Former India all-rounder Kapil Dev says spinner Anil Kumble and rival batsman Inzamamul Hag will be the key players in the Test series against Pakistan

He told BBC: "I think if we look at bowling, a lot depends on Anil Kumble. If he gets going, then he could change the match within two

"Similarly from Pakistan point of view, their skipper Inzamam holds the key

"He has a good record against India, and in the conditions here, he could perform well."

Kumble took 10 wickets in an innings at Delhi when Pakistan last toured in 1998-99 and has a total of 37 wickets in six Tests against India's arch-rivals

Pakistan captain Inzamam averages 34.66 against India, well below his overall career mark of

But the 35-year-old hit a century in Pakistan's last Test victory over their neighbours, in Lahore last

He first match of the three-Test series begins in Mohali on Tuesday, and Kapil Dev believes that match will be crucial in setting the tone.

"I think the first five days of the series -- the first Test is very important." said the 131-Test veteran.

"On paper, one may say the Indian side looks better, but remember in actual match play, one brilliant performance can change the match.

"Both teams want the first Test to pass, so that they can study the other side, but to make the series interesting, attacking is the best policy at the moment.

And Kapil cautioned against making India favourites simply because of their star-studded batting line-up.

He added: "We have many big names, but it is crucial that the names should match their performance -- this is our biggest strength and weakness too.

"Sometimes when many big names are there, one thinks the other might steady the innings, but it does not happen always.

West Indies cricket was plunged into further turmoil on Saturday when world record-breaking skipper Brian Lara and six other players were threatened with the axe from the squad.

The West Indies Cricket Board (WICB) took the dramatic option to warn Lara. Ramnaresh Sarwan. Chris Gavle. Fidel Edwards. Dwavne Bravo, Dwavne Smith and Ravi Rampaul that they would not be selected for the squad as the contracts row which has rumbled on since December finally exploded.

Neither of the players will feature in the series against South Africa and Pakistan which get underway in the Caribbean later in March unless they give assurances over their

The decision, announced by WICB president Teddy Griffith, was taken because the seven players have personal sponsorship deals with telecommunications giants Cable and Wireless which could conflict with the board's main supporter, Digicel.

The deal with Digicel is understood to be worth in the region of 20 million dollars over five years and the bombshell comes just a year before the West Indies are due to host the 2007 World Cup. At the same time, the West

Indies board is battling against crippling losses as well as the fall out from criticism of the alleged behaviour of some of the team on the recent tour of Australia

The world of sport is inextricably linked with commercial interests, said Griffith.

"It is fair to say that without significant support from sponsors, the

West Indies, or any cricketing nation for that matter will find it almost impossible to fulfil its obligations or to field a competitive team

"The Digicel sponsorship agreement has given the Board the opportunity to substantially fund the development of cricket generally, which is its mandate. "For the first time sponsorship of

this nature goes beyond the international team and channels right through to the level of youth cricket, assisting the needed preparation of a future generation of cricketers.

"The Board is committed to develop West Indies cricket for the benefit of the fans and all players throughout the region and accepts its responsibility to take West Indies Cricket to the next level while preserving the integrity of the relationships necessary to secure a longterm prosperous future for all, at all levels of the game.

Pakistani fans arrive in India

Hundreds of Pakistani cricket fans arrived in India on Sunday ahead of the opening Test on Pakistan's first tour of their fierce rivals for six years.

Nearly 750 men, women and children entered the northern Indian state of Punjab through the Wagah border crossing and were showed with flowers as they danced with Indian fans to drums and Punjabi folk songs.

"We do not have any relations in India. But we wanted to come here as I and my family were keen to see India, its cultural heritage, the farms and everything else," said Muhammed Asif, who came with his wife and son. Several hundred more fans are

expected to arrive in India Monday, including film and theatre stars politicians, bureaucrats and others. according to those who arrived Sunday. A special train service, the

Samihota Express from Pakistan. was cancelled on Saturday because of technical reasons, Indian officials

Many of the Pakistanis said they were visiting family members estranged by the 1947 partition of the two countries on gaining indenendence from Britain

Cricket ties between the South Asian giants, disrupted since 2000 due to political tensions, were revived in March last year when India toured Pakistan for their first Test series since 1989.

Ex-Eng captain Sheppard dead

Former England cricket captain David Sheppard has died following a long battle with cancer.

The former Bishop of Liverpool and Labour peer died peacefully on Saturday, the eve of his 76th birthday Sheppard was one of England's

finest batsmen of the 1950s. Making his debut at Lord's in an innings defeat by West Indies in August 1950, he went on to make 21 further Test appearances, scoring 1.172 runs at an average of 37.80.

A former captain of Cambridge University, Sheppard twice captained his country, and in 1956 became the first ordained minister to play international cricket for England, scoring a hundred against Australia in that game which was dominated by Jim Laker's 19 wickets.

DANISH KANERIA Dravid remains the key to India's

Coach stands by Zim

Coach Phil Simmons rejected calls for Zimbabwe to be stripped of their Test status despite the team suffering the humiliation of an innings defeat inside two days in the first Test against South Africa at Newlands Saturday.

Speaking after South Africa won by an innings and 21 runs with more than an hour to spare on the second day, Simmons said he disagreed with former Zimbabwe captain and coach Dave Houghton, who called for Zimbabwe to be dropped from Test cricket.

Citing catastrophic collapses in recent years by several teams, including Pakistan, the West Indies and England, Simmons said: "There was no talk about taking them out of Test cricket. It happens, teams get bowled out. If I didn't believe this team had the potential to improve I wouldn't be in this job."

Zimbabwe captain Tatenda Taibu also resisted Houghton's comments.

"Everyone's entitled to their own opinion," said the under-fire skipper. Simmons, a former West Indies all-rounder, said Zimbabwe's defeat could be blamed on "one bad day" when both the batsmen and bowlers took a pounding from the South Africans Friday.

South Africa declared at their overnight total of 340 for three to set up the two-day win.

"It was a matter of pride. If you are humiliated like Friday you have to bounce back. The players showed character today," said Simmons

Taibu said Zimbabwe had shown improved form in making 265 in their second innings after being bowled out for 54 in the first innings. He singled out Dion Ebrahim, who made a defiant 72, Hamilton Masakadza, who scored 46 and shared a 98-run third-wicket stand with Ebrahim, and Andy Blignaut who hammered 61 off 58 balls before being last man out.

Blignaut and former skipper Heath Streak played in the match for the first time since being sacked, along with another 13 players after a

South African captain Graeme Smith said his players had produced a top effort to win so efficiently.

He admitted that hammering Zimbabwe did not give him as much satisfaction as beating a top nation but said South Africa took each Test match seriously.

"We have to," he said. "Cricket doesn't allow you not to

take anyone seriously. You still have to concentrate and produce good cricket, even if it (the opposition) isn't of the level of Australia or England. Smith said the team had set a

goal of winning as quickly as possible in order to give the players rest ahead of a tour of the West Indies which starts at the end of March. "Two days was good going," he

said. Smith ducked questions about Zimbabwe's Test status.

"That's not my call, it's the International Cricket Council's call,

"You give them respect by treating them the same as any other Test nation, but it's the ICC's call whether it's fair or not.

The ICC is conducting a review of the structure of Test cricket and this will be discussed at its next board meeting, in Delhi, on March 17-18.

It was the 18th occasion in Test cricket, and the third in modern times, that a match was won and lost in two days.

Only twice since 1945-46 has a match ended in two days -- when England beat the West Indies at Leeds in 2000 and when Australia defeated Pakistan in Sharjah in

It looked as though the match would go into a third day before Masakadza cut left-arm spinner Nicky Boje to Herschelle Gibbs at backward point after making 46 off 78 balls with seven fours. The rest of the Zimbabwe bats-

men were unable to follow the example set by Ebrahim and Masakadza, although Blignaut slammed six sixes, all off Boje, in a late flurry.

South African opening bowler Shaun Pollock bowled only five overs because of a painful left ankle and may miss the second and final Test which starts at Centurion Friday.
