Opposition Leader Sheikh Hasina has appealed to all patriotic citizens irrespective of their party allegiance and opinions to pledge to pull down the Khaleda-Nizami government, which she dubbed as patron of all bomb and grenade attacks.

In a statement yesterday, Hasina, also president of the Awami League (AL), condemned the repeated bomb attacks on the nongovernmental organisations (NGOs) engaged in poverty alleviation, removing illiteracy and empowering women under

She said Bangladesh has become the model of microcredit across the world. In this situation, repeated bomb attacks on the NGOs and fresh threats only deepen the crisis.

She said it is the responsibility of the government to track down the attackers and hand them over to the SEE PAGE 11 COL 8

4 members of Islamist group held

Biggest EPZ in limbo Bush warns Syria, Iran

Denied licence for 3 years for no express reason

The government without any express reason has refrained for the last three years from licensing the country's biggest and private Korean Export Processing Zone (KEPZ) to operate, despite the fact that the Korean entrepreneurs have already invested about Tk 100 crore to develop it.

Sources at the Prime Minister's Office (PMO), which deals with private EPZ, said the government in 1999 handed over 2,492 acres of land on the Karnaphuli river in Chittagong to KEPZ led by Korean company Youngone. At the same time, a gazette notification was

Other than the licence, KEPZ has

no formality left to kick-start its operation anytime.

Sources said, unofficially, KEPZ has become a victim of politicisation. After coming to office in October 2001, the BNP-led fourparty alliance started to view KEPZ as a 'political beneficiary' of the previous government of Awami

Interestingly, the process of setting up KEPZ started back in 1995, during the previous BNP

Since early 2002, the PMO has formed several committees to look into some alleged irregularities in KEPZ and the Private EPZ Act framed during the AL government. The first committee verbally asked the KEPZ management why it

needed such a huge area of 2,492 acres and hinted that it could do away with 500 acres.

In the end, in November 2003, a high-powered committee led by the principal secretary to the prime minister adjudged that there was no need to change the act and said, "in the interest of national image and foreign investment," KEPZ should be allowed to function without any

Ever since, the government has kept mum on the issue, sources said. KEPZ on the other hand kept on writing to the PMO on a monthly basis requesting permission to

Sources said, in recent times, a son of a powerful minister approached the KEPZ management

saying he could fix all the troubles for a 'fee' of three million dollars.

To the hilly KEPZ site, where Youngone has constructed roads and structures since 1999 after paying the government Tk 64 crore for the land, goons linked to a ruling party lawmaker visit from time to time asking for payoffs, the sources said. The same MP on several occasions expressed grievance against the KEPZ, management for not contracting out part of the development work launched in 2001 to him.

"The fate of KEPZ now in limbo also exemplifies how the government treats foreign investors," quips a PMO source, adding, "The government seems so concerned about the country's image while dealing with


But the topic quickly moved to Lebanon's near neighbour, Syria, which has thousands of troops in

Bush said Syria was lagging behind changes in the rest of the Middle East and predicted that more information on who was responsible for the assassination would come out when he was in Europe.


"First we support the international investigation that will be going on to determine the killers of Mr Hariri," Bush said.

9 bombs recovered | Frequent hartals | Cops seize books from | Outlawed party from Tangail ditch

Grenade found in Kurigram pond

Police yesterday recovered nine powerful' live bombs from a ditch in a village under Modhupur upazila of Tangail and a grenade from a pond in a village under Kurigram Sadar

The bombs found in a ditch beside Madhupur-Jamalpur highway at Baniyajan Uttarpara village under Dhanbari Police Station in Tangail were fitted with electric switches and batteries and kept in a plastic bag, police said.

A villager named Shaheen netted the bag accidentally while fishing in SEE PAGE 11 COL 3 | the ditch at around 11:45 Thursday

night. He hauled the bag out of the ditch taking it for something precious. But opening it he found nine bombs wrapped with scotch tape and fitted with electric switches and six-inch-long batteries.

Shaheen told the local union parishad chairman about the find and the chairman in turn informed the Dhanbari police, who rushed to the spot at around 12:15am yesterday and cordoned off the area.

A team of explosives experts of police led by ASP Mahbubul Alam examined the bombs in the morning and informed the army explosives experts at Shahid Salahuddin SEE PAGE 11 COL 2

Abu Sayeed's house

Detective police yesterday confiscated a number of copies of two newly published books suspected of seditious contents by Awami League leader and former state minister for information Prof Abu Sayeed from his house.

One of the books titled Aghoshito Juddher Blueprint (blueprint of an undeclared war) in Bangla reportedly portrays the rise of extreme communalism and Islamist militants in the country.

The second book, Brutal Crime Documents, in English depicts the alleged brutalities suffered by opposition activists since the 2001 general elections.

Adozen of Detective Branch (DB)

members raided and entered by force Sayeed's house No. 11 on Road No. 6 in Dhanmondi just after a press briefing where he had presented an overview of the books' contents.

"Entering the house the plainclothesmen closed the collapsible gate, detaining me and my party colleagues for about an hour. They were discourteous to every one in the house," Sayeed told The Daily

He said when he wanted to see the search warrant police did not produce any. He termed the raid a violation of his right to express

Sayeed also claimed police took away around 35 copies of the books, SEE PAGE 11 COL 1

leader killed in shootout

A regional leader of outlawed Purba Banglar Communist Party (PBCP-Janajuddho) was killed in a shootout between police and outlaws at a bordering village in Chuadanga Sadarupazila last night.

Police said the dead, Anwarul alias Zihad, was the operation commander of the underground outfit and an accused in at least 80 criminal cases, including 50 for murder.

The gun battle ensued when a team of the Detective Branch (DB) raided a house at Haiderpur village where at least 20 to 22 PBCP cadres were holding a secret meeting at about 8:30pm, police said.
