JS failed to ensure govt accountability

Observes TIB report

Transparency International Bangladesh (TIB) says parliament has failed to ensure accountability of the government.

Parliamentary standing committees on different ministries also could not play an effective role in investigating corruption and irregularities in different organisations under the ministries concerned,

The report titled Parliament Watch is based on proceedings of the 11th, 12th, 13th and 14th sessions of the 8th parliament held last year. It was presented at a press conference at the Jatiya Press Club.

About the opposition, the report said. "An excessive level of walkouts and boycotting of parliament by the main opposition is greatly obstructing the development of our

parliamentary culture." It added, "Awami League law-

makers were absent from parliament for 48 out of 83 days last year." Establishing an effective parliament is not possible if lack of willing ness of the ruling parties, absence of lawmakers from the sessions, abstention or boycott persists. Prof

Moudud rebuts **US HR report**

Law and Parliamentary Affairs Minister Moudud Ahmed yesterday dismissed the US Human Rights report on Bangladesh saying it was

one sided and 'not objective'. The human rights report-2004 was released by the US State Department in Washington on February 28 with observations about human rights situations in 196 countries of the world.

"I think the report is too much one sided that speaks of only the negative things. It is not objective," Moudud told the news agency in his initial reaction.

The law minister claimed that the government achieved a lot of progress in strengthening human rights in Bangladesh, which should

PRSP draft finalised

Focus on women empowerment, edn, governance

The government has finalised the draft of the donor-driven Poverty Reduction Strategy Paper (PRSP) outlining around 1,000 action plans in 18 sectors for the next three years to alleviate poverty.

The draft heavily hammers on women empowerment, improving the overall education standard, increasing private-sector involve

ment, governance, decentralisation

Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman will present the draft paper to the donors' Local Consultative Group (LCG), parliamentarians and politicians in mid-March for discussion. Following the discussions, the government will adopt the PRSP for mplementation in 2005 to 2007.

"The donors want to use the

PRSP as the central focus of their future aid," said a planning ministry

"On behalf of the donors, the World Bank is now analysing the government's Annual Development Programme (ADP) to see how their future aid can be pumped into the ADP in the light of the PRSP," he

Rights defenders live dangerously

States Amnesty report on Bangladesh

Amnesty International (AI), a worldwide human rights watchdog, reveals in a report that abusing the human rights (HR) defenders in Bangladesh has been continuing alarmingly due to sheer failure of the

The AI report titled "Bangladesh Human Rights defenders under attack", will be made public today.

The report says, "Hundreds of HR defenders, who act on promoting human rights (HR), have received death threats.' "Scores of them have been

attacked. Many have been killed or seriously injured. "Several journalists have had

their fingers or hands deliberately

damaged so as not to be able to hold a pen. Many have had to leave their homes and localities in the face of

continued death threats," it said. Besides, some intellectuals and NGO workers were either attacked or arrested by the government for their alleged stand in antigovernment political line, the report

mentioned. "Agents of the state including police, army and other law enforcement personnel, for whom successive governments in Bangladesh have been directly accountable, have perpetrated some of the violations against HR defenders," the Al said.

Rab nabs Ctg top terror 'Gittu' Nasir

Takes him out for arms search, recovers AK47 from Hathazari

Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) arrested 'Gittu' Nasir. a notorious Shibir cadre and a top kingpin of Chittagong underworld, in the capital's Jatrabari area on Monday

Acting on his confession, a Rab team yesterday also recovered an AK47 combat rifle from Hathazari in the district yesterday evening.

Tipped off, a special team of Rab-7 of Chittagong went to the capital Monday and arrested 'Gittu' with assistance from Rab-2 of Dhaka.

He was brought to Rab-7 headquarters at Patenga here at around 8.30 yesterday morning.

Sources said after primary interrogations, a Rab team at around 12.30pm yesterday set out along with Gittu for Fatikchhari and other parts of the district to recover firearms in possession of him and his gang. The law enforcers have still been hunting for the hidden firearms until filing of this report at

9:00pm last night. However Rab officials here maintained total silence regarding

'Gittu"s arrest. After his mentor Shibir Nasir had been arrested and jailed in April 1998, 'Gittu' Nasir, son of late Tofael

Ahmad of Chalitatali in Panchlaish became the number one linchpin of SEE PAGE 11 COL 3
