## McCullum accepts Lee's apology

It has taken almost a week, but New Zealand wicketkeeper Brendon McCullum has finally cleared the air over the Brett Lee beamer furore and told how he accepted his apology. The Australian fast bowler's waist-high full-toss, which hit McCullum on the hand during the third one-day international at Auckland, has dominated discussion among former players and critics, with the columnist Peter Roebuck suggesting he be sent home immediately.

But McCullum said he had given Lee the benefit of the doubt that the ball, the second similar delivery he has received from him this summer, was accidental.

"He was very apologetic and that was received nicely," McCullum told the Sydney Morning Herald.

McCullum said Lee was a harder prospect to face in one-dayers than Tests because batsmen could not afford to wait for his loose deliveries.

"I think there is a difference to handling it and getting after it, it's no easy feat," he said.

"Facing Gillespie, McGrath and Kasprovic isn't that easy as well."

# Ehsanul powers Chittagong

Ehsanul Haque hit his second ton on the trot as Chittagong took first day's honours against Khulna in the National Cricket League yesterday.

Fresh from his 186 against Barisal in the previous round, Ehsanul continued celebrating his new found position in the middle-order as he remained not out on 107 at stumps as Chittagong amassed 327 for five.

Bowlers dominated in the other two games with 15 wickets tumbling at Bogra in the top-of-the-table clash between Dhaka and Rajshahi while left-arm spinner's Nadif Chowdhury's five-wicket haul helped bottom team Barisal dismiss visiting Sylhet for 202.

### CHITTAGONG-KHULNA

Chittagong made full use of the perfect batting conditions after winning the toss following some early hiccups at the Chittagong Divisional Stadium. The home side stumbled to 68-3 but Nazimuddin

and Ehsanul put on 130 runs for the fourth wicket.

The two frustrated the rival attack for 38 overs before off-spinner Jamaluddin broke the partnership by removing Nazimuddin for 76. Nazimuddin hit 13 fours in an entertaining 146-ball knock. Left-hander Faisal Hossain then raced to his third half-century during a 107-run fifth wicket partnership took the total beyond 300.

Faisal made 66 in just 89 balls cracking a dozen fours and a six before being run out.

Ehsanul, who completed his 50 in 104 balls, took another 92 deliveries to reach the three-figure mark.

### DHAKA-RAJSHAHI

Dhaka or Rajshahi have not recorded outright victories in the ongoing competition but a result was on the cards in this game.

Dhaka seamers grabbed eight wickets to shoot out Rajshahi for a meagre 140 but the hosts bounced back with Alamgir Kabir's four-wicket haul to reduce their opposition to 107-5 at close of play at the Shaheed Chandu Stadium.

Playing without captain Khaled Mashud who is serving a one-match

ban, Rajshahi opted to bat first but Dhaka's new-look attack tore through their batting.

The visitors did not miss the bowling of skipper Khaled Mahmud, who did not bowl due to a sore shoulder, as Dipoojal Roy and Ashraful reduced the Rajshahi to 89 for four.

After some brief resistance, pacer Niaz Morshed and left-arm spinner Arafat Sunny took the remaining six wickets between them.

A dramatic saw the home side lose the last five wickets for just ten runs. Only four batsmen reached the double-figure with stand-in captain Hasanuzzaman Roseltopsoring with 38.

Dhaka lost wickets at regular interval with Alamgir grabbing 4-33 in a fiery ten-over spell before Mahmud's quickfire 39 off 32 balls salvaged them from a precarious 40-4. Mahmud hit seven fours and one six before being caught behind off pacer Sumon Saha.

Opener Anwar Hossain, who scored a sedate 11 in over two hours facing 86 balls, was at the crease with Neeyamur Rashid on 19.

# Razzaq restores Pakistan

Pakistani all-rounder Abdul Razzaq warmed up for the upcoming Test series against India with an aggressive half-century in the tour opener here on Friday.

Razzaq hammered an 82-ball 63 with two sixes and 10 fours as Pakistan were all out for 273 in their first innings after resuming at 165-5 on the second day of a three-day match against a Board President's team.

Pakistan could not get much-needed bowling practice ahead of the first Test against India as they sent down just 22.2 overs before bad light stopped play.

The hosts reached 91-1 in reply at stumps, with Test-discard Mohammad Kaif batting on 42 and opener Dheeraj Jadhav on 30.

The opening match of a three-Test series begins at Mohali on March 8.

Earlier, Razzaq held the innings together with his impressive knock and helped Pakistan add 104 runs for the last four wickets after the tourists had been struggling at 169-6 in the morning session.

Razzaq applied himself well on a low, slow pitch, using his feet effectively against spinners to help his team reach a respectable total. He punished off-spinner Venugopala Rao, smashing the bowler for two sixes.

Pakistan lost overnight batsman Asim Kamal (43) early in the day, but Razzaq steadied the innings with a 59-run stand for the seventh wicket with Kamran Akmal (34).

Razzaq was the last man to be dismissed, caught at the mid-wicket boundary by Rao off left-arm spinner Neeraj Patel.

He was the lone Pakistani batsman to gain valuable practice as none of his teammates could score a half-century in the only warm-up game before the first Test.

Pakistan's bowlers struggled after getting an early breakthrough as Kaif and Jadhav batted confi-

dently during their 74-run stand for the unfinished second wicket.

Mohammad Sami, key Pakistani paceman in the absence of injured Shoaib Akhtar, conceded 28 runs in his six overs.

Pakistani leg-spinner Danish Kaneria, expected to play a major role in the Test series, could bowl just three overs before bad light stopped play in the afternoon session.

Manzarul Navedul Hasan was the lone wicket-taker, dismissing opener Satyajit Parab for 11.

Pakistan will also play six one-day internationals on their first tour of India in six years.

# Fighting BCB XI

## Manzarul, Kapali ensure a draw

The Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) Eleven finally showed its fighting qualities as the fifth wicket pair of Manzarul Islam Manzarul and Alok Kapali held up Central Zone to enforce an unlikely draw on the final day of their Duleep Trophy match at Kamail Singh Stadium here yesterday.

Set an improbable target of 436 runs, Manzarul, who was the pick of tourists' batsmen in the first innings and Kapali, produced 90 runs after the Bangladesh selection were reduced to 108-4. Although both batsmen departed without scoring deserved half-centuries, at least they ensured that the BCB XI reached 199-6 when play ended.

Left-arm spinner Manzarul fell one run short while his partner was dismissed for 45.

Manzarul's 65-ball knock contained nine fours and a six while Kapali, played more circumspect, as he faced 76 balls and struck only five boundaries.

The BCB XI, which lost its first match against Sourav Ganguly's East Zone by a huge innings and 149-run margin, came perilously close to disaster with Aftab Ahmed's dismissal but the fifth wicket pair guided their team to tea without further damage.

Both captains agreed for a draw after rain interrupted the game a couple of overs into the final session.

Earlier, Central Zone, resuming their second innings at 212-6, they could add just 12 runs.

Test discard Sanjay Bangar narrowly missed a century. He

added five runs to his overnight score of 91.

Bangar's chanceless innings came off 288 balls and contained 12 boundaries.

For the visitors, medium-pacer Aftab finished with a fantastic haul of seven for 39 in 24 overs, easily his career-best figures in a first-class match.

However, Bangladesh discard Al Shahariar completed a miserable 'pair' when paceman Harvinder Singh removed the opener for a duck.

Fresh from his success as a bowler, Aftab (26) also shone with the bat as he along with opener Nafees Iqbal (45) put on 62 runs for the second wicket.

Despite the face-saving draw Mohammad Ashraful's side finished their campaign without managing a single point. On the other hand,

# BD A lose 1st one-dayer

Bangladesh A stumbled to a five-wicket defeat against their southern African counterparts in the first one-day game at the Kwekwe Sports Club in Harare on Thursday.

An all-round display by Keith Dabengwa helped the home team, who suffered 3-0 Test whitewash, draw first blood in the five-match series.

Dabengwa played starring role as he hit an unbeaten half-century and grabbed five wickets.

National discarded Sanwar Hossain won the toss and decided to bat. But from a relatively good

position (181-5) to launch a final assault, the visitors failed to accelerate and were ultimately skittled out for 209 with 13 balls unused.

The second string national side made a shaky start when they lost both openers Raqibul Hasan (6) and Dhiman Gosh (18) with just 22 runs on the board. However Tushar Imran (50) and the A team skipper Sanwar (36) steadied the side with a useful stand.

Shamsur Rahman and wicketkeeper Mushfiqur Rahim, one of the stars of the Test series with a century and fifty, also added 39 and 23 respectively.

But 25-year-old slow left-arm spinner Dabengwa thwarted any Bangladesh hopes of amassing a big total as they lost their last five

wickets for 28 runs. He finished with five for 19 in 4.5 overs.

Although they too lost wickets at regular intervals, Zimbabwe A reached the target with six overs remaining.

Terrence Duffin (43) and Gregory Strydom (46) laid the foundation while an unbeaten 71-run sixth wicket stand between Dabengwa (50 not out) and Mluleki Nkala steered them to 212-5.

Fast bowler Shahadat Hossain Rajib was most successful Bangladesh A bowler with three for 38 in his share of ten overs while Wasel Uddin and Enamul Haque took one each.

The second match will be held today.

# Zim hit rock-bottom

Zimbabwe were humiliated when they were bowled out for a record low total and South Africa took a first innings lead before tea on the first day of the first Test at Newlands Friday.

South Africa were 91 for no wicket at tea in reply to Zimbabwe's 54 all out.

Zimbabwe, in their second series since effectively being suspended from Test cricket following a rebellion by 15 leading players last year, did nothing to sway the arguments of those who believe they do not deserve to be playing at the highest level of the game.

All-rounder Jacques Kallis took four for 13 and opening bowlers Shaun Pollock and Makhaya Ntini took three wickets apiece as Zimbabwe were dismissed 25 minutes after lunch.

Zimbabwe won the toss and decided to bat on a pitch which had good bounce and slightly more grass than usual.

They were undone primarily by an inability to play lifting deliveries. That it was essentially a good batting surface was shown by South African opening batsmen Graeme

Smith and AB de Villiers, who scored at better than five runs an over and took South Africa into the lead after 11.2 overs.

Zimbabwe's previous lowest total was 63 against the West Indies in Port of Spain in 1999/2000.
