Killed for a meter

An electrician was beaten to death in front of his seven-year-old son in Khilgaon yesterday for failing to buy neighbours an electric meter.

When Golam Mostafa, 35, lay dead, his killers hung him with a rope to make his death appear a case of suicide.

Police arrested three neighbours Zahirul Islam, Mojibur Rahman and his wife Farzana for the murder.

The victim's brother, Monir Hossain, told The Daily Star that Rashed, a youth living next door, called Mostafa from his house at East Nandipara at 1:00am yesterday and took him to one Mojibur's house nearby. Mostafa's sevenyear-old son Russell followed his father to what was to become his untimely death.

When he arrived to the house assailants accosted Mostafa and bound with ropes, then started heating him with sticks. As Russell watched in horror, the assailants ordered him to call his mother

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CATTLE BONE EXPORT

Tk 25cr lost a year to bureaucratic sloth

A yearly earning of at least Tk 25 crore from exporting cattle bones and horns has been stalled since 2001, with the finance ministry putting off payment of only 15,000 euros to get a certificate clearing Bangladesh's name as a mad cow disease-infected country.

"Bangladesh was wrongly put on an international list of mad cow disease-prone countries back in 2001," said Dhaka Bone and Fertiliser Industry Managing Director A. Jahhar Khan

Ever since the mad cow disease scare shook the world. the Tk 25 crore annual earning from exporting cattle bones and horns virtually stopped, although there has been no report of spotting this disease in

According to the Export Promotion Bureau, earning from cattle bone export was only Tk 55 lakh in fiscal year 2003-04, which explains why the 10 boneprocessing plants in the country are virtually idle now.

Exporters said if the government had taken an active interest, this unconventional export item would continue to earn the substantial amount of foreign exchange.

But the government appears not to take the issue seriously enough. while other South Asian countries promptly wiped off their names from the list. Khan mentioned.

He said. "In the wake of continued pressure from exporters, the government in 2003 asked the Brussels-based World Organisation


for Animal Health (OIE) to certify whether Bangladesh has the disease or not.'

In response, the OIE requested Bangladesh to pay up about 10,500 euros in dues to maintain its OIE membership and another 4,500 euros as the fee for the certification. "But", Khan regretted, "the finance ministry is yet to grant this amount."

To end the standstill, bone exporters even offered to pay the OIE money on its behalf, but the government did not permit them Khan told The Daily Star

Importing countries use the bones and horns as raw materials for bone grist, bone meal etc used to produce medicine, fertiliser, cosmetics, poultry feed and baby food besides many other things

Unesco website yet to add background

Although the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation (Unesco) declared February 21 as International Mother Language Day (IMLD) in recognition of 1952's Language Movement it has yet to officially record the movement's historical background on its website.

Space for liberal thoughts shrinking in Bangladesh

Says Amnesty chief on rise of fundamentalism in South Asia



A wave of fundamentalism is sweeping the world, endangering fundamental rights and civil liberties, says Irene Khan, the chief of the rights watchdog Amnesty International. "There is the Christian right in the

US, there is Muslim fundamentalism in Pakistan and Bangladesh and there is Hindu fundamentalism in India," Irene told IANS here in an exclusive interview.

'The space for liberal thought is being squeezed in Bangladesh. The rise of fundamentalism is very dangerous for civil society and for women," Irene added.

Irene, a Bangladeshi national who became the first Asian, the first woman and the first Muslim to head the human rights body in August

2001, was here after a visit to Nepal where she assessed the situation after the royal coup.

Although she was appointed to the job earlier, she took charge of her new assignment as Amnesty chief in London one day after the

Sep 11, 2001, terrorist attacks in New York and Washington.

"By the time I took charge, the world had changed," said Irene, for whom dealing with the post-9/11 world became a baptism by fire.

"It shook us all up. It exposed how vulnerable the human rights situation is in the world. Countries with long tradition of human rights started behaving as though they couldn't care less," said Irene, who led high-level missions to Pakistan during the bombing of Afghanistan

"What is most shocking is that ever since McCarthvism - the ideological witch-hunt of communists and communist sympathisers in the US in the 50s -- this was the most virulent kind of ideological battle being fought. Suddenly, every

Man, nephew die in police action

A middle-aged man and his nephew, both with long criminal records, were killed in an 'encounter' with police in Keraniganj yesterday. Families of Habibur Rahman,

alias Lengra Habib, 57, and his nephew Rana, 27, claimed, however, that the police killed the two in a premeditated attack over a longstanding conflict with a local lawmaker.

Keraniganj police arrested Habib, his son Bappi and his nephew Rana from the Bangladesh-China Friendship Bridge at Postogola at 3:00pm on Friday, as the three were en route to a wedding ceremony at Hasnabad Community

"While arresting him (Habib), police slapped his wife, took away three mobile phones and gold ornaments weighing over 15 tolas that they were taking to present as a gift to the new couple." said a rela-

tive who witnessed the arrest According to Keraniganj police, Habib was the commander of a criminal gang and had 11 cases filed against him, most of them for murder. Rana, one of Habib's top cadres, had 15 cases filed against him for various charges.

Following an interrogation at the police station, police raided Habib's village of Doleshwar hoping to net his accomplices, and recovered several deadly weapons, police

Police then took Habib and Rana to Habib's fish enclosure in South Khetpar village at 2:15am, where unknown assailants opened fire on them, prompting them to retaliate. according to police. Habib was shot three times while

Rana sustained four bullet wounds in the head and chest. Both died on
