England's no to racism

England will depart from a century of tradition by wearing shirts bearing an anti-racist message when they take the field for next week's international football friendly against Holland.

The team will wear red shirts at Villa Park on Wednesday, with a slogan on the front and the badge of the 'Kick it Out' campaign, an organisation which aims to rid football of racism, on the sleeves.

England coach Sven-Goran Eriksson said: "This is a unique opportunity for fans and players to join together to speak out against racism."

most-recently when Shaun Wright-Phillips and Ashley Cole were targeted during a friendly against Spain in Madrid in November.

Last week Manchester United and England centre-half Rio Ferdinand joined France's Thierry Henry in launching an anti-racism campaign.

The Arsenal striker was also the subject of a racist jibe by Spain's manager Luis Aragonés during a training-ground tirade at Henry's club-mate Jose Reyes.

FIFA have given the FA special permission to wear the shirts and fans will be asked to hold up cards with an anti-racism message during the national anthems.

England captain David Beckham says Real Madrid's new Brazilian coach Wanderley Luxemburgo has helped him rediscover his old magic.

A spectacular long-range Beckham free-kick maintained Madrid's perfect league record in 2005 with a 2-1 win at bottom club Numancia on Sunday.

And Beckham feels he is doing enough to silence the critics who have called on England coach Sven Goran Eriksson to replace him with Manchester City's Shaun Wright-Phillips.

"As long as I am happy with my form for Real Madrid and England, then it does not really matter what anyone else says," Beckham told Sky Sports News.

Luxemburgo was brought in at the end of last year by Real president Florentino Perez and Beckham admits he has been a breath of fresh air at the Santiago Bernabeu.


"He has totally changed things around, as we are working a lot harder in training and we are more organised in games, and that is being shown in the games we have played under him," said Beckham.

Beckham is also happy with how things are shaping up under Eriksson in the England camp.

"It is good, we have some experience and some great young players coming through and we are very lucky as a country to have that," added Beckham.

Milan keep hopes alive

Juventus coach Fabio Capello defended his team's sluggish performance in chilly Turin, saying the fact Sampdoria keeper was voted man-of-the-match spoke volumes.

"Francesco Antonioli was the best player on the pitch," he said. "We played well, but didn't get the result we deserved."

Aimo Diana's close range strike in the 33rd minute condemned Juventus to their first home defeat of the season and gave the visitors their sixth away victory, which lifted them to fifth place.

Marcello Castellini's powerful header from Cristian Zenoni's cross came back off the crossbar and Diana was first to the rebound, reacting quickest to stab the ball past Gianluigi Buffon.

Juventus bombarded the Sampdoria goal in a one-sided second half, but the steely Genoa held out, thanks largely to Antonioli's quick reflexes.

In other matches, Nigerian striker Obafemi Martins grabbed the only goal as Inter

Milan edged bottom club Atalanta to hold onto third place, while Udinese beat Chievo 3-0 and remain fourth.

Juventus have 50 points from their 22 matches played, five more than AC Milan and 12 more than Inter Milan.

Roma fell one place to sixth after being held to a 1-1 draw at Lecce, while Palermo climbed to seventh thanks to a 2-1 win Fiorentina.

Elsewhere, Lazio drew 0-0 at home to Brescia, Livorno drew 1-1 at home to Reggina and Cagliari came back from two goals down to draw 2-2 at Siena. Bologna play at home to struggling Parma on Thursday.

Better late than never

Chelsea's Portuguese coach Jose Mourinho finally received his university diploma -- 18 years after he wrapped up his studies.

The 42-year-old coach completed his physical education degree at Lisbon's sporting university in 1987 however he never picked up the diploma, saying he was too busy.

But on Wednesday a representative of the school surprised Mourinho at Chelsea's training grounds in London and personally delivered the diploma.

"I thought it was lost. It is a special feeling to receive a diploma almost twenty years later," a beaming Mourinho told Portuguese television station SIC.

"I am very pleased. I have received many trophies in the last few years of my career as a coach but none with this significance."

Mourinho, who abandoned his career as a reserve team midfielder to study physical education, has frequently credited his higher education for his success as a coach.

"I have said this before, and I never get tired of saying it. A person who only knows football will never be a great coach," he said.

"A great coach is always someone who understands as much about football as about other areas. School is where you get that."

Mourinho joined Chelsea in June 2004 after leading Portuguese side FC Porto to the domestic league and European Champions title.

Chelsea lead with 61 points, eight points ahead of Manchester United. The team can lose three of its remaining 14 games and still win its first league title in 50 years.

Mourinho claims title

Jose Mourinho voiced his confidence that Chelsea will go on to claim their first league title in 50 years after a 1-0 win at Blackburn extended his side's lead at the top of the table to 11 points.

Asked if Chelsea could throw it away now, the Portuguese manager replied: "I don't think so, with this attitude I don't think so. We are showing we are ready for everything -- we can play football and we can fight."

Chelsea winger Arjen Robben got the crucial goal in the fifth minute. But the real Chelsea hero, as so often this season, was goalkeeper Peter Cech, who saved a first half penalty from Scotland striker Paul Dickov to preserve the three points for Jose Mourinho's side.

The penalty save gave Cech a double cause for celebration as he

extended the record for keeping a clean sheet in the Premiership having passed former Manchester United's goalkeeper Peter Schmeichel's old mark of 704 minutes in the 14th minute of the match.

It was a far from vintage performance from Chelsea and the evening was marred by the sight of Robben limping off shortly after he had waltzed past Lucas Neill and fired a low shot past Brad Friedel to put his side ahead.

But Mourinho ensured it was a night to remember for the small group of Chelsea fans who had made the long trip north by instructing his players to throw their shirts into the crowd at the end of the match.

"The spirit was absolutely amazing," Mourinho added before lambasting Blackburn for their negative tactics.

"I want to be polite I call it a special attitude," Mourinho said, before singling out Blackburn's

recently acquired midfielder Robbie Savage for particular criticism.

"He made 20 faults, not one single yellow card and after that it is difficult to control emotions," Mourinho stormed.

Everton tightened their grip on fourth place in the table -- the final qualifying spot for the Champions League -- courtesy of a 1-0 win over relegation candidates Norwich.

A goalless draw looked the inevitable outcome on an atrocious Goodison Park pitch before Marcus Bent drew a great save from Robert Green and fellow substitute Duncan Ferguson forced the loose ball over the line.

A stoppage time volley from Lee Clark rescued a point for Fulham at home to Aston Villa in a game that featured three missed penalties.

Juan Pablo Angel put Villa ahead ten minutes after the interval but the Colombian striker's evening was ruined by the two penalties that he failed to get past Fulham's Dutch

goalkeeper, Edwin van der Sar.

Fulham's Andy Cole also failed to convert a spot-kick but it was the home side who will have ended the night the happier.

Birmingham's loan signing of Walter Pandiani proved to be a master-stroke as the Uruguayan striker marked his debut with a goal after only 11 minutes against Southampton.

Nathan Blake then doubled the lead from the penalty spot four minutes before the break. Henri Camara pulled a goal back for Southampton after the break but Harry Redknapp's side were unable to find the equaliser that would have boosted their survival chances.

"That is possibly as good as we have played all season," Birmingham's boss Steve Bruce said afterwards, before paying tribute to the impact Pandiani had made since his arrival from Deportivo La Coruna with just minutes to spare before the expiry of the transfer deadline on

Monday.

"You don't play at that level for that long without having something special," Bruce said, before joking: "He doesn't understand a word of English which will probably help."
