# AL to press for talks on Rab, grenade attack

The Jatiya Sangsad session resumes today with the main opposition Awami League (AL) set to force the treasury bench to hold discussions on some crucial issues including deaths in the Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) custody and the August 21 grenade attack.

The party, which had walked out of the Business Advisory Committee (Bac) meeting before the session began on Thursday, has worked out a strategy to put heavy pressure at different parliamentary forums on the ruling alliance to meet its

The session will resume at 1:30pm today.

Senior AL lawmakers vesterday met Speaker Jamir Uddin Sircar and reiterated their demand to hold general discussions also on Monga. a near-famine situation in the northwestern region, and the recent incidents on Bangladesh-India border.

The speaker, however, did not assure the opposition lawmakers of meeting their demands in the current 14th session, sources said. "Time is very short. Your demands will be fulfilled in the next session,"

Sircar told the AL delegates

Opposition Deputy Leader Abdul Hamid after the meeting told The Daily Star that they would continue putting pressure on the ruling party to hold discussion on the issues. "We will also raise our demands in the House." he said. AL lawmakers joined a meeting

of the parliamentary standing committee on home ministry vesterday and demanded discussion on Rab activities and August 21 grenade attack on the party's Bangabandhu Avenue rally that killed 21 people.

The committee chairman assured the opposition lawmakers

of holding discussion on the issues but he did not specify the date for the discussion.

On October 28, the main opposition party demanded discussions on the same issues at the Bac meeting but the ruling party agreed to hold discussion on price of essentials only. The speaker will decide when the discussion will take place.

The AL lawmakers yesterday asked the speaker to hold the discussion on price hike in a day or two but the speaker could not specify

#### Rab seizes arms after fight with outlaws

Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) seized four firearms and ammunitions after a gunfight with outlawed cadres at village Kolabari in Mirpur upazila in the district early hours of yesterday.

On a tip-off, a Rab team raided the village at about 4am when a group of criminals allegedly belonging to outlawed Biplobi Communist party (BCP) were in a secret meeting As the Rab members reached

there, the BCP cadres opened fire on them. Rab returned fire, triggering shootout between them

After hour-long fight in which ten outlaws were reportedly injured, the cadres fled the scene.

Police seized two foreign made rifles, two LGs, and 12 rounds of bullets from the spot.

Rab, however, could not arrest any of the outlaws

#### WFP president due today

President-designate of the World Food Programme (WFP) Executive Board Ambassador Poul Skytte Christoffersen arrives in Dhaka today on a five-day visit.

He is coming to familiarise himself with the WFP activities in Bangladesh and to "see how food assistance has helped eradicate poverty and hunger in Bangladesh" said a WFP release yesterday.

Christoffersen, currently the Danish ambassador to Italy, will call on Food and Disaster Management Minister Chowdhury Kamal Ibne

He is also permanent representative to the WFP, the Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO) and the International Fund for Agriculture Development (IFAD).

He will meet food-aid beneficiaries, including flood victims. He will also visit activities related to WFP's flood-emergency operation, Vulnerable Group Development (VGD) and Nutrition for Education SEE PAGE 11 COL 2

## Planned immunity to WB protested

#### Alliance of 56 NGOs call it against constitutional rights

Speakers at a rally yesterday strongly protested the government's move to provide immunity to the World Bank for its activities in Bangladesh

As a public organisation, the World Bank and its auxiliary organisations must remain accountable to the common people for its activities, speakers said at the protest rally in the city organised by Alliance Against World Bank Immunity, an association of 56 NGOs.

"It is the constitutional right of the people of Bangladesh to sue the World Bank and seek justice if and when affected by any of its activities." said the alliance coordinator Aminur Rasul, reading out from a

written statement in the rally

The government is going to table a bill titled The International Finance Organisations (Amendment) Act 2004 in the current session of parliament to provide the WB and its auxiliary financial organisations immunity from any legal action.

According to the International Financial Organisation Order 1972, the World Bank is already enjoying various privileges including tax rebate, the alliance coordinator said.

"Once the bill is passed into law. it will debar any aggrieved citizen or the country itself from seeking legal redress against any of WB activities even if it violates people's fundamental rights enshrined in the constitution," Rasul read out from

the statement. The government must not yield to any undemocratic pressure of the WB and International Monetary Fund, as it is a 'government of the people and by the people,' said Quazi Faruque, general secretary of Consumers Association of Bangladesh

No other country in the world has given such immunity to the WB, said advocate Mizanur Rahman, adding that its demand for blanket immunity in Bangladesh goes against its own

organisational rules and regulations. Placards carried by the alliance activists read that the WB and IMF exploit the poor in the name of free trade and that Bangladesh should not be the 'springboard of WB and IMF'.

Speakers also demanded immediate review of the immunity enjoyed by the Asian Development Bank.

## Ailing Arafat faces days of tests

Yasser Arafat has undergone a battery of medical tests yesterday as French doctors try to discover whether the ailing Palestinian eader is suffering from leukemia or some other blood disorder. Arafat was carried on a stretcher into a French military hospital in the Paris suburb of Clamart Friday, after arriving by helicopter at the end of a gruelling six-hour voyage from his shell-battered compound in the West Bank city of Ramallah.

The Palestinian president, effectively confined to his offices by Israeli forces for 2 and a half years only agreed to fly to France after Israel promised to allow him to return to the West Bank following

## Strict steps mulled against errant ones

The education ministry has proposed amendments to the Private University Act 2003 providing for stringent measures like cancellation of government approval of any universities for failure to meet the laid down criteria.

The amendments will specify nfrastructure facilities, minimum number of faculties, permanent faculty members, admission and tuition fees, supervision and monitoring process and all other related aspects, ministry sources said. The ministry has already pre-

pared a guideline for private universities containing all these provi-

Against the backdrop of widespread criticism of a number of private universities for failure to impart quality education and fulfil

seeks to establish a congenial academic atmosphere at the private universities through amending the existing act, the sources mentioned. None of Bangladesh's 53 private

the required criteria, the ministry

universities meet all the criteria for registration under the Private University Act. They lack their own campus, faculty members, and library or laboratory facilities. In a recent evaluation report, the

University Grants Commission (UGC) has recommended closure of eight private universities that have miserably failed to comply with the existing criteria. It also set different deadlines for many of the universities to meet the criteria, and expressed satisfaction at the performances of only a few
