

## Construction of 'heritage park' begins next month

The planned 'heritage park' Mini Bangladesh, first of its kind in the country, is set to represent our heritage, the engineers who designed the project said.

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia is expected to inaugurate the construction work of the project next month.

The liberation war affairs ministry had decided to construct the park after the name of late President Ziaur Rahman. Later, it was renamed as 'Shaheed Zia Memorial Complex and Mini Bangladesh.'

Those who interested in enjoying the country's architectural beauty, ethnic traditions and archaeological inheritance will be able to materialise their dream very shortly having a glimpse of the 'heritage park', the officials claimed.

Historical Kalurghat Betar Kendra (Kalurghat Radio Station) from where independence was proclaimed in 1971 is now almost ready to encompass the park.

The ministry has chosen the site for developing the park at a cost of Tk55.95 crore to conserve the historical radio station as an evidence of War of Liberation for the future generation, he said. The

Executive Committee of National Economic Council (Ecne) approved the project.

The then Awami League leader MA Hannan and late President Ziaur Rahman on behalf of the Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman had proclaimed the independence from the radio station on March 26 and 27 respectively in 1971.

Concord Engineering and Construction Limited, a private construction firm, will implement the project under the supervision of Public Works Department in two years.

"The objective of the park is to show the entire Bangladesh at a glance," said site engineer Saidur Rahman. "Eventually it will become a live museum with the architectural and archaeological legacy of the country," he added.

In the preface of the project was underlined that the initiative has been taken to construct a memorial complex after the name of late President Ziaur Rahman at the historical Kalurghat Betar Kendra.

Replica of major structures of the country, including Jatiya Sangsad Bhaban (parliament building), National Memorial of Savar, Ahsan Manjil, Curzon Hall of Dhaka University, Paharpur Monastery, Kamtaji Temple of

Dinajpur, Lalbag Fort and Sona Masjid, will be installed at the park.

Under the project, Kalurghat Betar Kendra studio from where the proclamation of independence came and the technical equipment will be decorated and furnished.

Besides, model of three railway stations, Church of Saint Nicholas of Gazipur, Choto Kuthi and Bara Kuthi of Rajshahi along with houses containing socio-cultural rituals of 13 tribal communities will also be set up at the valley.

"A 'tower restaurant', an artificial hill, an artificial lake and a fountain will be built at the park," said Saidur Rahman.

He said that there would be special packages for the kids.

"Different rides including bumper boat, paddle boat, family coaster, 12 horses carousel, Ferris wheel, bumper car and kiddie swing will be installed", he said, adding that a tunnel under the artificial hill for train track will also be constructed.

We hope to complete the job on schedule, he added.

Concord will hand over the park to the Ministry of Liberation War Affairs after completion of the work, he said. Then the ministry will either lease it out to private sector or deal itself, sources said.

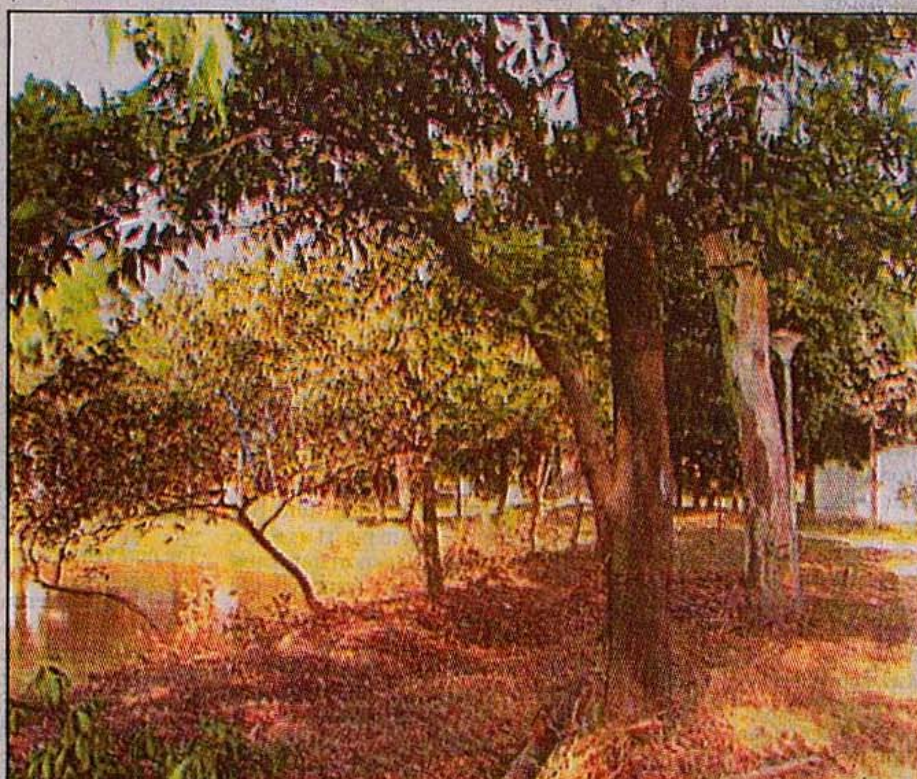

ASM Mahbubur Rahman, resident engineer of Kalurghat Betar Kendra, said that the Betar

authorities have already completed all formalities including handing over of land.

"Some 13.6 acres of land out of 27 acres owned by Betar was handed over to the Ministry of

Liberation War by the Ministry of Information to build the park", he added.

To implement the project, a good number of aged trees will be felled, sources said.

## Tale of an abandoned monument

### Madhuri Lata still whimpers for her martyred husband and relatives

Madhuri Lata sits silently every morning in the courtyard for some time with her eyes closed and prays for salvation of the departed souls of her near and dear ones killed by the Pakistani occupation forces during the War of Liberation in 1971.

She is one of millions who lost their near and dear ones during the nine months' bloodbath from March 25 to December 16 in 1971.

"The horrible war memories still haunt me terribly," the elderly woman told The Daily Star.

She looked deserted, pale and frail.

Madhuri, close to crossing 100 soon, is herself a living monument of ages who witnessed many epoch-making, historic and turbulent period as well as happenings of the immediate past century.

The slaughter ground at Jamijuri in Dohazari of Chandanaish is now virtually an abandoned and decrepit three-foot concrete wall, popularly known as 'Martyr Monument.' It is difficult to discover any remains or memoirs of the war here.

The Pakistani forces killed hundreds of innocent Bangladeshis, including women and children, at the ground in 1971.

And, 14 close relatives of Madhuri, including her husband, were slaughtered here. Thirteen others were: Master Prafullah Ranjan Bhattacharya, Kabiraj Tara Charan Bhattacharya, freedom fighter Bimal Das, Master Milan Kanti Bhattacharya, Bishweshwar Bhattacharya, Dr Karuna Chowdhury, Amar Das, Hari Ranjan Bhattacharya, freedom fighter Subhas Das, Benubala Bhattacharya, Mohendra Sen Bhattacharya, Nagendra Rani and Ramani Das.

The names of the 14 martyrs are inscribed on the monument overlooking a ramshackle semi-pucca house where two survivors,

Madhuri Lata and her only son Sunil Bhattacharya, of 1971 nightmare live. Sunil is now a doctor.

"It was 14th of Baishakh (Madhuri could not recollect the Roman date), the Pakistani forces stormed our house and opened fire indiscriminately. I was a bit fortunate and escaped hurriedly in flight along with few other women through the backyard," Madhuri narrated feebly the nightmarish experience of her life.

With tears rolling down her face she continued: "As we returned to the house after few hours of the massacre, we found

of my husband and others lying in a pool of blood."

Each family of the martyrs had received financial help once from the post-independence Awami League government.

Later, the concrete monument was built and an AL leader gave Tk 15,000 for development of the monument. But afterwards neither families of the martyred got any help from anywhere nor a single touch of masonry was seen on the monument yet. And, the monument after 33 years of independence is on the verge of complete decay.

### CCC to rehabilitate sex-workers

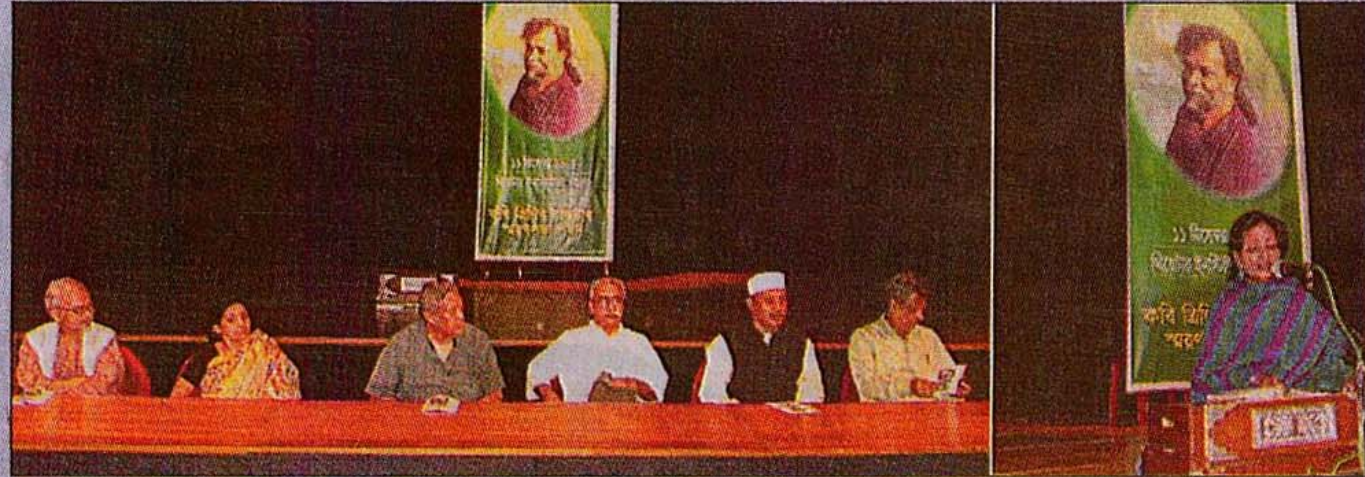
Mayor ABM Mohiuddin Chowdhury on Friday said that Chittagong City Corporation would take initiative to rehabilitate sex-workers in a planned way.
