

## Edu undecided

Brazil midfielder Edu's future at Arsenal could be decided this week with the English champions stalling over offering him a new contract.

Edu's contract expires in the summer and he has been linked with Spanish trio Real Madrid, Barcelona and Valencia.

"I'm not sure if I want to stay or not because the club have let the situation go on this far," the 26-year-old told BBC Sport.

"If they had really wanted to sign they should have come up with an offer six months before indicating they wanted to sign me and that's mad as hell."

Edu's brother and representative Amadeo Fensao has said that Arsenal's current offer was well short of what he was seeking.

Edu added: "My brother is due to come to London on Thursday. There is a meeting planned for 6 or 7 January to sort it out with Arsenal."

"Now I have a choice to stay or go. I want to sort it out as soon as possible, that's in the best interests of both the club and myself."

"I'm going to make my decision after the meeting later this week."

But he said he was encouraged by manager Arsene Wenger's support.

"I still have a good relationship with Arsene Wenger - he's always said he wants me to sign."

Edu is able to begin negotiations with other clubs because FIFA regulations allow players to start talks six months before their contracts expire.

The midfielder, who broke in to the Brazil side in 2004, admitted he had been flattered to have been linked with the three Spanish giants.

"I've just heard stories from the news that the Madrid president Florentino Perez, the Valencia people, as well as Barcelona are interested. That's nice, but I've never talked to them, so I can't say they want me sign 100 percent," he said.

Saints stay in  
trouble

Former England striker Kevin Phillips was on target twice but Southampton had to settle for a point in a 3-3 draw with Fulham on Wednesday which left the Saints still rooted in relegation trouble.

It was only Southampton's second point from the hectic four-match Christmas schedule and it also left manager Harry Redknapp, whose son Jamie was making his debut, waiting for his first victory.

"It was a good entertaining match with chances created at both ends - but we're disappointed, because it's a game we wanted to win," said Phillips.

"We showed a lot of courage but couldn't hang on to the lead. We have to keep taking the positives from each game and keep working hard."

"The manager has brought in two quality players (Jamie Redknapp and Calum Davenport) - but we need to get more points on the board."

In a thrilling first-half, Fulham snatched the lead in the 20th minute when Papa Bouba Diop edged a free-kick from Mark Pembroke past Antti Niemi in the Southampton goal.

But within 50 seconds of the restart, the Saints were level when Phillips beat the offside trap to head home a cross from Fabrice Fernandes.

Eight minutes later Phillips was on target again to give Southampton the lead.

Fulham striker Tomasz Radzinski was caught in possession by Jamie Redknapp who released Phillips. The former England man then nipped past the challenges of Zeshan Rehman and Zat Knight to curl a low shot past Edwin van der Sar in the Fulham goal from 18 yards.

However, the Londoners were level just two minutes before half-time when Niemi parried a Luis Boa Morte drive which fell to Steed Malbranque who volleyed home from 15 yards.

Fulham then went looking for the lead and Radzinski made up for his earlier error by firing his team in front five minutes into the second half.

Boa Morte took the ball off Redknapp and Radzinski finished off his team's quick break with a clinical finish to register his fourth goal in the last five games.

Collins John then had a chance to make it 4-2 but Niemi saved with his legs.

Incredibly, the Saints made the most of their good fortune by pulling themselves level again in the 71st minute.

Anders Svensson hit a low cross from the left where Liam Rosenior, under pressure from Peter Crouch, turned the ball into his own net.

## Six minutes are enough

Real Madrid and Real Sociedad managed to finish their match almost a month after they started, and the hosts made the most of their second chance by grabbing a late winner for a 2-1 victory here on Wednesday.

Goals from Ronaldo and Nihat Kahveci had left both sides level pegging when the match had to be suspended on December 12, but a Zinedine Zidane penalty gave Madrid coach Wanderley Luxemburgo a winning start at his new club.

The two teams played out the final 2 mins 40 secs of regulation time and another four minutes of injury time on Wednesday after referee Vicente Lizondo Cortes had no choice but to call a halt first time around after an apparent bomb threat from the Basque nationalist group ETA.

"We showed complete concentration and great motivation," said Luxemburgo after the bizarre finale, which saw Real Sociedad make a round trip of 700 miles for just a few

minutes of football and only to return empty-handed.

Luxemburgo decided to unnerve the visitors and throw everything at the San Sebastian side from the outset, in a game started by a goal kick from Real Sociedad goalkeeper Asier Riesgo.

"But don't expect every game to be like this. The next game will not be like this," added Luxemburgo, whose team face Atletico Madrid in the local derby on Sunday.

"However, as a team, we are playing well together and my philosophy is always to win," added the former Brazilian national coach, who only joined Real Madrid on Thursday.

Luxemburgo opted to start with

Fernando Morientes alongside Ronaldo rather than England striker Michael Owen.

It looked like an inspired decision when the unsettled Spanish international, who had not started a game all season, had the first Real chance after barely two minutes.

Riesgo managed to save his side on that occasion but the constant pressure forced Sociedad defender Mikel Labaka to bundle Ronaldo to the ground a minute into injury time, and Zidane stepped up to convert from the spot.

"The way we played here, we could win the league, the Champions League and the cup," bragged Luxemburgo.

Real Madrid created their chances and we couldn't have done anymore. I had the feeling we were going to be struck by an avalanche," conceded Real Sociedad coach Jose Maria Amorrotu.

Real Madrid climb two places to third and now have 32 points from 17 games ahead of their local derby against Atletico on Sunday.

However, the 29-times Spanish champions are still 10 points behind their arch rivals and runaway league leaders Barcelona.

The match was played out in

front of 15,000 curious spectators, who had been let in for free, in contrast to the 70,000 that had packed the Bernabeu for the original game.

Chelsea wooing  
teenagers?

Portuguese side Sporting Lisbon said Wednesday they would file a formal protest to FIFA about an alleged approach by Chelsea for three of its 15-year-old trainees.

The Lisbon-based club accused the English Premiership leaders in a statement posted on its website of "trying to recruit the players by ignoring the most elementary FIFA rules."

Sporting said it was aware that the three players -- Adrien Silva, Fabio Ferreira and Ricardo Fernandes -- had been training with Chelsea without proper authorization.

Portuguese sports daily "O Jogo" reported Tuesday that the three players, who had not yet signed a formal contract to pursue training with Sporting, were poised to join Chelsea.

If the complaint goes ahead it will be the second time in the last year that a Portuguese club has filed a complaint with the world's football governing body over Chelsea's recruitment tactics.

In April 2004 European Champions FC Porto filed a formal protest to FIFA over Chelsea's efforts to woo the club's coach Jose Mourinho.

The Portuguese coach signed with the London team in June.

## No regrets!

The linesman at the controversy over the Tottenham 'goal which never was' insisted he had no regrets over the embarrassing blunder.

Rob Lewis said there was no way that he could be sure Manchester United goalkeeper Roy Carroll had dropped the ball over his own line as the player scrambled to catch a long-range effort from Pedro Mendes in the 0-0 draw at Old Trafford on Tuesday. Lewis, 35, insisted there was no way he could be certain the ball had crossed the line because seconds before the incident, he was halfway up the pitch in line with the United defence.

"I was doing my primary job, which was to stand in line with the last defender and watch for offside," Lewis told the Shropshire Star newspaper.

"I pride myself on being relatively fast over a short distance but by the time the ball landed, I was still 25 yards away from goal and it was impossible from that distance to judge if it had crossed the line."

"I could not have guessed because you have to be 100% sure on such important decisions."

"I am disappointed because I always like to get decisions right. But I

have thought about it a lot since the incident and there was nothing I could have done differently - apart from run faster than (former British sprinter) Linford Christie."

Carroll and Lewis's combined blunder has re-opened the debate about whether video technology should be used to rule on such decisions in the future.

The issue is due to be discussed at an International Football Association Board meeting in Cardiff on February 26.

And with the Football Association and their Scottish and Irish counterparts all set to vote in favour of trialling a new ball containing a microchip which can determine whether it has crossed the line within seconds, it seems certain some kind of extended experiment will be sanctioned in the near future.

It would be a move welcomed by Lewis, especially if it saves him from another nightmare moment.

His next appointment comes on Friday at Turf Moor, when he will run the line in the FA Cup third round tie between Burnley and Liverpool.

"My view, and I think it is shared by most referees, is that for matter of fact issues like whether the ball has crossed the line, technology should be introduced," said Lewis.

"Any decision where the law states 'in the opinion of' should be left as they are."

Maradona  
back in Cuba

Diego Maradona returned to Cuba to continue drug addiction treatment on Wednesday after defying doctor's orders and taking a month-long Christmas break with his family in Argentina.

"He went this morning," Maradona's lawyer Roberto Damboriana told Reuters. "He's going to resume the treatment and study some offers he's received from Spanish television."

Maradona has been undergoing treatment for his addiction to cocaine since September, five

months after spending 10 days in the intensive care unit of a Buenos Aires hospital with heart and breathing problems.

Although he had spent much of the last four years at a spa on the Caribbean island, he has been subjected to a much stricter regime in his latest bout of treatment.

Maradona appeared on several television shows during the last month where he seemed to be in good spirits.

"I always said we were going to see another Diego, a different Diego, because he has not been consuming drugs," Damboriana said.

Maradona's doctor Alfredo Cabe said in November he opposed the ex-Argentina captain's decision to interrupt the treatment.

## Becks' BMW makes a fortune

A 1997 BMW car once owned by England football captain David Beckham has sold for more than 90,000 pounds (128,000 euros, 170,000 dollars) on eBay -- to the dismay of the man who sold it two

months ago for less than a fifth of that. Businessman John Pearson said Wednesday that the realisation of how much money he had lost was "like winning a small lottery jackpot and losing the ticket."

The BMW M3 convertible, bought by Beckham for 42,000 pounds during his first full season at Manchester United in 1997, sparked a bidding war on Internet auction site eBay, receiving 140 bids.

It eventually sold to an anonymous buyer for 90,100 pounds, compared to the 16,000 Pearson received when he sold it privately two months ago.

Pearson said he had spoken to several car dealers who told him the blue BMW was only worth a little more than 12,000 pounds despite its illustrious former owner, now with Real Madrid.

Despite getting 60 calls as soon as

he advertised the car, Pearson said he had opted to sell the vehicle to the first person who came up with the cash.

"I'm pretty annoyed. If I'd have known I would never have let it go for that price. You just have to learn from these things," he said.

"I will follow my own instincts in future and I've written those BMW dealers off my Christmas list, that's for sure."
