Traffic police get serious about jaywalkers

Traffic police have started fining pedestrians who violate traffic laws on the stretch of the road from Farmgate to Hotel Sonargaon crossing.

The drive, which began about two weeks ago, was initiated to generate awareness among the general public.

"We are trying to cure the tendency of the city dweller to disobey traffic rules," said on duty constable Abul Khair of Tejgaon police station. According to Section 12 of the Motor Vehicles Ordinance, 1983, traffic police can fine pedestrians for violating traffic laws.

Traffic policemen in civil clothes have been posted at various points on either sides of the road to spot the violators as they try to cross to the other side over the road divider which is not allowed.

A soon as someone commits the offence a policeman approaches him and takes him to the on-duty sergeant writes a receipt with an official stamp on it and

"Over the past few days, we have continuously requested people whom we have fined to use the over-bridges or the underpass for their own safety," said sergeant Altaf Hossain of Tejgaon Police

According to Sgt. Hossain, all kinds of people disobey the law but interestingly, most violators are educated persons.

"Due to the ego factor, most of them prefer to argue rather than pay the fine," said Hossain.

When someone refuses to pay up, he is detained on the spot for half an hour or taken to the police station where he is later handed over to family members.

Sgt. Hossain feels that the average rate of traffic law violation on this particular stretch was gradually decreasing since the initiation of the drive.

'Yesterday, we had fined 600 people while today, the number has come down to 500," said Hossain.


Recently, when the Karwan Bazar underpass was undergoing renovations, people were allowed to cross the busy road

But now the underpass has been reopened to the public and there are a couple of foot over-bridges in the Farmgate area. Still people tend to cross over the

"We always put up fences in order to restrain such activities but the violators still cross the road by uprooting the wire or fencing," said a traffic policeman.

"We took up the initiative to partially solve a major traffic problem of the city," said Mazharul Islam, deputy commissioner (West) of Dhaka Metropolitan

"Hopefully this initiative will lead to further improvement in traffic systems in other areas and will also generate awareness among members of the community and the police force," added Islam.

Rajuk under pressure

Managing approvals with back dates, landowners aided by some dishonest Rajuk officials are constructing buildings in the city.

But high officials of Rajuk said they could not take actions against the perpetrators as they lack a proper monitoring cell to look into the issue.

'Our hands are tied because those who are constructing buildings illegally are very influential," said a board member of Rajuk.

Sources in the Rajuk said that a section of its officials were engaged in managing approvals and clearances from concerned denartments for constructing buildings in Dhaka. Although most of the approved designs are adapted as per building construction rules, it is alleged that the designs go through drastic changes when buildings are con-

"On paper, there are very few buildings which violate the building construction act. But the reality is totally different," a senior Rajuk official said.

"We are helpless against the violators especially against those who have influence in the society. They are so powerful that they can even have our jobs terminated or can harass us professionally," he

Rajuk officials said that a number of cases have been filed

against people who violated construction rules. Rajuk last month filed a case against a company owned by a prominent businessman charging it of filling up a part of the Gulshan Lake in Mohakhali. A good number of buildings were also identified that have been built in violation of the construction act. Rajuk issued letters asking the persons concerned to go by the rules or face demolition of the structures.

'If Rajuk could demolish even one single building, it would have discouraged a lot of people who violate the rules," said Rajuk's chief engineer M Emdadul Islam.

According to Rajuk's building laws, high rises are not allowed where adjacent roads are not atleast 25 feet wide. But in Dhaka, multistoried buildings have gone up even in areas with just nine feet wide road network.

Constructing a new building now requires meeting nearly forty conditions that include the building's height, road network, environment, parking space and clearances from utility service

Getting clearance from all concerned departments take

more than six months. Moreover, we are forced to bribe people at every stage of the clearance process. Even then the approval remains uncertain," said Motahar Hossain, a landowner of

It has been alleged that corrupt officials and middlemen in Rajuk get clearances from the utility agencies and the department of environment by sharing bribe money and sometimes they even supply fake clearances.
"We have found some fake

clearances with forged signatures but we do not know who are behind this forgery," said Islam. Recently Rajuk suspended

investigation into how certain buildings could be raised without approval. Rajuk had submitted complaints against 86 buildings in the city to the recently abolished Anti Corruption Bureau (ACB) for investigation as they were not erected with the approval from Rajuk. But the ACB did not take any action against the owners of those buildings. The files have now been transferred to the newly formed Anti Corruption Commission (ACC). "We could not take any mea-

sures against the unapproved buildings because of a corrupt circle which includes Rajuk officials and law enforcement officers," said Emdadul Islam.
