ACC falters on missing regulations

The Anti Corruption Commission yesterday failed to take a decision on any of the seven agenda points it adopted since its creation 65 days ago because of missing rules and regulations.

The ACC yesterday also backtracked from appointing a legal consultant, since making such an appointment in the absence of rules and regulations may violate the ACC Act, which requires all decisions to be made in line with an established set of commission rules and regulations.

Army suspects JMJB used radiocontrolled bomb in Jatra attack

Army experts suspect Shafiqullah arrested on January 17 and his Islamist terrorist outfit Jagrata Muslim Janata Bangladesh (JMJB) used radio-controlled bombs in some of their terrorist acts.

The assumption is based on two facts. First, the chemical seized from him was identified as picric acid, or Trinitrophenol, which is one of the most dangerous chemicals and is primarily used to manufacture explosives. And second, the electric circuit found with him was identified as that of radio.

After testing a sample of the chemical by setting fire to it yesterday, a seven-member army team concluded that it belongs to picric acid category of explosives.

Cabinet body may review projects next week

The cabinet purchase committee may decide next week the fate of two controversial telecoms projects-Submarine Cable Project and a project for extension of district-level telephone exchanges.

The Cabinet Division recently asked the Ministry of Post and Telecommunications (MOPT) to explain its position on alleged irregularities in both these projects.

The Cabinet Division had earlier detected gross irregularities in multimillion-dollar telecoms equip-

ment purchase proposals of Bangladesh Telegraph and Telephone Board (BTTB) and sought the MOPT's explanation on the way these deals were structured.

Documents show the BTTB has recommended the German highest bidder Siemens, instead of the Canadian lowest bidder Nortel, to install Cox's Bazar-Chittagong optical fibre link. If awarded, the government will overpay Tk 16.70 crore to Siemens.

8 jailed for arson on Mamun's house

The IDIL will now hire eight advisers who will guide it on treasury functions, audit, credit management, recovery, human resources, accounting, information technology, branch management and other areas.

Saarc LDCs to get EU duty-free access in July

The European Union (EU) has decided to give duty-free access to readymade garments from the least developed countries of the Saarc region, including Bangladesh, under new GSP facilities to be effective from July this year. The industry here can use fabrics

and raw materials from the Saarc and the Asean countries under new facilities, Bangladesh Garments Manufacturers and Exporters Association (BGMEA) President Annisul Huq told the BSS yesterday. He welcomed the EU move, saying it will work as a new booster

Abandoned mortar shell found again in Sylhet
