

BHF aims at facelift

U-21 Challenge Cup invitational meet begins today

The U-21 Challenge Cup invitational hockey tournament kicks off in Dhaka today in an effort to give the game a facelift in the country.

Desperate to change their image as the favourite punching bag in international scene, the Bangladesh Hockey Federation (BHF) invited under rated teams like Oman, Myanmar, Afghanistan, Singapore and Iran for the eight-day meet.

But the plans of the country's hockey officials to win a title looks set to suffer after India's eleventh-hour inclusion. The BHF turned to their more colourful neighbours only when Iran and Singapore withdrew. This is the first international hockey meet in two years after the federation hosted the Prime Minister Cup Hockey in 2002.

Two matches will be held on the opening day with Oman and Afghanistan battling at BKSP in the morning. But the tournament will be officially declared open by State

Minister for Youth and Sports and chairman of the organising committee Fazlur Rahman at 3.45 pm before the Bangladesh-Myanmar match at the Maulana Bhashani National Hockey Stadium.

Although India's presence will pose a threat to the hosts' bid to win a trophy, it will definitely increase the tournament's attraction with at least one strong team in the competition.

Oman are ranked lower than Bangladesh, Myanmar have no pedigree and the war-torn

Pak tri-series from today

Pakistan captain Inzamamul Haq is confident his revitalised team can win their first home one-day cricket title ahead of their opening tri-series match against outsiders Zimbabwe on Thursday.

The hosts' real test is expected to come against Asian champions Sri Lanka, the third team in the series in which all sides face each other twice before the top two play-off in the October 16 final.

Pakistan has never won a home one-day tournament after failing in the 1987 and 1996 World Cups and in a tri-series in 1994 and a four-team tournament in 1997.

"I am confident that we will win our first home one-day title and although we know Zimbabwe are ranked outsiders due to missing their key players we will not take them lightly," said Inzamam, whose side has shown improvement under

new English coach Bob Woolmer.

Since Woolmer's arrival in June this year, Pakistan won four of their five matches in the Asia Cup in July in Sri Lanka followed by a runners-up finish to Australia in a tri-series in Amstelveen, Holland.

They also came close to beating Australia in a one-off limited-overs international at Lord's before losing to the West Indies in the semifinal of the International Cricket Council (ICC) Trophy in England.

"We have shown improvement but the real thing is (finding) the winning finish where we have shown weakness and need to overcome that problem," said Inzamam. "We lost to Sri Lanka in the Asia Cup and now need to beat them to win the title," said Inzamam, who last week became only the second batsman after India's Sachin Tendulkar to score 10,000 one-day runs.

Pakistan have included two uncapped players in batsman Bazid Khan, son of former captain Majid Khan, and pacer Rao Iftikhar in their 15-man squad for the series.

Zimbabwe, mired in turmoil after a rebellion by 15 white players including captain Heath Streak and the suspension of their Test status, drew a two-day tour opener in Pakistan before suffering an innings defeat last week in a four-day match against the Pakistan Cricket Board Patron's XI.

"We are a young team but we can take inspiration from our good showing against Sri Lanka in England earlier this month where we gave them a run for their money," said Zimbabwe captain Tatenda Taibu, who, at 20 years of age, became the youngest ever international captain in April this year.

Following a players' strike over selection policies in April, Zimbabwe lost all five one-day games on home grounds to Sri Lanka and suffered the ignominy of being dismissed for one-day cricket's lowest score of 35.

They also lost both the Tests to Sri Lanka by innings followed by

'Don't rule me out'

India's star batsman Sachin Tendulkar on Wednesday hinted he may be fit for next week's first Test against Australia, saying the tennis elbow injury was showing "tremendous improvement".

But the 31-year-old, one of the game's most prolific batsmen with 33 Test and a record 37 one-day centuries, said he needed doctors' clearance before making himself available for the Bangalore Test from next Wednesday.

"I am not ruling myself out," Tendulkar told reporters after giving his Mumbai teammates a pep talk ahead of their three-day game against the tourists at the Brabourne stadium from Thursday.

"I am waiting for doctors to give me the green signal. I will know in a few days if I can play in Bangalore."

"I have not practised for six weeks because I was in a lot of pain."

I need to have more strength in my left hand.

"All I can say at present is that doctors feel there has been a tremendous improvement in my condition."

Tendulkar, who missed three consecutive limited-overs tournaments in the last month due to the injury, said two weeks ago he was unable to pick up a bat due to the pain.

Tendulkar has not played a first-class game since the third Test against Pakistan in Rawalpindi in April, but his return to the national team will be fast-tracked the moment he is declared fit.

Indian captain Sourav Ganguly has said Tendulkar will be played in Bangalore even if he makes himself available on the morning of the match.

"When a player like Tendulkar is missing, it makes a big difference," Ganguly was quoted as saying.

"I want him back fast."

Kapali to lead BCB XI

The enigmatic Alok Kapali was given an early opportunity to show that he has put his lean time with the bat behind him when he was yesterday named captain of the BCB (Bangladesh Cricket Board) XI that will take on New Zealand in their first warm-up match, a threerunner.

Kapali, who's prolonged run-draught saw him being dropped for the recently concluded ICC Champions Trophy in England, was provided a new lease of life by the selectors who called up the prodigious 22-year-old in the 21-man preliminary squad for the Test and one-day series against the Black Caps next month. But he still has to convince the critics that he has

found answers for his form slump.

Kapali was left out of the second Test against the West Indies at Jamaica in May but retained his place in the Asia Cup squad before the selectors ran out of patience with him.

New Zealand are expected to reach Dhaka on October 8 and play the three-day match at the Bangabandhu Krira Shikha Protisthan (BKSP) from October 14-16. The first of the two Tests start in Dhaka on October 19.

Apart from Kapali, the 14-member BCB XI squad has some other names who will be trying to make an impression.

Bangladesh Under-19 Opener Nafees Iqbal will be looking to earn a maiden Test call-up having already represented the Tigers in ODIs. His competitor for the same role is the more experienced Hannan Sarker

Raul brings back life

Real Madrid captain Raul was the hero as he scored twice to help his side overturn a two-goal deficit and beat Roma, easing the crisis with the Spanish club while making even worse what has been a dreadful season so far for Roma.

Madrid had lost their Champions League opener 3-0 in Leverkusen a fortnight ago.

"The memory of that night put us on edge at the start tonight," said Roberto Carlos. "But we showed the critics we can fight for a result when we have to. That was a comeback which will go down in the club's history."

Madrid had been outplayed by Leverkusen in their opener while Roma were eventually handed a 3-0 defeat by UEFA after their match with Dynamo Kiev was halted after referee Anders Frisk was struck by a missile.

Madrid coach Garcia Remon made two changes from the side that lost 2-1 in Bilbao on Saturday night.

Roberto Carlos replaced Raul Bravo at left back while Zinedine Zidane was rushed back into action despite still feeling the effects of a dislocated shoulder picked up in Leverkusen.

Michael Owen was also back on the bench after a thigh strain had ruled him out of the trip to Bilbao.

The game got off to an electric start and Ronaldo was crowded out in the first minute, when he threatened on the edge of the Roma penalty area.

The Italians, coached on an interim basis by Ezio Sella following the resignation of Rudi Voller, then went straight down the other end and Alessandro Mancini forced a save from Iker Casillas, allowing Michel Salgado to head the ball away for a corner.

The resulting delivery was taken quickly, and Madrid lost concentration allowing Daniela De Rossi to beat the offside trap and flick the ball past Casillas to give Roma the lead.

Pakistan take the lead

Ace penalty corner specialist Sohail Abbas scored Pakistan's winning goal moments before the end of play to give the home team a hard fought 3-2 victory over India in their third match at the Lala Ayub Stadium here on Wednesday.

The 28-year-old scored in the 68th minute after Pakistan struggled with India's aggressive game in the second period, bringing his tally to 263 goals in 213 international appearances.

Pakistan now lead the eight-match series 2 to 1.

Pakistan won the first match 2-1 in Karachi but India staged a comeback by routing Pakistan 4-1 in the second match at Quetta.

Pakistani forwards, clueless in their second match defeat, looked more cohesive Wednesday and played to a plan - scoring two goals in the first half.

Mudassar Ali opened the scoring when he latched on to a beautiful pass from Kashif Jawwad and his hit went through the pads of Indian
