RAB and mass arrests

The criminals being killed would be replaced as quickly for RAB has no authority of going after those who sustain the criminals, the political godfathers. The same goes for the issue of mass arrests upon which your excellent editorial of October 9 has been written. This government needs to put its head and heart together, if it intends to do anything worthwhile for the nation.

Taj at 350


