

Cricket dug out of BNS

There were mixed emotions at the Bangabandhu National Stadium

yesterday While the Bangladesh Football Federation (BFB) made their presence felt by digging up the wickets of the country's premier venue on the day they took permanent possession, some cricketers, fans and officials staged a token hunger strike outside in protest at the government decision to shift cricket to the Mirpur Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium.

According to Reuters, former Bangladesh captain Khaled Mahmud was also joined the protest in the afternoon. But the 33year-old all-rounder denied taking part in the hunger strike.

"I went to the stadium to practice as usual and also had a few words with a group of protesters. But for obvious reasons I did not take part in the hunger strike nor did I sign anything," said Mahmud to The Daily Star Sport last night.

Mahmud is one of the cricketers on the Board's payroll.

While Mahmud showed no emotion seeing cricket's last rites being written at the venue where he started his playing career and which has hosted 17 Tests and 58 one-day internationals, another former Bangladesh captain Raquibul Hasan could not hide his frustration.

"As a cricketer it was painful to see that the pitches at the Bangabandhu National Stadium being dug up in front of my own eyes," said Raquibul, who came to



Pakistan captain Inzamamul Haq may be banking on "passion and enthusiasm" of his young team to tame India in their own backvard. but he requires more than just that to taste success on the arduous tour.

India had not lost at home in four vears until Australia ruined their impressive record last season with a 2-1 victory in a four-match contest to clinch their first Test series here since 1969

Pakistan are not as resourceful as world champions Australia, who have tremendous depth in batting and bowling. The Australians' mental strength to cope with pressure always helped them wriggle out of tight situations.

In contrast, Inzamam is leading a team which appears short on bowling experience, especially after the withdrawal of premier fast bowler Shoaib Akhtar due to a hamstring

"The team which plays with more passion and enthusiasm will have a definite advantage in this series and I've a young team which is full of these." said Inzamam, whose side will play three Tests and six one-day internationals during the 50-day tour.

But the Pakistani skipper's major worry will be containing the Indian batsmen who have earned worldwide fame for occupying the crease for long periods on low, slow home The Indian batting order wears a

formidable look, with hard-hitting opener Virender Sehwag keen to repeat last year's awesome performance in Pakistan where he became the first Indian to hit a Test triplecentury and helped India to a 2-1 win.

World champions Australia underscored their overwhelming dominance of the one-day game by thrashing second-ranked New Zealand by seven wickets with 16 overs to spare at Basin Reserve here Tuesday.

After dismissing New Zealand for 233 on the penultimate ball of their 50 overs, Australia captain Adam Gilchrist led a rollicking response that saw the tourists reach the target in the 34th over for the loss of just three wickets.

Gilchrist and Simon Katich opened with a 78-run partnership in 60 balls, and destroyed the morale of New Zealand's bowling attack as Australia cruised through the fourth one-day match to stay on course for a 5-0 clean sweep.

It was a timely return to form for Gilchrist who had been out of sorts earlier in the first three matches, as

he smacked 54 from 37 balls including eight fours and a six.

Martyn hit an unbeaten 65 from 78 balls, and Andrew Symonds had three sixes and four fours in his 48 off 37 balls.

The Supreme Court yesterday stayed Saturday's High Court order that reinstated the elected directors of Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) after two and a half years.

The highest court in the country also ordered the authorities concerned to hold elections to BCB 'under the exiting law' in the shortest possible time.

The order came upon a petition filed by Rafiqul Islam Babu, a BCB councillor.

The second stay order once again throws the elected directors into uncertainty with their tenure about to expire this month.

The directors, who were elected in February 2001 for a four-year term, were thrown out following Rafigul's first writ petition on August 11, 2002 where he challenged

Clause 12 of the BCB constitution. Since then BCB president Ali Asghar has been running the show with a council of 10 advisors.
