



Dhaka summit to focus on trade, terrorism

Saarc nations finalise programmes

The Dhaka Declaration at the 13th Saarc Summit is likely to include ways to increase regional trade through Saarc and a greater focus on implementing regional projects and finding out potential areas of economic co-operation.

Advisor to the Foreign ministry

Reaz Rahman said this while briefing newsmen about the programme for the summit which was finalised yesterday.

The Dhaka Declaration may also include ways to stop financing of terrorist activities within the region under the additional protocol on terrorism and the social charter on the rights of individuals, both signed

at the 12th summit in Islamabad.

The programme for the seven-nation 13th South Asian Association for Regional Co-operation (Saarc) Summit, to be held on February 6 and 7, was finalised after all member states okayed the draft programme proposed by Dhaka last Saturday.

Rahman said the Saarc cultural festival, planned on the summit

sidelines, has been cancelled as the summit would carry a sombre tone following the Asian Tsunami that devastated three Saarc countries and forced the hosts to postpone it.

The summit was originally scheduled for January 9-11 but postponed after the December 26 tsunami. Later, the member



AGENCIES, Arafat

Saudi Arabia's grand mufti yesterday denounced during a Hajj sermon what he said were hostile campaigns against Islam, and rejected any link between religion and terrorism.

"Nation of Islam, the military, ideological, economic and media-related campaigns are led against

Islam and our nation qualified as terrorist," Sheikh Abdul Aziz al-Sheikh told some two million faithful gathered for the culmination of the annual Hajj pilgrimage on Mount Arafat, near Makkah.

The sermon in the Namera mosque on Arafat, a small plain some 250 metres (800 feet) above sea level and surrounded by high mountains, was broadcast over loud-

speakers to the camps of pilgrims in the area.

"Muslims are also qualified as backward, violators of human rights and freedom, yet Islam is a religion of justice, equity and rights," he said.

Rab seizes arms from Shibir cadre's house
Hands him over to police

Notorious Islami Chhatra Shibir cadre Akhtar Hamid, who was arrested by Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) in Dhaka on Monday, has been handed over to Maheshkhali police after the Rab seized firearms from his village home.

The elite force arrested Hamid, 38, accused in as many as 29 criminal cases, at Kakrail in the capital and brought him to Chittagong for interrogation.

Following his confessional statement, the Rab men raided his village home at Keruntali in Maheshkhali and seized five guns, 10 rifle bullets, six cartridges and two daggers.

Business climate betters, economic recovery on MCCI half-yearly review says

Business environment has improved in the last five months because of the government law and order improvement measures, a survey by the Metropolitan Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Dhaka (MCCI) confirms.

It also said increased manufacturing activities during the first half of the current fiscal year have helped the economy offset losses caused by last year's massive flooding, a top

trade body said yesterday.

"The recovery process and economic expansionary trend are expected to continue during the rest of the current fiscal year," the MCCI said in its review of the economy during July-December.

Despite the setback caused by flooding and unfavourable weather conditions, economic activities steadily picked up during July-December.

Except the agriculture sector, growth in demand for credit, disbursement of term loans, increased production of the manufacturing sector, increased imports of capital machinery, higher collection of VAT and increased credit flow to the manufacturing indicate that

Cattle prices go bullish

With only a day left for the Eid-ul-Azha, sales and purchases of sacrificial animals at the 16 makeshift cattle markets in the capital started yesterday but the prices seemed to be higher this year compared to last year's.

Traders hope the rush of buyers will increase today.

Sacrificial animals were already being bought and sold in full gear at the city's permanent cattle market at Gabtoli for the last a few days.

Cattle traders attributed the higher prices to increased cattle feed prices and transport costs.

Most traders expressed satisfaction that they could bring their cattle to Dhaka without facing the hassles of extortion on their way due to the security measures taken by the government. Some of them said however they had to pay money to police and extortionists both on the

highways and river routes.

Many traders from Kushtia, Jhenaidah and Faridpur mainly lauded the Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) for their safe journey to the capital. But several traders said they had to pay Tk 300-800 at different points on their way.

At Golapbagh makeshift cattle market, Harun-ur-Rashid from Bhangna in Faridpur said, "We had to pay additional Tk 800 at two ferry ghats and to patrol police at different points on the road."

M Mozammel Mridha, who is from Shibchar of Faridpur, said, "I had to pay Tk 400 to Tk 500 to law enforcers and others on the river route."

But another cattle trader, elderly Moniruddin Matbor, said, "This year we have come to Dhaka without facing any trouble from extortionists on the way." He lauded the Rab for this.




