Intellectuals from the masses


Golam Mustafa Ansari, helper at a grocery shop of Joypurhat, could not believe that he had won the second prize for his 24-line poem at the 2nd conference for working writers. Nor could his shop-owner who, on learning about his employee's talent, came all the way from Joypurhat to witness Ansari receive his prize and honour. Along with Ansari, two other working writers--M Nurul Islam, a tool-keeper of Bangladesh Railway from Ishwardi, Pabna, and Aktaruzzaman Rakib, a timber businessman--were also bestowed the rare honour of their life for literary feat at the confer-

Organised by the People's Empowerment Trust (PET), the event took place at the Shawkat Osman Auditorium of the Public Library on December 23. Chief Justice Muhammad Habibur Rahman was the chief guest at the prize-giving ceremony.

A total of 95 working people from 59 districts participated in this exceptional competition. Headed by eminent educationist Sardar Fazlul Karim, a jury board comprising Professor Ahmed Kamal, Biswajit Ghosh, Syed Azizul Haque, MM Akash and rickshawpuller Abdul Motaleb Akand selected 51 pieces of original literary works--stories, plays, poems, biographies and essays--by people

living mainly by physical labour. 'The last person was the first place winner of our last year's competition,' says Shishir Shil, covenor of this year's conference.

'Anyone from travelling Baul singers to landless peasants, rural homeopath doctors to rickshawvan pullers, chatpati vendors to the fourth class employees at government offices, whoever has a monthly earning less than Tk. 3000, can participate in this project,' maintains MM Akash, founder chairperson of PET, explaining the 'working writers'. But how were the organisers sure of a participator's identity as a working writer? 'For further scrutiny, this

year we requested the participants to submit, if possible, a copy of their biodata and a photograph. Moreover, the language and spelling in their writings, their subjects and technology used for submission of the write-ups also helped us understand the social status of the writers, says Akash.

A collection, titled Srishti, containing the 51 selected write-ups was brought out on the occasion. Apart from the prize-winners, the writers include people literally from all walks of life: a retired sugar-mill worker Azizur Rahman Badal from Joypurhat, a storemanger MA Salam from Chittagong, a seamstress Rubina Mamtaz from Gazipur, a private tutor Nurul Haque Dhali from

Hossain and many more. The titles as well as the literary works reflect deep insight and intellect of these under-privileged writers. The first prize winner story is named Nikhojer Khojey (In Search of the Lost) while the two winner poems are titled *Potakay Mishey Jaay* (Merging into the Flag) and *Shoubhaggyo* (Good Fortune).

'We may not have been ale to reach innumerable working people with literary talents; for, there might have been some who could not afford to buy the paper and ink for writing or the cost of sending their writing to us by mail. But we are working on how to overcome these obstacles and extend the reach of our project,' concludes an

tain, demonstrating how social and cultural diversities have contributed to American music's evolution. The BilliTones duo recreate the sounds of classic rock band using five instruments between them, including synthesisers, harmonicas and percussion, in addition to their tight vocal harmonies. Compact and self-contained, they play a varied mix of rock n' roll, Motown, World Beat, and Rhythm n' Blues for a variety of audiences, occa-

Inspired by the rock n' rollers of the 1950s and 1960s, Billy began playing blues and country harmonica in college, and began technologydriven solo performances in the early 1980s, becoming a veritable 'Modern-Day One-man Band'. His custom array of keyboards, harmonicas, drum machines and effects made it possible to tour for the US State Department's office of cul-

Toni joined Billy on stage in 1993. Her lead and harmony vocals, as well as her balanced hand with a vocal harmoniser, contributes to the illusion of a

much larger group.

*Both Billy and Toni contribute to the spoken portions of their programmes, providing historical context for understanding the development of American music and its global influence. From spirituals to blues, ragtime to swing, country to rock, and reggae to rap, a BilliTones programme makes clear the process of emulation and innovaion which underlies the creativity of American musicians, past and present.

By focusing on the interaction between black and white musicians and audiences, Billy and Toni explain how mutual inspiration spurred the creation of each major genre of American music. From Stephen Foster to the Beatles and from Elvis to Eminem, Billy and Toni show how every generation creates their own new music.

As youth movements sprang up across the globe, often united by a passion for anything American, new forms of 'World Music' evolved. Billy and Toni demonstrate that with its message of peace, freedom and social justice.






Tareq said, 'We missed the Dhaka Drama Festival-2004 because our group members were preoccupied with in other activities. Now, we are

Dr Abdul Moyeen Khan, Minister of Information and Communication Technology, speaking at the inauguration of the first Bangla biographical website on Shakespeare at the British Council, said that Shakespeare is known all over the world. He said that that he himself, at the secondary school level was eager to know about Shakespeare 45 years ago when he was given a gift of the complete works of Shakespeare. He also wanted to emulate the great writer in his power of speech. Even as a student of science, Shakespeare had been a part of his curriculum as a basic training to open up the minds. Now that the students have the website, the world is at their fingertips. After 450 years, Shakespeare's name is now a part of a Bangla website, Dr Moyeen Khan pointed out. When a piece of culture crosses time and geography, like Shake-speare's works, it becomes immortal, he said. With literature, he concluded, one not only learns but feels.

Harry KThomas, the US Ambassador, speaking on the occasion, said that he was delighted with the Bangladeshi website project, as now many will learn to love Shakespeare. He pointed out that Shakespeare's love of common speech helped shape the English language. He said that Shakespeare happened to be his favourite author.
