Himel breeze on Day 2

Golam Rahman Himel composed the first century of the Ispahani Sixth National Cricket League when the Sylhet opener struck an unbeaten 110 against Dhaka on the second day of their opening four-day match at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday.

The southpaw added 135 runs for the second wicket with Sadiqur after his opening partner and elder brother Golam Mabud fell in the first over of the second session with the total on six.

Dropped twice in the slips by Mohammad Ashraful and Al Shahriar on six and 13 respectively, Himel then punished the Dhaka bowlers with some delightful strokes that included 16 boundaries.

Sadiqur scored a cautious 38 off 148 balls.

With the wicket not assisting seamers, Dhaka captain Khaled Mahmud bowled a spell of off-spin for five overs but it was left-arm spinner Arafat Sunny who gave the breakthrough by dismissing Sadiqur in his fifth over.

Sylhet lost the initiative losing four wickets in the space of 33 runs including Alok Kapali, who mistimed a pull off Arafat and skied a simple catch to wide mid-on.

Himel however kept cool and reached the magical three-figure mark in style, hitting successive boundaries off Arafat in the next over. The stocky batsman even after staying more than four hours at the crease showed no fatigue and looked determined to go on with his captain Tapash Baisya, who was batting on five at close of play.

Earlier, Mahmud added three runs to his overnight score of 45 before being dismissed by Sylhet medium pacer Rezaul Haque after adding three. The national all-rounder was caught by his Sylhet counterpart Tapash at cover. Although the umpires looked confused on whether the ball was taken on the bounce, a generous Mahmud walked off the ground after his national teammate Tapash said that he took it cleanly.

Anwar Hossain (33) and Arafat Sunny (31 not out) stretched the Dhaka innings beyond 300 but the last two wickets fell on 325. Left-arm spinner Nabil Samad was the pick of the Sylhet bowlers with 4-62.

Shoaib's misery mounts

Top Pakistani bowler Shoaib Akhtar suffered a new setback in his battle to regain fitness for Pakistan's rapidly approaching tour of India when his trainers left the country Wednesdays.

Pakistan's foreign fitness trainer Murray Stevenson, physiotherapist Daryn Lifson and national academy physio Grant Compton left for South Africa on a private visit just 16 days before Pakistan travel across the border.

The team's English coach Bob Woolmer also departed for South Africa for a knee operation, Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) officials said.

"I am trying my level best to get fully fit but I am without a trainer," Shoaib admitted. He did not elaborate because he is forbidden from giving press statements pending PCB investigations against him.

Shoaib, who took eleven wickets in the first two Tests, injured his hamstring twice on Pakistan's tour of Australia and had to return home midway through a tri-series one-day tournament last month.

However the 29-year-old also faces disciplinary action which may bar his travel to India, where Pakistan will play three Tests and five one-day games from February 25 in their first full tour.

Shoaib's reported visits to a disco and pictures with girls which appeared in the media during the recent tour of Australia, has delayed

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return home and his starting rehabilitation work with a private trainer prompted the PCB to set up a three-member inquiry committee.

"Pakistan would definitely need a fully fit Shoaib for the India tour because you can't beat India with spinners," former Pakistan captain Imran told AFP.

"You need pace bowlers who can get a batting power like India out twice in a Test," he said.

"There is no doubt that Shoaib is not an easy player to handle, but if you make him a scapegoat every time the team loses, you will demotivate him," added Imran, who led Pakistan to 1992 cricket World Cup victory.

The committee may release its findings on Thursday, PCB sources said.

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Fletcher to stay in Eng Jennings not upset with Smith comment

England coach Duncan Fletcher said on Tuesday he was happy in his job and would not be applying for the soon-to-be advertised position as South Africa coach.

South Africa coach Ray Jennings was appointed on an interim basis until the conclusion of their West Indies tour at the end of May and a United Cricket Board of South Africa spokesman said on Tuesday the permanent position would be advertised this week.

"I'm not applying for it, I'm with England and I'm happy to be with

them," Zimbabwean-born Fletcher told a news conference in East London, where his side will meet South Africa in the fifth of seven one-day internationals on Wednesday.

England won their first Test series in South Africa for 40 years last month, and Fletcher said the team was hungry for more success.

"We've won a huge Test series and the players want to win the one-day series as well."

"It's not difficult for the players to motivate themselves if they're playing for England, although it has been quite stressful with all the travelling we've done in the one-day series."

"But South Africa have to do it as well."

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Selectors awaiting Naimur's reply

National selectors are waiting for an official reply from former Bangladesh captain Naimur Rahman whether he will join the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) XI squad for the Duleep Trophy in India.

The four-member selection committee had announced a 14-member squad for the Indian first-class competition including Naimur but the all-rounder was quoted on different newspapers that he was yet to recover from injury. He also mentioned he had little interest to make a fresh start in the international cricket after being out for almost three years.

"We only read it on newspapers but we are looking for an official reply. We will only take the decision about him and announce a replacement if he does not turn out to report on February 15," said chief selector Faruque Ahmed adding he would be replaced by an off-spinner if needed. Fahim Muntasir is the likely replacement.

Slovenian coach interests BFF

Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF)'s quest to find a foreign coach for the national team has gathered momentum.

The BFF contacted two east European coaches and has received terms and conditions from their agents. For the moment, Slovenian Ivo Sajh Scheich is the person who the BFF is more interested about, informed the Federation's general secretary Anwarul Hoque Helal yesterday.

"We have also received response from Romania's Olympic team coach Ion Ion but he is too expensive for us. Ion has asked for 10,000 US dollars per month as salary and we can not afford that amount," said Helal.

Sajh's agent meanwhile has said that his client seeks 4,000 dollars as monthly salary and other expenses including four return air tickets home every year.

"The salary is negotiable but we will consider some other CVs as well before the National Team Management Committee takes a decision," added Helal.

Sajh, who had visited Bangladesh three years ago, is a former development director of Myanmar Football Association and coached the Indian national team in 1998. He also set a six-year youth development programme for the Asian Football Confederation (AFC).
