Bangla Bhai plans to go abroad

A leader of JMJB, which was banned last week for militancy, hinted that Bangla Bhai may leave for Pakistan today or tomorrow. Asked how Bangla Bhai would leave, the JMJB leader declined to provide any information.

12 sued for sedition, their leaders spared

Rocca said this when she telephoned Foreign Minister M Morshed Khan yesterday to express her condolences for the killing of nine Bangladeshi peacekeeping troops in the Democratic Republic of Congo, according to a US Embassy press release.

The assistant secretary conveyed condolences to the government of Bangladesh, and to the family and friends of the slain peacekeepers. She spoke about the troops' important mission for international peace and praised Bangladesh's contributions to UN peacekeeping operations worldwide.

LAWYERS' PROBE INTO AUG 21 GRENADE ATTACK

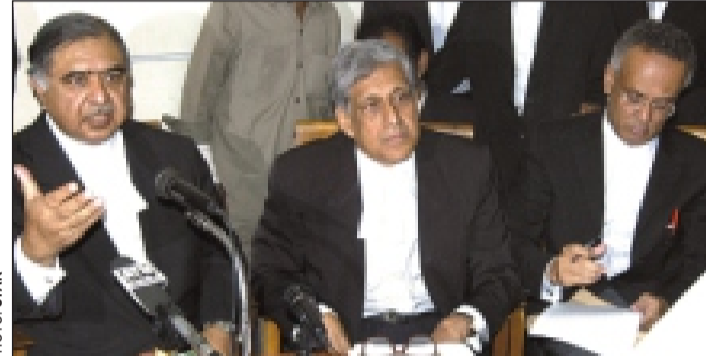
Police action allowed attackers to escape

A high-profile lawyers' investigation into the August 21 grenade attack on Awami League rally questioned the role of the police on that day and observed that the police made way for the attackers to leave the venue immediately after the explosions.

Instead of helping the victims, the policemen showed apathy and themselves moved to safe distance, observes a report published by six senior lawyers. Supreme Court Bar Association President Rokanuddin Mahmud headed the investigation.

Weapons loaded at HK, S'pore; headed for Indian insurgents

Jane's Intelligence Review (JIR), the leading defence magazine of the world, in an investigative report on the Chittagong arms haul in April last has said the arms and ammunition were shipped from Hong Kong and then more weapons were added to the consignment in Singapore before being brought to Bangladesh.

It said before the cache was

seized by police and BDR following a probable tip-off from Indian intelligence sources, one loaded truck is believed to have left the jetty.

According to the JIR report filed by Anthony Davis datelined July 6, the shipment involved two key insurgent movements from India's northeast -- the United Liberation Front of Assam (ULFA) and the Isak-Muivah faction of the Nationalist **SEE PAGE 11 COL 7**

Mass promotion on cards

As part of large-scale promotion plan in the civil and police administration, the government has prepared a list of around 1000 officials, to be promoted to the posts of deputy secretary, joint secretary, additional secretary and secretary, highly placed sources said.

The government has already elevated 18 additional secretaries to the post of full-fledged secretary and more are on the cards.

A list of around 475 senior assistant secretaries, around 275 deputy secretaries and around 200 joint

secretaries has been prepared for promotion to the immediate higher posts.

The list was prepared on the basis of positive reports from intelligence agencies and the now defunct anti-corruption bureau, sources said, adding that the government will also promote a good number of officials, who are on the verge of retirement, on humanitarian ground.

The House was adjourned at 8:00pm, when only 51 members were present, until 4:30pm today.
