

# Matthew after Marcus

Cricket

Matthew Hoggard took the first five South African wickets to give England a chance of winning the fourth Test at the Wanderers Stadium here on Monday.

South Africa were 98 for five at tea on the fifth and final day, with 38 overs remaining. They had been set to make 325 to win in 68 overs.

Captain Graeme Smith, advised not to bat by a doctor after suffering concussion when he was hit on the head by a ball at fielding practice before play on the fourth day, had not yet appeared for South Africa.

Herschelle Gibbs, his regular opening partner, was again the anchor of the South African innings, following his 161 in the first innings with an unbeaten 65.

Opening batsman Marcus Trescothick hit a magnificent 180 as England made 332 for nine declared in their second innings.

Hoggard, who took five for 144 in the first innings, had figures of five for 30 at tea to complete his first ten-wicket haul in Tests.

He made his first breakthrough when he had stand-in opening batsman AB de Villiers leg before with the first ball of his third over.

Then he took two wickets with successive balls at the start of his fifth over, bowling Jacques Rudolph with a delivery which swung into the left-hander and having star batsman Jacques Kallis caught at first slip first ball for nought.

Hoggard took three for 22 in an eight-over opening spell. When he returned to the attack shortly before tea he struck with his third ball, having Boeta Dippenaar caught in the gully, ending a 62-run fourth wicket stand between Gibbs and Dippenaar.

In his next over Hoggard had Mark Boucher caught behind.

Gibbs, meanwhile, timed the ball well and hit 12 fours in a composed innings. When he was on 63 he reached 5000 runs in Tests.

Trescothick's 180 was made off

248 balls. His innings included 24 fours and eight sixes. With a declaration imminent, Trescothick thrashed his last 52 runs off 35 balls in a ninth wicket partnership of 58 with Steve Harmison, who contributed just three to the stand.

Trescothick was finally out when he charged down the pitch at Makhaya Ntini, bowling with the second new ball, and edged a catch to wicketkeeper Boucher.

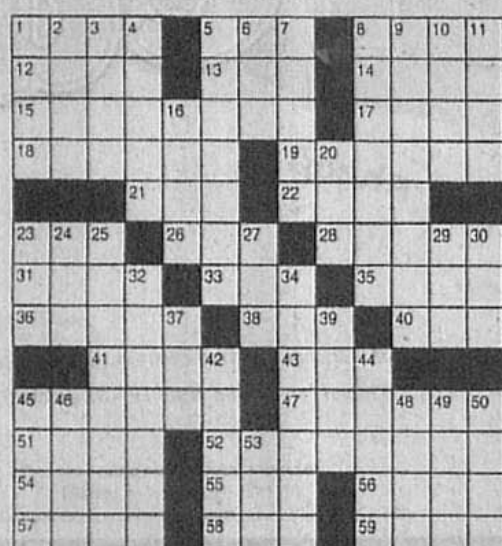

## ACC in venue dilemma

Asian cricket chiefs were Monday exploring alternative venues for next month's one-day international for tsunami victims following the Indian government's silence on whether proceeds from the game would be exempt from tax.

The Indian government collects tax from gate receipts for all international cricket matches played in the country, but officials pleaded for an exemption for the second tsunami fund-raiser, expected to be held in Calcutta in mid-February.

Asian Cricket Council (ACC) chief Jagmohan Dalmiya, who met Federal Finance Minister P Chidambaram last Tuesday to seek tax exemption, said there had been no reply from the government and time was fast running out.

"It is a pre-condition of the International Cricket Council (ICC) that no tax should be levied on what is essentially a fund-raiser," said Dalmiya.

"We need time to organise the match. If there is no response from the government by Monday evening, we will look at other venues."

The Gaddafi Stadium in Lahore, Pakistan and the Bangabandhu national stadium in the Bangladeshi capital of Dhaka were on the short-list, Dalmiya said, although neither venue could match the 90,000 seating capacity of Calcutta's Eden Gardens.

The first of the two fund-raising matches was played in Melbourne on January 10 between Asia and the Rest of the World teams and generated 11 million dollars in revenue.

The second match between the same teams will be held between February 11-13 so that star players from Australia and New Zealand can be accommodated in the world team, officials said.

Australia are due to begin a tour of New Zealand on February 17.

It was earlier proposed to hold the match on February 15 or 16 to take in players from England and South Africa, who will be busy till February 13, but organisers decided to pitch in for what they perceive is the greater star appeal of Australians like captain Ricky Ponting, Adam Gilchrist and Glenn McGrath and New Zealanders Chris Cairns and Stephen Fleming.

# Federer, Serena breeze thru'

Australian Open

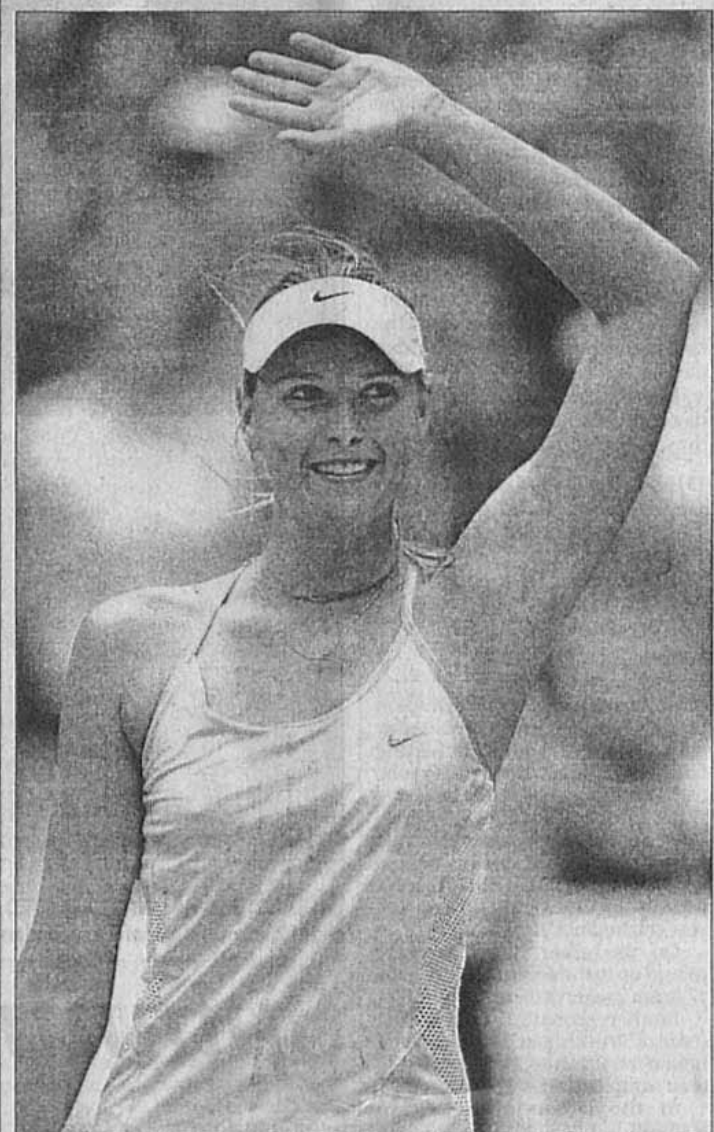

World number one Roger Federer and women's favourite Serena Williams led the way into the Australian Open second round Monday as Spanish star Carlos Moya tumbled out in a shock defeat.

Federer -- the overwhelming

Elsewhere, Russia's teenage Wimbledon champion Maria Sharapova was made to work before registering a 6-3, 6-1 victory over Bulgaria's Sesil Karantcheva.

Although she was never in danger of losing, fourth seed Sharapova was tested by a 15-year-old opponent who stretched her to three sets in the Bulgarian's debut tournament at Indian Wells last March.

"You know, I just played a good, solid first-round match," Sharapova said.

"Like I've said before, I cannot win everything. I'm still developing my game. It's not that I won a Grand Slam and all of a sudden I'm going to win everything... My game is still a work in progress."

Later, Mauresmo overcame a spirited display from local hope Samantha Stosur before winning 6-2, 6-3 in 1hr 8min.

A runner-up here in 1999, Mauresmo now faces Russia's Dinara Safina in the second round and was happy with her form as she sets out once again for a first-ever Grand Slam title.

"I really felt my game right from the beginning was consistent, and I didn't let her really get into her rhythm and finish the points pretty quickly, as she loves to do," Mauresmo said.

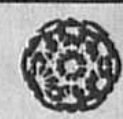
