

GP pacer hunt final today

Whatmore also was not pleased with the Tigers' effort so far in the one-dayers after doing so well in the two Tests that they won 1-0.



"We couldn't play up to our expectation. They (Zimbabwe) certainly played much better cricket than us and won," said the 50-year-old.

Rafique return on the cards

Veteran left-arm spinner Mohammad Rafique, who has missed the first two ODIs of the five-match series against touring Zimbabwe because of a strained hamstring, is likely to return to the squad for the last two matches.

Chief selector Faruque Ahmed said yesterday that he would meet his three fellow selectors today in Chittagong after the third game to select a 14-member squad for the last two matches.

"There is every chance of seeing Rafique back in the squad for the last games because he is now fit to play. Some other changes can't be ruled out but everything will be decided in tomorrow's meeting," Faruque told the Daily Star Sport.

Rafique also said that they were thinking of retaining left-arm spinner Enamul Haque Jr although he has been named captain of the Bangladesh A team which is scheduled to leave Dhaka on January 30 for tours to the UAE and Zimbabwe.

Bangladesh, trailing 2-0 in the ODIs, play the last two matches at the Bangabandhu National Stadium on January 29 and 31.

"Every match is important for us and that's why we will try to field our best side in the last two matches. Of course Enamul is an important member of the side and if he is selected for the last two games, he is selected for the last two games," Faruque said.

Weather worries Lara

The West Indies headed into Wednesday's triangular VB Series match against Australia fearful that foul weather might again thwart their chances of earning a crucial victory.

Captain Brian Lara said the match was a do-or-die fixture for his side, who are seeking to overcome Pakistan and gain a place in the finals of the limited-overs competition against Australia.

Lara said his bowlers needed to repeat their wicket-taking start from the previous encounter between the two sides in Brisbane last Friday.

In that match the Australians were on the ropes at 43 for 5 in reply to the West Indies' 263 for nine when the match was abandoned because of heavy rain.

"It's important that we try to maintain that focus and make sure that we get early wickets," Lara said.

But with showers and possible thunderstorms forecast for the Adelaide Oval clash on Wednesday, it may well be Australia's third straight rain-affected match.

Their nine-wicket win over Pakistan in Sydney on Sunday was also interrupted by rain.

"It seems to be following us every where at the moment," Australian captain Ricky Ponting said.

"It will be frustrating if the rain does come and the storm hits, but you can't predict those things."

Ponting said Australia's batsmen needed to reassess themselves after the poor start against the Windies in Brisbane.

"They're obviously coming out of that game talking pretty confidently, so we have to make sure that we switch on again tomorrow," he said on Tuesday.

The Australians also have other concerns over the poor batting form of opener Matthew Hayden and big-hitter Andrew Symonds.

Ponting admitted he was concerned about Symonds form which has seen him make five ducks in his last six innings.

"He's probably a little bit worried about the way he's travelling or... how few runs he's got," Ponting said.

But Ponting was confident a return to form was imminent.

"It's just going to take him to spend a bit of time at the crease, everything will come back to him again and you'll see him start playing the cricket we know he can play," he said.

As for Hayden, Ponting said every batsman suffered a downturn in form at some point.

"He's bit the same as Symonds, I guess, he's in a little bit of a rut, we've been in them," he said.

Mohali venue impresses Pak officials

Pakistani officials, in India to assess match venues ahead of next month's Test tour, have said they are satisfied with security arrangements in the northern city of Mohali.

Zakir Khan, a general manager of the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB), and Sohail Khan, Lahore's superintendent of police, arrived in India on Monday for a five-day visit.

"Mohali has a fine stadium and we have no concerns," Zakir Khan told reporters on Tuesday after they inspected the ground.

However, the main bone of contention is expected to be the Test venue in Ahmedabad, the major city in the western state of Gujarat. The state was rocked by India's worst communal riots for a decade in 2002.

England set 185 to win

AB de Villiers and Jacques Kallis hit centuries before South Africa declared on the fifth afternoon of the fifth and final Test at Centurion Park Tuesday, setting England to make 185 to win in 44 overs.

South Africa need a wicket to square the series while a draw will give England a 2-1 win.

De Villiers, 20, made 109, his maiden Test century, while Kallis, South Africa's top scorer in the series, finished unbeaten on 136 before South African captain Graeme Smith declared on 296 for six.

De Villiers and Kallis scored freely on the final morning, enabling Smith to make at least a token attempt to win the match.

South Africa added 237 runs in 54

overs Tuesday to back up Smith's claim that his team would "give it our all" in an effort to force a result in a match affected by rain.

De Villiers and Kallis put on 227 for the third wicket in 224 minutes off 324 balls.

After making 92 in the first innings, De Villiers became the third youngest South African to make a Test century, after Graeme Pollock and Tuppy Owen-Smith.

De Villiers and Kallis both took 164 balls to reach their hundreds. It was Kallis' 20th Test century, just one short of the South African Test record.

South Africa started their second innings with a deficit of 112 but De Villiers took them into the lead when he pulled Matthew Hoggard for six. At that stage 84 overs remained.

De Villiers was caught at third man soon after posting his century and South Africa lost two more wickets before the declaration.

Kallis took his total of runs in the series to 625.
