ACC to take in all Bac staff

Step contradicts ACC Act, govt order

The Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) has once again taken a controversial decision to temporarily take in all regular staff of the now-defunct Bureau of Anti-Corruption (Bac) violating the ACC Act and ignoring a government order.

The government had earlier clearly said that the Bac staff should not be absorbed into the ACC without screening. It even ordered them not to work with the commission.

"We've decided to utilise all former Bac staff, now unemployed, by attaching them temporarily to the commission to make it an effective institution," ACC Chairman Justice Sultan Hossain Khan told

newsmen after an internal meeting yesterday.

The former Bac staff will start working from Saturday (tomorrow), said the chairman.

The commission will also ask the government to withdraw all the officials who were on deputation at the Bac. These officials along with

Seven grenades found in Savar, Khulna

Six live grenades and 16 rifle bullets were recovered from a paddy field in Botiaghata upazila in Khulna, while law-enforcers seized a hand grenade from the house of a drug-peddler in Savar yesterday.

Botiaghata police, however, failed to give any details about the grenades found three feet under the ground. They will call in army experts today to identify the grenades, the officer-in-charge of the Botiaghata Police Station told The Daily Star last night.

Locals and police said a few day labourers found the grenades while

WASHINGTON MEET Donors rethink aid strategy for rise in militancy

For the first time in Bangladesh's history, donors are sitting in Washington in a high profile meet to take some serious decisions on their aid strategy against the backdrop of their heightening concerns about deteriorating governance, rising lawlessness and the fear that fundamentalist militancy is gaining grounds because of the government's inertia.

According to highly placed diplomatic sources, a large group of European donors, an influential European country having substantial aid involvement in Bangladesh and some Scandinavian countries want to persuade the multilateral donors and the US to take a tough line on aid and link it with greater response to good governance and human rights and restraining

Documents of another case against JMJB men missing

Documents of yet another case involving Jagrata Muslim Janata Bangladesh (JMJB) operatives have gone missing.

The documents missing are of the case filed against JMJB operatives for carrying out a bomb attack in a Bogra village.

Ahmedullah, first class magistrate of the court concerned, claimed that the documents are kept in the court. But court sources said that the case documents are now

kept under lock and key at the Deputy Commissioner's (DC) office. They had been in the custody of Bogra police before.

Mostafizur Rahman Mridha, first class magistrate of Bogra, said, "According to the article 156 of criminal procedure, case documents can neither go to the deputy commissioner nor to the superintendent of police when the investigation is still on."

Despite repeated attempts, the DC of Bogra could not be reached to

WB concerned over attacks on NGOs

Prof Yunus terms it bad omen for country; NGOs tighten security

The World Bank (WB) yesterday deplored and expressed deep concerns at the recent bomb attacks on Grameen Bank and Brac offices, which Grameen Bank's managing director considers a bad omen for the country.

In a press release, the WB said as a development partner of Bangladesh it is deeply concerned about the adverse effects on services to the

poor, should such attacks escalate. "It's important that development agencies like Brac and Grameen Bank be able to continue their good work unhindered by fear or violence," the multilateral international development agency said.

"We hope the authorities will take a strong stand against these actions and take all necessary steps to bring the perpetrators to justice," the release added.

An RU teacher with a long militant track

The controversial Rajshahi University teacher Dr Muhammad Asadullah Al Galib was associated with a number of radical Islamist organisations in Pakistan, India and the Middle East, and he also secretly visited India with a business passport in 1998, says an intelligence source.

Accused in more than half a dozen corruption and criminal cases, the Arabic department professor entertained a number of Kashmiri and Afghan mujahideens at his Naodapara Madrasa in the early 90s.

Chopper controversy

Mystery abounds as to why no helicopter was sent to bring Awami League (AL) lawmaker and former finance minister SAMS Kibria to Dhaka from Habiganj on the night of January 27 as his life might have been saved if given early treatment.

BNP General Secretary Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan has claimed a helicopter was offered but the AL did not respond. On the other hand, the AL denies this claim and Kibria's family challenged it and demanded of Bhuiyan to specify whom the offer was made to. Bhuiyan has not yet responded to this challenge.

An investigation by The Daily Star into this controversy finds that after the January 27 grenade attack,

neither the AL leaders nor the local administration and police had any confirmed information about government offering a helicopter to quickly bring Kibria to Dhaka.

A cross-section of people in Dhaka and Habiganj say the AL leaders started for Dhaka taking Kibria in a microbus of a private clinic more than an hour after the grenade attack as they did not get any assurance about a helicopter until then.

The local administration also could not stop the AL leaders from going to Dhaka in a microbus as they were not sure about any helicopter service.

Kibria attended an AL rally on a school premises at Baiderbazar, after the January 27 grenade attack,

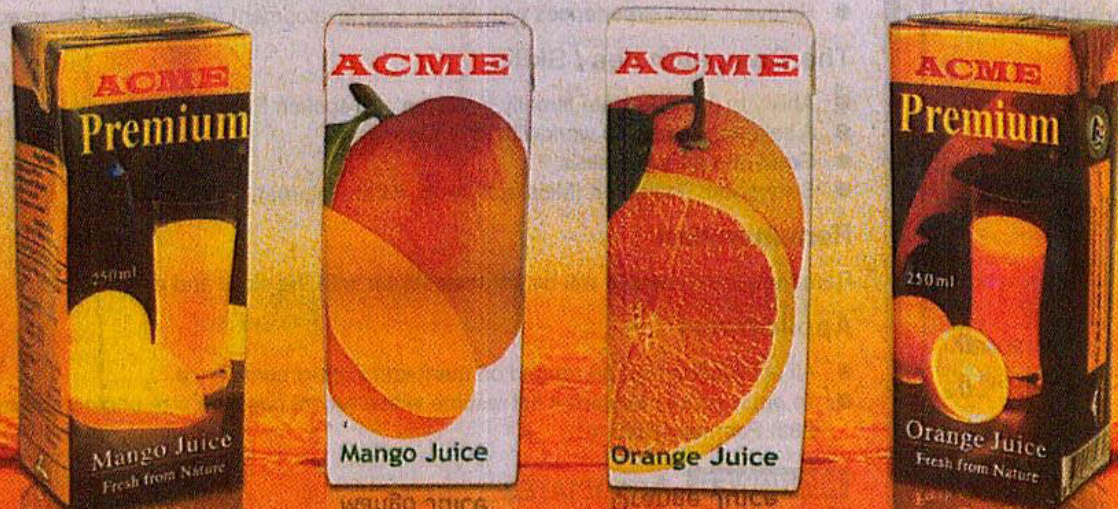
