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Anti-poverty plan sees lower export growth

Despite a 15 percent export growth achieved in the last fiscal year (FY), the draft Poverty Reduction Strategy Paper (PRSP) projects only an 8 percent growth for the current FY, apprehending adverse impact of the nase-out of Multi-fibre Agreement

The PRSP has even lower export growth estimates, of 6 percent and 7 ercent, for FY 2005-06 and FY07 in he quota-free regime.

The authors of the paper however hold the low projections to be realistic' and say, even with such

have a 6.5 percent GDP (gross domestic product) growth in FY07.

The national steering committee on the PRSP at a press briefing yesterday said, considering the economic realities, they have designed a realistic poverty allevia-

tion plan.
"If we follow this plan efficiently, avoiding wastage, it will take the nation out of poverty by 2015," said Kamal Siddiqui, chairman of the committee and principal secretary to the prime minister. "We have prepared this document on our own. There is no donor prescription

"It is not ambitious, it is doable," said Finance Secretary Zakir Ahmed Khan, one of the committee mem-

Another committee member explained the reason for the lowered export targets: "As there is an uncertainty about our export opportunities in the post-MFA regime, we had to be realistic and conservative. If we fare better, it is great for us."

Prompted by a question on whether the PRSP recommends any measures to curb corruption, committee member Hossain Zillur Rahman, an economist, said, "We

will reduce corruption in multiple sectors. Corruption is an offshoot of lack of good governance and the PRSP aims at improving gover-

The country on an average achieved a 5 percent annual GDP growth in the last decade, but, at the same time, social inequity widened. pointed out reporters, and asked whether the PRSP would address this issue.

ACC move on 'missing' Gas crisis set to cars irks secretaries

A section of the secretaries asked by the Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) to explain the reported irregular usage of 1,028 vehicles say it is wrong for the commission to make the sweeping implication that corrupt officials have gobbled up

They find the ACC letter "disappointing", because they say the vehicles in question have not been "gobbled up illegally by any official". One of them says, "All the vehicles are being used by officials at the ministries. Those did not get disappeared into thin air."

The ACC in a letter on Saturday asked 13 ministries to report and

explain the whereabouts of the vehicles purchased under different government development projects etween 1995 and 2001.

A secretary requesting anonymity maintains, "This is a comparatively small-scale irregularity. Of course it needs to be addressed. But there are much bigger issues, bigger corruption in the government and the press is reporting them, too."

The commission's move followed a press report, according to which, after completion of the projects, the vehicles had not been deposited to the central transport pool as per the rule

The present dip in supply of natural gas is set to dog the country throughout this year and turn into a full-blown national crisis later in the summer, fear experts.

The production of natural gas starts to decline in every winter as supply pipelines lose efficiency in low temperature, but the crisis may become unbearable this year against a backdrop of significant rise in demand and shortfall in supply.

An alarming depletion of reserve at offshore Sangu field recently further compounded the problems

of energy sector. Petrobangla is now supplying maximum 1,310 million cubic feet a day (mmcfd) against a natural gas demand of 1,360mmcfd.

Though the gas production is to go up with the operation of Unocal's Moulavibazar field in March, this fresh 70mmcfd output can not be pumped in to the national grid this year for lack of pipeline from Ashuganj to Elenga.

Petrobangla, which contributes over Tk 2,500 crore to the national exchequer annually, planned to set up the 37km pipeline on urgent basis, but the Tk 150 crore project SEE PAGE 11 COL 1

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
