# Tigers' maiden Test series scalp

### Nafees hits composed century as hosts enforce draw

Mission accomplished. Bangladesh won their first Test series when they drew the second and final match against Zimbabwe at the Bangabandhu National Stadium

The historic result was made possible because of a magnificent century by Nafees Iqbal, who shattered Zimbabwe's hopes of squaring the series with a flawless 121 under pressure.

The 20-year-old opener could not think of a better time to score a maiden Test hundred as the Tigers, resuming on 98-0 on the fifth and final day, eventually finished on 285-5 when play stopped five overs before the end

Bangladesh take the series 1-0 after defeating Zimbabwe by 226 runs for their historic first-ever Test victory at Chittagong on January 10.

Needing another 276 runs on the final day, the home side, set a stiff target of 374 to win, never entertained any thought of chasing down those runs despite Nafees and his overnight opening partner Javed Omar producing a record first wicket stand of 133 runs.

The pair scored a single off the first ball of the day but waited a further half an hour to take the score past the 100-mark.

Javed Omar scored a patient 43 off 258 balls but once the experienced right-hander tried to play an attacking stroke for a change, he succeeded only to offer a tame catch at point to Brendan Taylor off legspinner Graeme Cremer. But by the time he was out Bangladesh had passed an important phase as the openers had seen off 83 overs.



## Bapex finds new gas field in Comilla

Bangladesh Petroleum Exploration Company (Bapex) yesterday discov-ered a gas field in Srikail village of Muradnagar upazila in Comilla.

Bapex started drilling in the Srikail gas field on April 25, 2003 and succeeded yesterday in discovering gas primarily estimated at approximately 200 mmcf.

The discovery of the new field brings the country's total number of gas fields to 24.

The good news in the country's energy sector comes at a time when household gas users are everyday bearing the brunt of an acute gas crisis.

AKM Mosharraf Hossain, state minister for energy and mineral resources, announced the gas field discovery to newsmen yesterday and expressed the hope that the current gas crisis would ease within

### ACC wants five new directors

The Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) will ask the government for the appointment of five directors at the commission on deputation after the withdrawal of the five directors of the now-defunct Bureau of Anti-Corruption (Bac).

The commission on January 15 asked the government for an imme-diate withdrawal of the five ex-Bac officials saying it was facing immense difficulties in its smooth functioning.

Sources said the establishment ministry yesterday sent the commissions's proposal to the Prime Minister's Office for approval.


### **Islamists** attacked Jatra, says arrestee
