## Transport strike in 6 dists threatened

Transport owners' associations of six districts in Mymensingh region on Monday threatened an indefinite transport strike from October 12 if their demand for withdrawal of BRTC (Bangladesh Road and Transport Corporation) bus services is not met by October 11. The districts are Mymensingh, Netrakona, Jamalpur, Sherpur, Kishoreganj and Tangail. The decision was taken at a meeting at Mymensingh Chamber of Commerce and Industry (MCCI) office with MCCI president AKM Shamsuddin in the chair.

## Arms recovery: 6 sent to Bandarban jail

## Tk 25 lakh duty deception bid foiled at Benapole port

Benapole Customs on Sunday foiled a duty deception bid amounting to Tk 25 lakh.

Three importers of Dhaka imported Indian goods by 24 trucks, which carried goods in excess.

The trucks were carrying 3,491 bundles of copier paper in excess. Five trucks laden with 3,913 bundles of copier paper in excess bearing manifest numbers 62683-87 imported by Sheba Traders, Dhaka and exported by Krishna Traders, Calcutta.

Seven trucks laden with excess 1,307 bundles of coated paper imported by Sheba Traders, Dhaka and exported by Raj Enterprise, Calcutta. Eight trucks laden with excess 1,556 bundles of coated paper imported by Rahman Brothers, Dhaka and exported by Raj Enterprise, Calcutta.

Shamsur Rahman, a leader of Sarsha unit of BNP was the Clearing and Forwarding Agent of the imported goods.

## Bad results from reputed colleges

Pass percentage in HSC lesser in Barisal govt colleges: Board officials say they will probe

Most of the renowned colleges in Barisal except the Barisal Cadet College did frustrating results in the HSC examination this year, which has created resentment among guardians and examinees as well.

Many guardians this correspondent talked to said these institutions had admitted students after merit test but the pass percentage was around half or less than that.

Barisal Board officials said they will probe into it.

According to HSC results published on Monday, 60 students from ten renowned colleges got GPA-5. Twenty-five of those went to Barisal Cadet College and the rest 35 were shared by nine other institutions.

The four other government colleges got 12 and private colleges got 23.

Out of 1212 examinees from Government Syed Hatem Ali College, only 495 passed. Six of them got GPA.

At Barisal Government Women's College, 668 examinees out of 1307 passed. Only four students got GPA-5.

Only 196 out of 440 examinees passed from Shahid Smriti Government College. Three got GPA-5.

A total 231 out of 404 examinees passed from Patuakhali Government Women's College. Two got GPA-5.

Private colleges did better. A total of 1029 examinees appeared from Amrita Lal Dey College in Barisal city. Only 622 passed. Sixteen

students however got GPA-5.

The pass percentage is only 21.90 in Jhalakati Mohila College, 48 per cent in Mahilara College, 41 per cent in Safa College 57 per cent in Patharghata College. Each got one GPA-5.

The results of government colleges were also similar last year.

On the other hand, the pass percentage is higher in colleges in rural areas, Board officials said.

Some guardians said the pass percentage was bad because teachers concentrated on a few good students and did not give any attention to classes.

Barisal Board authorities when contacted also said the noted government colleges belied their expectations.

## Three grenades hurled at Talu Spinning Mill

Trees damaged but no casualty

Three grenades were tossed on the compound of Talu Spinning Mill in Chuadanga, owned by ruling BNP lawmaker Haji Mojammel Haq at about 11pm Tuesday.

The grenades burnt and destroyed some trees but none was hurt, police and mill authorities said yesterday.

They said the grenades hurled from outside exploded near the gate when security guards were asleep.

Police rushed there immediately after the incident and collected splinters. They said they were examining those.

The mill Manager, Iqbal Hossain, when contacted yesterday, said he was at his house about half a kilometre from the mill. Hearing the explosions he rushed to the mill and informed police.

There was no damage to machinery or other installation, he said. Production is going on as usual.

The Chuadanga Police Superintendent also visited the mill.

When contacted over cell phone yesterday, Haji Mojammel Haq, now in Dhaka, said he could not speculate who did it.

"I have no enemy except political rivals," he said.

The mill's Security Manager Anwar Hossain said he had lodged a general diary with Damurhuda thana without naming any accused.

Police said the grenades could be hurled by outlaws.

## Angiogram facility at CMCH

Fifty-five-year old Sayeed Noor from Chandanaish is very lucky. He is the first man to avail angiogram facility introduced at Chittagong Medical College Hospital (CMCH) on Tuesday.

"It is a historical moment for all of us and we have done it successfully," said Dr AKM Monzur Morshed, Head of Cardiology Department while talking to journalists.

Assistant professor of the department Dr Anisur Rahman and register Dr Sheikh Hasan Mamun, specially trained from National Institute for Cardio-Vascular Diseases (NICVD), conducted it.

The angiogram machine, procured at a cost Tk 5 crore some nine months ago, was installed here on May 19.

Medical technologists from NICVD Babul Chandra, Liton, Bashar and senior staff nurses Insafi Khanna and Rita assisted them. Dr Morshed, Dr SC Dhar, Dr Jamal Ahmad, Dr Akhtar Hossain, Dr Mir Jamal, Dr Sumon Nazmul Hossain and Dr Kamrul Islam supervised the angiogram.

CMCH Director Brigadier General Toufiqul Alam, Principal Dr Chowdhury B Mahmud, former Director General (Health) Professor Dr Noor-un-Nabi, veteran physician professor Dr Aminul Islam, General Secretary of Bangladesh Medical Association (BMA), Chittagong chapter Dr Khurshid Jamil Chowdhury were present.

## Nasim tells AL meeting in Satkhira

Front ranking Awami League leader and former home minister Mohammad Nasim on Tuesday called upon the people to launch a mass movement against the "failed" BNP-Jamaat government.

"They have turned Bangladesh into a dysfunctional state by their misrule", he told a big public meeting held at Shaheed Abdur Razzak Park in the town.

Condemning the on-going arrests in different areas of the country, Nasim said it is a crackdown on Awami League to fit its October 3 'grand rally' in Dhaka.

"Such undemocratic and fascist move will not keep them in power in the face of a mass movement", he said.

The former home minister also criticised raising of special forces like the Rapid Action Battalion (Rab).

and the Chetah. "These have been created to harass people".

Nasim said AL central leader Ivy Rahman along with others laid down their lives to protect the country from "misrule" of the BNP-Jamaat government. "So instead of shedding tears for them, we should resist the perpetrators", he said.

He said the August 21 carnage was part of a blueprint by communal forces to eliminate AL chief Sheikh Hasina to turn Bangladesh into a Taliban state.

Killing of political leaders, intellectuals, journalists and pro-liberation forces increased since takeover by the 4-Party Alliance government.

## Jamaat men smuggle in arms, says Motia

Awami League Presidium member and former agriculture minister Motia Chowdhury held Jamaat-e-Islami responsible for the 21 August grenade attack on the AL rally in Nilphamari.

Now in the ruling alliance, the party, by using its influence, is smuggling arms through Chittagong Port and using those to eliminate pro-liberation forces. "They have clearance from BNP", she alleged while addressing a public meeting at Jaldhaka High School ground on Tuesday, arranged by the upazila

Chairman Dewan Kamal Ahmed, Syedpur Municipal Chairman Akhtar Hossain Badal and Domar Municipal Chairman AL Zahoor Hossain.

Motia said the August 21 incident has united pro-liberation forces. The fall of the BNP-Jamaat government is a matter of time only as all the pro-liberation forces have forged unity.

She called upon the people to launch a mass movement to topple the government because it has failed to run the country and ensure security of people's life and property but is trying to cling to power by repression.

"Soil edodes from hills and falls into the river in a massive scale due to massive extraction of timber," he said.

Sangu is the only means of communication to remote Ruma, Roangchhari and Thanchi upazilas from Bandarban district headquarters.

Indigenous people transport fruits like pineapple, orange, bananas through this river. Life stops when the river loses its flow.

## Criminals flee hill village in Sherpur

Security tightened after Daily Star report

Neckrakona: Peace has returned to the five villages in bordering Jinaigathi upazila in Sherpur district following vigilance by BDR and police.

Criminals and arms smugglers had created a reign of terror in the area, inhabited mostly by indigenous people. They realised toll at random and kidnapped those who failed to pay or opposed them.

The local people were helpless as some gangs had established their strongholds. Smuggling in of arms was going on unabated.

This correspondent during a recent visit to the area again saw police, Rab (Rapid Action Battalion) and BDR teams in operation against terrorists.

The security forces launched special joint operations in the area and freed eight villagers kidnapped and confined in their 'camps' in

Bakakura and Namapara, local people said.

The freed persons are Probat Kubi, 45 and Profulla Kubi, 35 of Chutagajhi village; Amrul Chumbugang, 38 and Mieal Dopl, 28, of Namapara; Mojum Ali, 30, of Dudhna; Dilip Mrong, 34, of Bakakura; and Captain Mankin, 26 and Sudir Sengmli, 24, of Namapara village.

Many indigenous men who had fled away fearing kidnap by armed terrorists have returned home.

But five persons kidnapped by the terrorists are still missing, the local people said. They are Dinal Dalbal, 26, son of Hasan Dalbat of Bakakura village; Rupon Kubi, 23, son of Samuel Mangsaa of Chutagajhi village; Nipin Dopl, 27, son of Parimal Kubi; Walam Sangma, 32, and Bipul Kubi of Namapara village.

The villagers said the terrorists have fled to the jungles
