No protocol given to him on arrival from France; meeting with Babar denied; Ashraful Huda to continue as acting IGP

The government yesterday removed Inspector General of Police (IGP) Shahudul Haque from office after his conviction for contempt of court

His replacement was not amounced until yesterday evening, but home ministry officials said it may take a few days. Ashraful Huda, acting IGP and commissioner of Dhaka Metropolitan Police, has been asked to continue in office.

Shahudul has now been removed three times from job since independence. The Awami League (AL) government during its 1972-75 rule stripped him of his army job for his

impose duties on textile and

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controversial role during the Liberation War and sent him into forced retirement. Former president Ziaur Rahman absorbed him in the police later, but the last AL government again forced him to retire.

Shahudul, who flew in Dhaka yesterday morning from France after a weeklong overseas trip, was told at Zia International Airport not to go to his office, sources said.

No flag car went to receive him at the airport and he was provided with no protocol. A police car drove him to his government house at Minto Road. Officials at the home ministry

said Shahudul was handed a law ministry notification that said he stood dismissed from the day of his

conviction.

He later tried to meet State Minister for Home Lutfozzaman Babar, but was refused a meeting, the sources added.

"I got no orders," Shahudul told The Daily Star by phone last night when asked whether he had received his removal orders.

He refused to comment, when asked, on the High Court verdict and only said, "I will talk (about the matter) after consulting my lawyer."

Well-placed sources said the home ministry at a meeting Sunday night decided to cancel his contract in line with a law ministry observation that Shahudul is no more


