

'Protect city from floods'

Leaders of 20 environmental and social organisations yesterday called on the government to take effective steps to protect the city from floods and waterlogging and to evict illegal encroachers occupying the water bodies.

They also demanded immediate execution of the government's decisions regarding the Master Plan of Dhaka Metropolitan 1997 and Law of Open Space and Wetlands 2000.

Hundreds of people formed a human chain organised by Bangladesh Poribesh Andolok (Bapa) in front of Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakha (Rajuk) yesterday to press the demands.

Speaking at a gathering there,

the leaders said most city roads go under knee-deep water even after a slight or moderate rain as over 90 percent canals in and around the capital was filled up by land grabbers.

"We should recover lands, canals, rivers and wetlands from the illegal encroachers for the greater interest of future generation," said Prof Muzaffer Ahmed, president of Bapa.

He also called for launching programmes in every ward of the city to raise awareness about environment.

Mohidul Haq Khan, general secretary of Bapa, said the intolerable situation has been created as Rajuk did not perform its duties properly.

Mihir Biswas, joint secretary of

Bapa, told The Daily Star that the government has taken a decision to recover 37 canals, but no action has been taken as yet.

He alleged that a section of Rajuk officials gave permission to build plots at any place in the capital in exchange of bribes.

Nagorik Uddug, Coalition for Urban poor (CUP), Proshika, SID, Hunger Project, Srama Bikash and Paribesh Samabaya Samity, Satkar and Seba Samity, Bishwa Shanti Sangha, Work for Better Bangladesh, Bastibasi Adhikar Surakkha Committee, Pallima Sangsad, Citizens' Forum and Centre for Human and Communities Development took part in the demonstration.

River erosion makes 80,000 homeless a year

Experts tell workshop

River erosion renders 80 thousand people of floodplain homeless while almost equal number of 'char-dwellers' become shelterless every year, said the experts at a workshop yesterday.

Terming erosion as one of the most devastating natural hazards, they said the rivers and estuaries devour 10 thousand hectares of land every year.

The seminar on 'Monitoring and Prediction of Erosion' was organised by Water Resources Planning Organisation (Warpo) and Centre for Environmental and Geographical Information Services (Cegis) at Brac Centre Inn in the city.

Though it is extremely expensive to protect land from river erosion, we have to look for some cheaper alternative measures, as we cannot afford losing land any longer in a country with the highest density of population, said Water Resources Minister Hafiz Uddin Ahmad.

River erosion is a nightmare for

millions of people in the country, said Warpo Director General H S Mozaddad Faruque.

Little attention has so far been paid to minimise the losses and community sufferings caused by erosion, said Cegis Morphologist Maminul Haque Sarker in his presentation at the workshop.

No systematic documentation or holistic picture of erosion, its extent and damage is available, he added.

The river Padma alone engulfed 30.7 kilometres of rural and feeder roads and a total of 3,300 hectares of land including 260 hectares of settlement and 1,200 hectares of agricultural land during 2001 to 2004, said Maminul.

He also showed in his presentation that the river Jamuna eroded a total of 1130 hectares of floodplain along its right bank in 2003.

The Cegis has developed some tools based on its study of river morphology with satellite image to monitor bank erosion in the rivers Jamuna, Ganges, Padma and lower Meghna.

It has also improved the tools under a project called Environmental Monitoring Information Network (Emin) for erosion prediction with one-year lead-time to help national organisations and NGOs in the vulnerable areas in reducing losses and community sufferings.

Cegis Executive Director Dr Riaz Khan and Water Resources Secretary Omar Faruque Khan also spoke on the occasion.
