Jobs disaster looms large

UK aid group warns

Millions of desperately poor workers, particularly women, will lose their jobs next year following the lifting of a global system of textile and clothing tariffs, a leading aid

agency warned yesterday.

Bangladesh's fledgling textile industry will be especially hit by the scrapping of the Multi-Fibre Agreement (MFA) on January 1, meaning many female workers will be forced into the sex trade instead, Christian Aid said.

"We are deeply concerned that the new year will spell misery for huge numbers of garment workers," said Andrew Pendleton, Christian SEE PAGE 11 COL 3

Knit garment exporters ready for quota-free era high-profile visit

Industrial term loans see a 62pc rise in Q1 mainly to help RMG exporters prepare for MFA phaseout

Industrial term loans soared by a staggering 62 percent in the first quarter of the current fiscal year, with the garment sector drawing the bulk of the lending to set up backward linkage and export-oriented units to face the quota-free regime. Banking sources say in the context of the post-MFA, quota-free era that demands Bangladesh invest more in the export-oriented garment sector, garment exporters have drawn the vast bulk of this Tk 2,212 crore lending in July-September, keeping up with the uptrend of the previous fiscal year.

In FY2003-04, industrial term loans marked a massive 68 percent jump from the previous year to stand at Tk 6,675 crore

Based on the lending trend, a top banker says the knitting sector has 'all-out preparations' to face the post-MFA (multi-fibre agreement) era, but the woven sector may be in for some problems.

'Investors have taken this loan [of Tk 2,212 crore] mainly to install

backward linkage industries to tackle the post-MFA situation," notes Janata Bank Managing Director SM Aminur Rahman.

Banks have provided maximum loans to help set up backward linkage industries in the knitting sector. We believe the knitting sector will not face any difficulty in the post-SEE PAGE 11 COL 7

Resist attempts to foil progress, PM tells rally

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia yesterday urged the countrymen to forge unity to face the evil attempt of those who will try to stand in the way of the ongoing nation-building

"A peaceful struggle is going on to protect the country's independence and make it meaningful. In the present perspective, those who will try to stand against this effort are the opponents of independence," she

The prime minister was address-ing a rally of children and juveniles at Bangabandhu National Stadium in the morning, marking the Victory

"Our fight is to eliminate terrorism and corruption, give democracy a strong footing, alleviate poverty and hunger, remove illiteracy and malnutrition and advance the process of development and production," she told the rally.

"We'll have to win the struggle because this is the extended form of our great Liberation War.

After 33 years of the country's independence, the perspective of pro and opponent sides has changed. Similarly, the character of struggle has also changed," she said, adding that the government is taking the struggle to that end. The prime minister said: "If we'll

not be able to pay proper respect to the martyrs of the Liberation War the spirit of independence cannot be consolidated. She said two major responsibili-

Leader of the Opposition Sheikh Hasina yesterday accused the government of undermining the spirit of victory by distorting the history of

Hasina, also the main opposition Awami League (AL) chief, was addressing a gathering of wounded freedom fighters and artistes of the Swadhin Bangla Betar Kendra at the AL's Dhanmondi office on the occa-sion of the 34th Victory Day.

"The four-party alliance govern-ment is trying to terminate the glory

of the hard-won victory the people achieved under the leadership of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib," she

Hasina recalled the steps the AL took while in power for the freedom fighters that include burial in state honour and 30 percent quota in government jobs for their children.

She alleged the BNP-Jamaat-led alliance is firing the freedom fight-ers' children from jobs since it came

to power.

She blasted the government for its politics of double standards—establishing the Ministry of Liberation War Affairs and appointing war criminals and Rajakars as ministers at the same time.

"The BNP came to power with the help of Jamaat-e-Islami, who opposed the Liberation War and was involved in the killings of innocent people and the intellectuals," she added. Artistes Abdul Jabbar, Moloy

The nation yesterday celebrated the 34th Victory Day paying glowing tributes to the heroes of the Liberation War and taking fresh vows to work for a prosperous

"Our fight is to eliminate terror-ism and corruption, give democracy a strong footing, alleviate poverty and hunger, remove ill-heath, illiteracy and malnutrition, and advance the process of development and production," Prime Minister Khaleda Zia told a children's rally organised to mark the

"For this we need a stable environment. We will have to win this battle, because this struggle is the extended form of our great LiberationWar," she said.

On December 16, 1971, the Pakistani occupation forces surrendered to the joint command of Indian Army and Bangladeshi freedom fighters at the then Race Course (now Suhrawardy Udyan) Maidan in Dhaka after a ninemonth bloody war for independence of the country.

The day commenced with a 31gun salute to the Liberation War heroes fired from the old airport ground. National flags were hoisted atop all government, semigovernment and other important

establishments. Most of the government build-ings, hotels and high-rise structures were illuminated with lights while the main streets of the capital wore a festive look with national flags flying

at almost all the corners. Thousands of people from different walks of life assembled at the ; ists were injured in the attack. And SEE PAGE 11 COL 1

Police yesterday arrested two of the four BNP men accused of gangraping a woman 17 years ago in lanore, while the victim, now 34, has found safe custody with Bangladesh National Women Lawyers' Association (BNWLA).


