Consequently, Youngone has been unable to bring in the promised investment, says KEPZ Chairman ANM Eusuf: "In absence of a licence, we cannot market the EPZ investment prospects. In the past, more than 20 Chinese investors came and held a meeting at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. They received promises, but nothing

happened ever since."
Other than the Chinese, a US chemical company and some Korean companies visited the site informally and expressed their

As the stagnation affected Youngone's expansion, it diverted around \$40 million investment to Vietnam, China and India in the last three years. Youngone started its operations in Bangladesh back in 1978 and has grown into a massive KEPZ: FACT FILE

KEPZ, by its size and investment

profile, stands out from all other EPZs in the country. It plans to install 500 industrial units with an investment of one billion US dollars. KEPZ sources said the plan includes setting up a whole range of garment and textiles units plus electronics, software, scientific and optical tools, machine tools, automotive parts and other units. Youngone will invest 200 million dollars separately to build up its

In contrast, the government-run five EPZs have only 203 units with a total investment of 748 million

The first EPZ set up in Chittagong in 1983 has 119 industrial units on a 453-acre site. The Dhaka EPZ established in 1993 has 72 units on 355 acres. The other three EPZs launched after 2001 have but a few units -- the 191-acre Mongla EPZ has five units, the 258acre Comilla EPZ six units and the 233-acre Svedpur EPZ just one unit.

Again. Youngone alone accounts for 25 percent of the investment in the five government EPZs, with 16 units employing more than 30,000 people and exporting goods worth over 220 million dollars a year.

The idea of KEPZ was conceived during a visit of Khaleda Zia, the then prime minister of the BNP government, to South Korea in

After AL came to power in 1996 Youngone applied for 2,700 acres of land on the Karnaphuli river opposite to Chittagong airport in a hilly location, and the land ministry allotted it 2.526 acres in November that year. Of that, about 1,700 acres belong to the government and the rest to private citizens.

Also in 1996, KEPZ was registered as a company, and side by side the government approved the Private EPZAct.

In August 1999, the deputy commissioner (DC) of Chittagong acquired 2,492 acres of land for KEPZ and Youngone consented to leave out the rest of the allotted land, which belonged to graveyards, religious establishments and some other authorities.

Although the administration had promised to evict the squatters on the site, in many cases, Youngone had to do it on its own. Even now. there is a cluster village with about 44 families who have received compensation for their land but have not moved out. The 400-staffstrong KEPZ is now dealing with them.

The prime minister heads a board of governors which deals with the private EPZ licensing process under the Private EPZ Act. This hoard so far held 11 meetings, with three of them during the present government's tenure. The last meeting was held in April 2003.

The board held its first meeting after the change of power in January 2002 and formed a committee with Agriculture Minister MK Anwar to

examine why KEPZ was given such a large area as 2.500 acres. This committee held half a dozen meetngs without any representation of KEPZ, except one, where it invited KEPZ and asked its chairman why the zone needed so much land.

The KEPZ chair explained that more than 60 percent of the site consisted of hills and ditches and only 40 percent would be used for industrial establishments. None of the other EPZs -- in Chittagong and Dhaka -- are a model for KEPZ nor have the same strategic placement he pointed out.

The KEPZ chair said: Both CEPZ and DEPZ are established on plain land and well connected to the cities. Whereas KEPZ is located on the environmentally sensitive bank of Karnaphuli river. While CEPZ and DEPZ have industrial units only, KEPZ lays out an ideal plan of having dorms, recreational facilities like a golf course, school, training centres, convention centres, quest house, etc. Unlike other EPZs, it will accommodate 100,000 people.

KEPZ also argued that the government had not put any cap on how bia it could be

After that meeting, which had ended inconclusively, the MK Anwar Committee formed a secretary-level committee in September 2002. On the basis of this committee's report. the Anwar Committee submitted its recommendations to the board of governors in March 2003. recommendations again led to forming of two more committees through a meeting of the board in April 2003

One of these latest committees headed by a law ministry joint secretary was assigned to formulate regulations under the Private EPZ Act, the task it completed in a few months.

The second committee led by the principal secretary to the prime minister were to recommend amendment to the Private EPZ Act and suggest what to do about KEPZ as per MK Anwar Committee's recommendations.

The principal secretary's committee in November 2003 reported that there was no need to amend the act and said licence to operate should be issued to KEPZ immediately without additional condition "in the interest of national image and foreign investment." Since then the issue has

remained mysteriously stalled.

He expressed the fear that if the gas supply does not reach the required level, the situation would worsen in the upcoming peak season of summer, when the demand for power in the region would go up to

Sources at Bakhrabad Gas Systems Limited admitted that presently they are supplying around 60mcft gas, 38mcft less than the required amount of 98mcft, to the three gas-fired power plants in Chittagong a day. They said it would be possible to supply an additional 10mcft gas by the end of March.
