## Transfer date unresolved

The Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) has given the Metropolis Football League Committee the responsibility to negotiate with the clubs to set a transfer date for the season 2004-05.

"The BFF wants to complete the process this year and if the clubs agree, we will stage it in October," BFF general secretary Anwarul Huq Helal told after Thursday night's executive committee meeting.

"Although we want it done early, the clubs must have their say. Their consent is very important to us. The league committee will sit with them this month to discuss the issues."

"It would have been fine if we could start the league soon after an early transfer but we will not get the ground (Bangabandhu National Stadium) before March. But we can't take the risk of waiting long because it would hamper the clubs' preparation and the spirit of the players," Helal said.

"So, we are looking forward to keep the clubs busy by launching the season in January. We want to hold the Federation Cup and another tournament in January. We still have the Kamapur Stadium for that. It will also give the clubs a good two months' preparation to go into the new season," he explained.

The BFF is also going to introduce a new transfer scheme. The footballers will get individual tokens at the end of each season and they will have to submit it to the club of their choice during the official transfer process.

Any kind of financial transaction must go through the federation, and both player and club will have to sign the agreement paper provided by the BFF. Without this paper, no club would be able to claim paying a player by showing other vouchers.

The BFF is introducing this system to avoid clashes of clubs over the possession of footballers.

Feuding among top clubs is not uncommon but the situation hit a low last season over the episode involving national number one goalkeeper Aminul which resulted in a police raid at the Abahani club tent after Muktiyoddha Sangsad filed a kidnap case.

The meeting was expected to take a decision about extending coach Shahidur Rahman Shantoo's contract. But it was not discussed as the manager's report on Bangladesh's participation in the AFC Youth (U-17) Championship in Japan was yet to reach the BFF.

Meanwhile, the qualifying rounds of the JFA Cup – the Under-16 national competition to be sponsored by Japan Football Association – will be held from October 1-8 at eight venues. The BFF has asked t

## Ranatunga's verdict

Sri Lanka's World Cup winning captain Arjuna Ranatunga, who is now an established politician, feels time is running out for Bangladesh to justify their inclusion in the elite league.

"You have to improve your performance to give the doubters a proper reply. But to do that, you will need the right team combination first. You must come out of this struggling phase fast because at the moment, the future does not look too good for Bangladesh," said Ranatunga who is here to commentate on television and also to act as an advisor to the Sri Lanka team.

There is a strong lobby forming in support of a two-tier system in Test cricket that will see away series for teams like Bangladesh and Zimbabwe getting reduced. But Ranatunga thought that Bangladesh still had the talent to work with if they can see off this pressure.

"I still feel that Bangladesh got the Test status too early but at the beginning, they performed very well. But everything is going radically in the wrong direction now. Your players are mentally not strong enough to compete at the highest level but talent-wise they are not far behind from other teams."

Ranatunga, who is now the deputy minister for Investment, Tourism and Promotion & Industry in Sri Lanka however, questioned

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## The complete package

Australian captain Ricky Ponting believes Andrew Symonds is turning into the complete one-day cricketer after the Queenslander blasted 71 not out against New Zealand here at The Oval on Thursday to secure his side's place in the semifinal of the ICC Champions Trophy.

Australia were set 199 to win after putting New Zealand in to bat and made it comfortably with 12.4 overs to spare.

However, the end of the match presentations were marred by a running scuffle between spectators and stewards as fans tried to get onto the pitch although there was no danger to the players.

But Ponting claimed he was not worried about his players' safety saying.

"It was probably a few too many beers in the sun and it is out of our hands. The security has been very good in this tournament and I hope they keep looking after the players on the field."

Symonds hit four sixes and seven fours in a 47-ball display of brutal hitting and Damien Martyn added 60 not out.

The pair put on 100 for the fourth wicket to chase down the New Zealanders' total of 198-9 with 12.4 overs to spare.

"He gives you everything. In my opinion he's the best fielder in the world, he bowls off-spin or medium pace and the way he is batting suggests he has come a long way in the last couple of years."

"When he gets on a roll there are not too many grounds in the world that are big enough for him. He can go in any situation – if you've lost early wickets he can guts it out or he

can finish a game."

"He is very strong and his record is outstanding at the moment," Ponting added. "I think he's one of the keys for us going forward in this tournament."

Symonds came in with Australia 99-3 and immediately took the game away from the under-dogs bringing up his half-century from 40 balls whilst Martyn was slightly more circumspect reaching his fifty from 63 balls with eight boundaries.

But the foundations of the victory

were laid by the Australian bowlers with Glenn McGrath and Michael Kasprovic outstanding picking up 3-39 and 3-32 respectively as New Zealand slumped to 124-8 before Daniel Vettori (29 not out) and Brendon McCullen (47) got them up to 198.

Ponting also praised McGrath for his effort. There was speculation before the match that McGrath might struggle to retain his place after injury but he repaid his

## ICC orders TV replays for Ind-Aus Tests

The International Cricket Council (ICC) has told the Indian board that it needs to provide TV pictures for third umpire decisions to go ahead with next month's home test series against Australia.

The ICC said in a statement on Friday that it had turned down a request from the Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) that the matches should be allowed even if no TV coverage was available for the third umpire.

Telecast of the much-awaited series, starting on October 6, has been thrown into serious doubt because of ongoing litigation over the recent award of TV rights for cricket in India.

"ICC is not able to agree to BCCI's proposal. It is ICC policy that all international matches must have third umpire television coverage in place," ICC chief executive Malcolm

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## Chess camp on at BKSP

The Bangladesh men's team for the 36th Chess Olympiad began their training camp at the Bangladesh Krira Shikkha Protishthan in Savar from Friday under Russian Grandmaster Alexander Volzhin.

The 33-year-old Russian coach will be with the team for one and a half months, guiding them throughout the Olympiad that will be held in Calvia, Majorca in Spain from October 14-31.

Five members of the men's team, GM Niaz Murshed, International Masters Reefat Bin Sattar, Abdullah Al Rakib and Enamul Hossain Rajib and FIDE Master Sheikh Nasir Ahmed have joined the camp while GM Ziaur Rahman is expected to join next week after his return from the USA.

The Bangladesh team also include four female players.

## Tigers coming home today

The team left London in the afternoon for Dubai en route to Dhaka without coach Dav Whatmore, who stayed back as a guest commentator for BBC in the England-Sri Lanka match.

The Australian is expected to leave England today.

## Balaji out of Tests too

Lakshminpathy Balaji will miss the upcoming Test series against Australia due to his groin injury. Andrew Leipus, the team physiotherapist, confirmed that Balaji was surely ruled out of action for the next two months and added that the recovery process might take much longer.

The Telegraph, a Kolkata-based daily, reported Leipus as saying: "Well, he's off cricket for at least two months and complete recovery from the groin problem may take four-five ... He's still in pain, but nothing much can be done."

Balaji was suffering from a bone inflammation on both sides of the pelvis and Leipus said that the recovery process would take time. "Painkillers aren't the solution, in fact they may retard the recovery process."

Leipus had also consulted Chris Bradshaw, a doctor based in London, and added, "Dr Bradshaw's opinion is that nature must be allowed to take its course. More t

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## TROPHY TREATS

He is now 42 but former West Indies batsman Clayton Lambert is still enjoying life as a cricketer even though he is not playing for his beloved country.

Lambert is the only player with Test experience in a multinational USA squad, which qualified for the Champions Trophy riding on his brilliant performance in the six-nation challenge meet in Dubai.

Bangladeshi cricket fans might remember the dashing batsman from the 1998 Mini World Cup in Dhaka, the first edition of the competition now known as the Champions Trophy and the left-hander still gets excited when he recollects that memory of representing the West Indies.

"It was an amazing experience. The people of Bangladesh are just hungry for cricket. The stadium was packed with crowd in every match although the home side was not there," said the Guyanese.

Comparing the ongoing championship with the one in Dhaka, Lambert said that it was a dull show in England.

"There is no excitement. I think this competition should be arranged in one city and in one venue and preferably in a developing country," said Lambert, who made five Test and 11 one-day international appearances for the Windies between 1991 and 1998.

About his present side, Lambert said there was only one target for the USA and that was to qualify for the 2007 World Cup to be held in the West Indies.

"I will not play in the next World Cup even if the USA qualifies. Actually, my main target is to start a coaching career," said Lambert.
