Security checks bring harassment for Gulshan commuters

Commuters and local residents have complained of unnecessary harassment at the five makeshift police checkpoints set up on entry routes to the diplomatic zone of Banani, Gulshan and Baridhara.

The checkpoint situated near the Gulshan Shooting Club stops mostly cabs and eng-run autorickshaws coming from the Tejgaon area. The ones at Kemal Ataturk Avenue, Baridhara, Badda and Mohakhali check all kinds of vehicles.

But commuters say that the stretch from the Tejgaon industrial area into Gulshan is notorious for

hijacking and extortion especially in the evening but police petrol is hardly evident there.

Rashu Ahmad, a businessman from Gulshan was mugged during the Ramadan on that road.

"I was travelling in a rickshaw and the mugging took place right infront of the BMW showroom. There was not a single soul to help me and there was no patrol police nearby also. I then rushed to the police checkpoint infront of the shooting club and reported the incident but policemen there instead of helping me, told me to contact the Tejgaon police sta-

Sub-inspector Ibrahim at one

checkpoint said that they did not have the manpower to go beyond Gulshan. "It is the responsibility of the Tejgaon police to patrol or place mobile courts in that area,"

"We are not stopping every autorickshaw or cab anymore. Only vehicles with groups of youth and suspicious looking people are stopped. Those carrying ladies are not frequently checked," he

Taxi drivers allege that the check points are only a pretext for extorting money by policemen even if the necessary papers of the vehicles are in order


"They search the car for illegal

stuff and arms. If nothing is found, they then take the documents for checking and tries to blackmail the driver into paying them money," said a cab driver. "This tendency increased ahead of the Eid," he

Precious time is also lost at these checkpoints.

"Sometimes it takes 15 to 20 minutes to search a taxi and that's a lot of time wasted during rush hours," said Abdul Qayum, a Gulshan resident.

"However, all these checking often come to nothing as most miscreants either take the bus or find other ways to get past the law,"

"Cosmetics are one of the most popular items here," said Hanif.

Nevertheless, there are some very useful items that just can not be priced at Taka five. So what is the catch? Nothing apparently.

First of all, we do not have to pay any rent or other bills. We only make reasonable profit. If we sell a cosmetic product the profit margin is only Tk.03. That is why we do brisk business. The same items are being sold at Tk 15 to 20 at the departmental stores," explained Hanif who added that he can go home with Tk 50 to 70 at the end of the day after paying the lineman of course. Now who is this lineman?

"Although we do not pay rents, we still have to give Tk 35 everyday to the lineman. He is the representative of the local police. Ultimately this money goes to the police," smiled Hanif.

Like Hanif, the other 'Five-Taka' vendors are all scared of one thing -

"Look at the eviction drive being carried out by the police inside the Suhrawardy Udyan. We have to make a living by selling things on govern-ment property. Where will we go if they keep throwing us out without rehabilitating," asked Mutaleb whose stall is near the Pir Jongi Majar in

Public Library auditorium reopening hits a snag

Re-opening of the Central Public Library auditorium has become uncertain after the Public Works Department (PWD) stopped renovation work on it about a month ago.

The auditorium was due to be reopened in the first week of November but now it is set for an indefinite delay. It has already remained closed for more than seven months for renovation and no one can say exactly when it would become operational again as more than fifty percentwork has not been completed.

"There are so many reasons behind it which I cannot disclose to the press," said an official of the wood works department of PWD.

The public library auditorium, a popular spot for cultural events in the city had remained in a poor condition for a long time. The authorities finally started renovating it last May following repeated complaints from cultural activists and organisations.

The renovation work included replacement of chairs, repairing and modifying the stage, the lights and sound system, the screen and ceiling. Restrooms and a VIP room are also being upgraded.

"We have already finished all the necessary repairs except in the lights and sound system and in interior decoration. We will complete them later but at the moment, we want to open the auditorium as soon as possible," said Kazi Abdul Majid, assistant director of Public Library.
He informed that it would take

more time to complete work on the lights and sound system as they have not floated tenders yet.

"It takes 28 days to complete the tender process according to the new rules so we do not want to wait for that. Once the process is completed, we will close the auditorium for remained out of order. As a result the seven to ten days to put the finishing touches on the renovation," added

He said that they have already changed 525 chairs. The platform of the stage has also been replaced. 27 lakh Taka has been spent on those. Absence of alternative power supply was hampering the programme at the auditorium. The

authorities have gone for a permanent solution to the problem. We have already arranged a 200 KB generator to tackle the power crisis permanently," informed

The auditorium had only five air conditioners, which was not sufficient. Besides, most of them

audience was less interested to watch shows at the auditorium especially in the summer. Under the renovation programme, 13 new air conditioners will be added while the existing five will go through repairs.

"We have allotted Tk 26 lakh for the modernisation of the air conditioning system," said Majid.

The design of the auditorium will remain the same with only the washroom and toilets shifted to the southern corner to accommodate a VIP room in that place. Security around the auditorium will also be beefed

"We have a plan to set up a metal detecting arch door at the entrance of the auditorium and scanners will

also be in use," Majid said.

According to the assistant director, the rent for the auditorium is expected to be increased as expenditure will rise because of the new air conditioning system and the alternative power supply.

Present rent of the auditorium is Tk 8,500 for 12 hours (8am to 8pm) and Tk 5,500 for six hours (8am to 2pm or 2pm to 8pm.).

Cultural activists have expressed their happiness with the renovation work but demanded reopening of the auditorium as soon as possible.

"If it remains closed during the winter, there will be a serious venue crisis for cultural events," said Akteruzzaman, general secretary of Somoy Nattyagosthy.
