

3 to die, 12 awarded life in Jail Killing Case

Obaid, Shah Moazzem, Nurul Islam, Taheruddin Thakur, Khairuzzaman acquitted




A Dhaka court yesterday sentenced three to death, awarded life imprisonment to 12 and acquitted five in the long-awaited verdict of historic Jail Killing Case.

Ruling BNP lawmaker KM Obaidur Rahman, Shah Moazzem Hossain, Nurul Islam Monzoor, Taheruddin Thakur and Additional Secretary to foreign ministry Khairuzzaman, who were freed on bail soon after the ruling coalition came to power, were relieved of the

All the convicts are former army personnel. Of the total 21 chargesheeted accused, three are in custody, five on bail, 12 have been evading arrest, and one died.

Govt rejects TI report

For the fourth year in a row Bangladesh has become the most corrupt country in the Transparency International's (TI) corruption perception index (CPI) this year. It however shares the position with

The CPI 2004 that lists 146 countries this year against last year's 133, however, shows Bangladesh has

made a slight improvement of .2 points to 1.5 of a clean score of 10. A score of below 3 indicates 'rampant corruption', according to a TI press

This year, the TI assessed corruption in Bangladesh through eight surveys compared to only three last year. It surveyed business enterprises while reports of multilateral organisations such as the World SEE PAGE 11 COL 7

Top lawyers term it politically manoeuvred

Eminent lawyers yesterday termed the judgment in the historic Jail Killing Case politically manoeuvred and said the judgment virtually amounts to maintaining the status quo regarding the accused.

Many of the lawyers even reacted sharply to the judgment. It is not at all acceptable, they observed.

Some, however, viewed it as at least a step forward when the trial had been stalled for decades by political interventions and judicial

Some killers escaped AL rejects death penalty for flawed probe: Judge

The judge of the jail killing case blamed the investigation officer (IO) of faulty investigation and said all the killers of the four national leaders could not be awarded capital punish-

ment due to negligence of the IO.

The Judge Mohammad Motiur Rahman presented details of flaws in the probe by the IO Abdul Kahar

"Faulty investigation is the reason behind damaging the merit of the case," the judge said, adding, "The IO did not investigate many

many things including the conspiracy behind the assassinations and presented faulty documents."

"The IO did not conduct any investigation into the role played by two or three accomplices of captain Moslemuddin who led the killing

squad," said the judge "The identity of all the killers could be learnt and the court might award them capital punishment had the IO conducted a proper investigation after consulting necessary



B Chy, Dr Kamal talk on foiling of Rangpur dialogue, say BNP's popularity to wane

Leaders of Jatiya Oikya Mancha and Bikalpa Dhara Bangladesh (BDB) yesterday said the attack on their mass dialogue at Rangpur on Tuesday was an attack on the people, democracy and people's right to express their views.

They also blasted the local administration and police for 'not taking any step' to resist the hoodlums and save the BDB and Oikya Mancha leaders from the attack.

A section of local leaders of the ruling BNP were directly involved in the attack, they alleged at a press conference at the Gono Forum office in the capital.

BDB President AQM Badruddoza Chowdhury and Oikya Mancha Convenor and Gono Forum President Dr Kamal Hossain spoke at the press conference while Mahi B

Chowdhury MP and other leaders

"For the first time in the history of Bangladesh, an elected government has taken a stand against the people," Badruddoza said. " Popularity of the ruling BNP will go down to a critical level if it does not stop such activities as at Rangpur."

The former president said that in the past many attacks on political leaders were made but this time they (BNP men) resorted to attack on people who gathered there (mass dialogue venue) to express their opinion on the prevailing situation in the country.

"We were not the speakers there, we went there just to hear people coming from all sections of the society. But the ruling party did not allow this," he said.
