Rain-induced flood wrecks havoc

Dhaka collapses in heaviest rain in 50 years; 17 killed in four days; over 500 fishermen missing in Bay

Four days of record downpour petered out into a drizzle yesterday evening, but Bangladesh reeled from floods that killed at least 17 people, adjourned parliament, forced the closure of schools, offices and businesses and played havoc with transport.

Dumped with 341 mm of rain in 24 hours until yesterday morning in

years, Dhaka was still sloshing with floodwaters that sent many places, including Motijheel commercial heart, under chest-deep water.

Arjumand Habib, deputy director of the Meteorological Department, said the well marked low sat near Jessore at 8:00pm yesterday and was slowly moving towards India's West Bengal state.

India to focus on jt border operations

Home secys of two countries begin talks in Dhaka today

New Delhi yesterday demanded joint security operations with Dhaka to dismantle alleged anti-Indian insurgent camps in Bangladesh.

The demand comes ahead of the first talks in four years between the home secretaries of the two South Asian nations on subjects including illegal immigration by Bangladeshis' and New Delhi's assertions over the existence of rebel camps in the adjoining country.

Torkel asks govt, opposition to work together to solve crisis

STAFF CORRESPONDENT Bangladesh risks derailing from the democratic path unless both the government and the opposition parties work together to solve the present crisis, said US Deputy Assistant Secretary for South Asia Torkel L Patterson.

It is difficult to earn democracy but maintaining it is an even more difficult task, Patterson said. "Democracy is not free. Political parties should not take it for granted. It needs to be worked on. It needs sacrifice. If you are not careful you

leaderships of the two major political parties should sit together in the interest of democracy. As head of the government, the prime minister

should arrange it, he felt. "The prime minister is the prime minister of the whole country, she is prime minister of the government just as she is prime minister of the opposition also. She is responsible for all affairs of the country including arranging dialogue with the

Dhaka, Delhi hopeful of Teesta formula

Common river water sharing meet begins

As a two-day Bangladesh-India Joint Committee of Experts (JCE) meeting began in Dhaka yesterday, both sides expressed hope to reach a consensus on the water sharing of the Teesta and six other common

On the first day, the experts discussed the Joint Technical Committee (JTC) report on the proposed scientific study of Teesta

issues related to the study but they could not yet work out a water shar-

Bangladesh again sought for a bilateral treaty for a five-year interim period when a joint team would carry out the study on the Teesta, one of the 54 common rivers between India and Bangladesh. But India did not agree on the proposal.

"We are discussing item by item from the recommendations of JTC.

We have differences of perception but we are discussing how to move forward," Vinod K Duggal, the chief of the Indian delegation, told report-

ers after the meeting. Duggal, also water resources secretary of India, is hopeful about reaching an agreement on the last day of the talks today.

If the experts fail to reach consensus and fix the modality of Teesta water sharing in this 7th meeting of

Tribunal, Chittagong yesterday awarded death penalty to one and rigorous imprisonment (RI) for life to six others in the sensational Khagrachhari Hindu priest Madan Gopal Goswami murder case.

Srimat Swami Madan Gopal Goswami, founder of Radha Madan Gopal Sebasram (a temple-cumorphanage), was slain on the orphanage premises in Manikchhari upazila of Khagrachharion April 29, 2002. Judge M Hasan Imam of the

tribunal handed down the death penalty to Md Shafiqul Islam alias Shafi, 27. He hails from Gochhabil under Manikchhari upazila.

Bill seeking immunity for the multilateral organisation may be placed in parliament today

Amidst stiff opposition from the civil society, left politicians and human rights groups, a bill proposing unprecedented blanket immunity to the World Bank in its operations in Bangladesh is likely to be placed in

parliament today.

Once the bill is passed, it will put
the Bretoon Woods institution

beyond any legal action, a privilege that the organisation enjoys proba-bly in no other country of opera-

This move has already put the World Bank and the government before many questions including that of why the Bank opted for such immunity in Bangladesh alone instead of going for similar facilities

47 in Baghdad 12 others, GI die in Mosul attack

A car bomb exploded near a police station in Baghdad early yesterday as dozens of Iraqis were applying to join the force, killing at least 47 people and wounding 114, officials

In Baqouba, gunmen opened fire on a van carrying policemen home from work, killing 11 officers and a

Gunmen killed one US soldier

and wounded five others in the northern city of Mosul yesterday, the US military said

Their patrol came under small arms fire as it was travellling on the western side of Mosul, the military said in a statement.

The attacks were the latest attempts by insurgents to disrupt US-backed efforts to build a strong Iraqi police force capable of taking over security in many towns and cities ahead of nationwide elections slated for January In Baghdad, the blast left a gap-

ing 10-foot crater outside the station at the end of Haifa street, a main Baghdad thoroughfare that has been the scene recently of fierce clashes. Dozens of cars parked nearby were destroyed and shops and buildings were badly damaged.

Paramedics and residents picked up body parts scattered across the street and put them into boxes. SEE PAGE 11 COL 7

Tension mounted in Khulna city yesterday as Ahmadiyyas pulled down signboard from Nirala Ahmadiyya Mosque Complex triggering fierce demonstrations by the Islamic bigots.

International Khatme Nabuwat Movement Bangladesh (IKNMB), an anti-Ahmadiyya outfit, on August 13 posted the signboard to caution the Muslims not to be 'fooled' into taking the Ahmadiyya Mosque complex as a mosque and offering prayers there. It read 'Niralastha

IKNMB had long been cam paigning for the government move declaring the Ahmadiyyas non-

Police said members of Ahmadiyya Muslim Jamaat replaced the signboard at around midnight on Monday with their own sign-

The six organisations' demands also include resignation of the DU proctor and punishment of the Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) activists for 'attacking journalists and ransacking the office of the DU Teachers' Association (Duta) presi-

Police activities in the capital almost came to a standstill for the last two

days due to unbroken spell of gusty wind and cloudburst sweeping across Bangladesh.

The inclement weather compelled the police authorities to postpone the Traffic Week scheduled to start from to day. Policemen in different police sta-

tions of Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) area mostly remained confined to their offices as no vehicles could run

in the waterlogged city roads.

"We have slowed down a bit as our vehicles stopped in the waterlogged roads," DMP Commissioner Ashraful Huda told the Daily Star yesterday. Vehicles could not also come out of Rajarbagh Police Line when

surrounding areas were inundated by knee-deep water, sources said. No traffic police was found on duty in most of the city intersections yesterday. Rickshaws and pushcarts

were seen moving on the VIP roads. On Monday a team of Tejgaon Police Station had to return halfway from Tejkunipara where a CD-vendor was knifed to death by his
