

Rab recovers AK-22, arms from criminals

Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) of Chittagong in separate raids on Friday seized five people, including four alleged operatives of a Cox's Bazar-based terrorist outfit, with firearms and ammunition in Bandarban.

The arms and ammunition recovered from the arrestees included one China made AK-22 rifle, one .22 bore rifle, two air guns, 65 AK-22 bullets, 26 air gun cartridges and a magazine of .22 rifle.

Besides, the Rab team recovered three daggers and parts of barrels of various guns.

Of the arrestees, Lalmoon Bom Lala, 43, Victor Bom, 17, Rowat Chhang, 26, and Jirkhan Bom, 19, haled from Ruma in Bandarban while Md Abdul Gafur, 32, from Satkania upazila in Chittagong.

A 20-member team of Rab following a lead that arms dealing was to take place, raided the Kaichthali in Bandarban on Friday night. They arrested Abdul Gafur

with a sophisticated AK-22 rifle.

Later the same night, acting on information extracted from him, the Rab members arrested Lalmoon Bom Lala from a hotel and Victor, Rowat and Jirkhan from Uzanipara in Bandarban district headquarters with a large number of arms and ammunition in their possession.

The arrestees and the arms and ammunition were brought to Rab headquarters in the port city.

A case was filed with Bandarban Police Station.

Banglar Sourav sailors found guilty of oil spillage

Militants threaten to kill US, UK hostages

Suicide car bomb kills 23, oil official survives attempt on life

Insurgents threatened to kill two Americans and a Briton unless the United States freed Iraqi women prisoners.

Al Jazeera said yesterday, and a suicide car bomb killed 23 people outside Iraqi National Guard offices.

The Arabic broadcaster aired scenes from a videotape of the three hostages it said it had obtained from

the Tawhid and Jihad Group of suspected al-Qaeda ally Abu Musab al-Zarqawi.

The group demanded the release of Iraqi women prisoners from Umm Qasr prison in southern Iraq and Baghdad's Abu Ghraib, scene of past abuse of Iraqi prisoners by US guards that caused international outrage and has led to criminal proceedings.

No-one of Bogra's Sabgram village ever thought they would not only see such a scene in a remote place like theirs but it would even be a run of the mills. Women like Maloti, Kohinoor, Angur, Rebecca, Pokkhirani and Piar are now running brisk businesses at the heart of Sabgram Market side-by-side their male competitors, some of whom are squint-eyed no doubt. And what makes the men even more dumbfounded is the casual way these women carry on and succeed as shopkeepers.

These rustic women who once had to fend for their family members could not believe when they first learnt that women like them would get a place in a market.

After a similar government initiative in 1984 had failed to produce the desired results, CARE Bangladesh and Local Government Engineering Department (LGED) launched a
