries (GDs) in this regard with the Kotwali Police Station.

The contractor Abdus Salam in his GD complained that the two commissioners have forced his labourers to stop the work and they also destroyed the constructed part of the project.

"I do not wish to comment on this matter. I have informed the DCC authorities about the situation. Let us see what they decide, said Salam when contacted.

The commissioners on their part said they were only lending support to a public outcry.

GD mentioned that Salam's workers had harassed them physically when they went to protest the construction. Kotwali police confirmed that

they had accepted the two GDs and said they were observing the situation

"I was present there when the incident happened so I am well aware of it," said Amir Hossain, sub-inspector of Kotwali police station. He declined to make further comments.

Meanwhile, officials were unsure about the future of the toilet, which is one of 70 due to be constructed across the city under the UPHCP. The Asian Development Bank is funding the project. "We received a letter from the

contractor and forwarded it to the concerned authority for revision,' said Nurul Islam project Director
