Hasina vows to sacrifice her life for people

Leader of the Opposition Sheikh Hasina yesterday vowed to sacrifice her life for the cause of the countrymen and urged people from a grand rally in Dhaka to join the ongoing movement to overthrow the BNP-Jamaat coalition government.

"I am not afraid of death....This is my new life after August 21. I am with you and will be with you," she told the huge crowd at Paltan Maidan in her first public speech since the grenade attacks on an Awami League (AL) rally on Bangabandhu Avenue.

"I am ready to make supreme sacrifice for establishing people's rights. I promise you that I will continue protesting all misdeeds until my last breathe," said an emotioncharged Hasina, who narrowly escaped the grisly attacks 42 days

40 lakh affected by hepatitis C

Some 40 lakh people or 3 percent of the total population of Bangladesh are suffering from the hepatitis C virus (HCV), speakers at a seminar in Dhaka said yesterday quoting a preliminary report by the World Health Organisation (WHO).

More than 17 crore people across the world are suffering from HCV, of which three crore are in India, 1.40 crore in Egypt, 1.10 crore in Pakistan and 40 lakh in the USA, according to WHO. The yearly increase of HCV patients across the world is 30 to 40 lakhs, the speakers

These were disclosed at the seminar on 'Mass Awareness to Control Hepatitis-C in Bangladesh' with Professor Mobin Khan, chairman of Department of Hepatology of Banglabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University (BSMMU),

taking the chair.

Presenting a key note paper Professor Mobin said blood transfusion without proper screening, being shaved in men's salons where the blades are used over and over, and intravenous drug using are the main sources of HCV infection.

He noted that 25 percent of intravenous drug users and 1.2 percent of blood donors suffer from

Foreign country not named for diplomatic reasons

Commission not fit to identify local abettors

The judicial inquiry commission in its report has obliquely referred several times to a country which it blamed for the August 21 grenade attack on an Awami League rally, but it did not name the country for diplomatic reasons, said sources.

"The commission did not name

the country anywhere in the report but made several hints since naming it will create repercussions in the diplomatic quarter," a well-placed source told The Daily Star yesterday, a day after the one-member commission submitted its report to the government.

Modern ships to replace old ones

PM tells navy men, commissions 7 ships, crafts

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia yesterday said the government is actively considering procuring modern ships to replace the old fleets of Bangladesh Navy to enhance the naval power.

The prime minister, also in charge of defence ministry, announced plan of the government at a function organised for commissioning seven navy ships and conferring National Standard Award on BN Flotilla at the jetty of Naval

Force at the BNS Isa Khan.

She formally commissioned the seven newly procured ships and crafts by pressing remote-contro

She formally handed over the commissioning edicts to the commanding officers of the new vessels- BNS Gumti, BNS Sangu and BNS Turag, three offshore patrol vessels procured from the UK. BNS Dhansiri and BNS Chitra, two fastattack craft procured from South Korea, and BNT Rupsha and BNT SEE PAGE 11 COL 4
