Import bill for oil doubles this year

High price in world market leads to Tk 3,000 crore expenditure in extra

The import bill for fuel may shoot up by at least 50 percent in the current fiscal because of the phenomenal rise in oil prices in the international

The oil bill was about to double this year as light crude extended record-setting highs, which is twice the price of \$25-30 a barrel.

But the funding requirement may, however, remain at about 50 per cent because of the government decision to keep the import duty

The initial import bill was esti-

mated at \$900 million, but an addi-

tional \$500 million (about Tk 3,000 crore) will be required for the volatility in the world market, sources said.

Hasina asks govt to quit for price hike

Opposition Leader and Awami League (AL) chief Sheikh Hasina yesterday asked the BNP-Jamaat-led coalition to resign immediately for the government's 'absolute failure to control price spiral of essentials'.

"Commerce minister had pledged to control the market and bring the prices within the limits of common people by three days. But, during these three days the situation has worsened," said Hasina, while addressing a delegation of Swadhinata Chikitsak Parisad, an organisation of doctors, at her Sudha Sadan residence.

Expressing grave concern over the skyrocketing of essentials in Ramadan, she said, "The government is totally indifferent to the situation as ministers and ruling

Biman to get \$2.65m from insurer

Biman Bangladesh Airlines will receive \$2.65 million in cash towards insurance coverage for its crashed F-28 aircraft, according to a settlement reached with Lloyds Aviation Insurance Company.

Under the settlement, the national flag carrier, which started salvage operation of the F-28 near Sylhet airport five days back, will also retain the aeroplane.

A Biman official said the insurance company has assessed the value of the crashed aircraft at \$0.35 million and the amount of insurance coverage at \$3 million.

The official speaking anonymously said the value of the plane is \$1 million according to a Biman

estimate. The insurance company could have taken the plane and sold it, he said, adding that it did not do so probably considering salvage and carrying costs.

Biman will use its engines and parts as backups for the other four F-28s in its fleet, he said, adding, many parts are still usable. The salvage operation lingers

since the rescue team is trying to keep the parts usable and recovering the valuable components first. Spares of F-28 have become very rare in world market, the official said.

He said the UK-based insurance company wants quick settlement and will pay the amount very soon. Biman procured the 1979-model F-

Thousands march London streets demanding Iraq pullout

Tens of thousands of demonstrators took to the streets of central London yesterday to protest against the Iraq war as Prime Minister Tony Blair struggled to shake-off fierce criticism of the invasion back home.

An AFP reporter at the scene said tens of thousands of demonstrators had taken to the streets for the march, which began at Russell Square, close to the British museum

The Stop The War Coalition, organisers of the march, said they believed 30,000 protesters, down from an initial estimate of 50,000 were expected to take to the streets to demand the withdrawal of al troops from Iraq.

"We are expecting 30,000 peo-
