

'Micro-credit programme to be expanded to cut poverty'

Shop owner murdered

A shop owner was stabbed to death by his elder brother following a feud over property at Tejgaon in the city yesterday.

He was identified as Abul Hossain, 33, a resident of 250, Tejkunipara and an owner of a CD shop.

Abul entered into an altercation with his elder brother Akhtar Hossain who, out of anger, stabbed him with a knife at 9:00am, said their younger brother Mokhtar Hossain.

He was rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) where the doctors declared him dead after an hour.
