Part of Dhanmondi Club playground rented out illegally

Dhanmondi Club authorities have illegally rented out a part of their playground to set up a large hoarding for a yearly rent of Tk 50,000.

The advertiser -- Abahani and Sign -- has already started constructing a 100-foot tall 'right angle display' hoarding by piling on the playground.

Abul Kashem Chowdhury of Abahani and Sign said the 'modern display' will not create any problem as it 'looks good' and is built on a small part of the playground.

Asked if they sought permission from Dhaka City Corporation (DCC). Kashem said his company started the work on the basis of a sub-contract given by the secretary of Dhanmondi Club. "We are not sure whether the club obtained permission." he added.

Dewan Shafigur Rahman Bablu. an official of the club, said they had rented out the space to meet the expenses for their cricket team. The club is operating for 40 years and it has every right to do this, he said.

500 IPH staff drawing salary without work

About 500 staff of the country's lone Institute of Public Health (IPH), most of them experts and laboratory support staff, are without any work for years in the absence of a government decision on utilising their

They are drawing their salaries. allowances and other benefits. A section of them are also taking overtime bills, travel allowances and some other facilities against fake bills, sources said

Seven out of 10 biological labo-

ratories and plants of the IPH, with a total workforce of 754, have been shut down over the years leaving around 500 staff with no work. The latest closure took place in June

The IPH staff include experts like bacteriologists, microbiologists and chemists and laboratory attendants. technicians, sample takers, veterinarians, husbandry officers and a host of other categories of employees.

Many of the public hospitals and laboratories badly need these experts, sources pointed out.

"It would be an honour for Afghanistan to be invited to join Saarc. We would like to see it emerge as a great grouping for the development of Central and South Asia," Karzai told a conference in New Delhi organised by India Today news magazine.

The Afghan president said the two regions should link their development efforts to become a global power centre. "There should be a new vision for

the region and efforts made to remove political barriers and, instead of building walls, we must build bridges," Karzai said.

Young Power in Social Action (YPSA), a Chittagong-based NGO, has recorded that at least 400 workers were killed and 5,000 others were injured in the industry in

The NGO, which is working for the betterment of the sector's poor human rights condition for almost a decade, has held responsible poisonous gas emissions and hazardous working conditions for the accidents

YPSA Programme Manager Abdullah Al Mamun told reporters, "We certainly don't seek the closure of the industry. We want a congenial and safe workplace for the poor workers, whose parents would be paid in advance by the industry people to get their uninterrupted services in the following months."

A man introduced himself as foreman Khokon at a staff quarters near one of the 32 shipyards in Sitakunda. He admitted that they recruit workers, mostly from greater Rangpur, Jamalpur and other adjoining regions, on behalf of the yard owners, by paying the parents of the workers Tk 400-500 in advance.
