First pvt land phones start in Ctg Mar 20

Bay Phones, a joint venture between US firm Westec.com Inc and local Westec Limited, will launch the country's first private fixed phone on March 20.

"We have successfully completed the test run and are now ready to offer phones to subscribers in the country's southeast zone." MA Hashem, chairman and chief executive officer of the Westec Limited told The Daily Star in an interview.

He said Post and Telecommunication Minister Aminul Haq will inaugurate the network at a function in Dhaka, which will be also attended by State minister for Finance Shah Md Abul Hussain and US Ambassador Harry K Thomas as special guest and guest of honour.

"We will hold a separate launching ceremony in Chittagong on March 22," Hashem added.

Bay Phones has recently signed an interconnection agreement with the state-owned Bangladesh Telegraph and Telephone Board (BTTB). "We are in talks with cell phone operators to have interconnectivity with them," he

"To have interconnection with private mobile operators may take a month or two," he added

The company will invest approximately Tk 100 crore in 2005 to roll out its network

'The current network capacity will be one lakh telephones, mostly based on a wireless local loop (WI L)." said the Bay Phones chief, adding that the company has plans to introduce some wired phones as

WLL is a wireless technology that enables phones to operate within a short range.

Subscription fees for WLL con-

nection will be Tk 15.000 and Tk 9,500 for a wired one, he added.

"We shall announce the tariff plan during our launching," he

Bay Phones would be the first operator to launch fixed phones under the new licensing criteria of the Bangladesh Telecommunications Regulatory Commission

The telecom regulator BTRC has segmented the country into five central zone, southeast zone, northeast zone, southwest zone and northwest zone -- and awarded licenses for four zones except the central zone.

The southeast zone consists of the greater Chittagong division, including Chittagong, Cox's Bazar, Rangamati, Hathazari, Fotikchori Potia, Feni, Noakhali, Laxmipur, Chadpur, Comilla and Brahm-

Rice kicks off

"This is going to be an opportunity to exchange views with important countries, important players in the region that is itself in the midst of tremendous change." Rice told reporters on board the aircraft which brought her to New Delhi.

"For instance with India, we clearly have a broader and deeper relationship than we ever had." she added

Lensmen protest Rab assault on colleague

Photojournalists yesterday kept their cameras shut for 15 minutes demanding punishment of the Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) men responsible for assaulting SM Gorky, chief photojournalist of the daily Jugantor.

Meanwhile, police yesterday misbehaved with two journalists when they sought to enter parliament to cover the House proceedings.

Some 60 photojournalists working in different newspapers took part in the programme to protest Monday's assault on Gorky. Taken up by Bangladesh Photojournalists Association, the programme started at 12:30pm on the National Press Club premises.

On Monday, a team of Rab-3 led by Major Wasir, attacked Gorky while he was taking photographs of Rab men assaulting three youths near Baitul Mukarram area. The\ kicked and punched him before taking him to Rab office at Tikatuli.

BDNEWS adds: A three-member

committee was formed to enquire into the matter, said Lt Col Chowdhury Fazlul Bari, Additional DG of Rab.

"We have taken up the matter and if anyone found guilty, action will be taken against them," he added.

In parliament yesterday two policemen misbehaved with Harun Jamil, senior reporter of The Daily Ingilab, and Nazrul Islam Mithu. senior reporter of The New Age. The two were harassed even after disclosing their identities and showing their parliamentary passes.

Bangladesh Parliament Journalists' Association (BPJA) yesterday condemned the incident. BPJA President Shahjahan Sardar and its General Secretary Ashish Shoikat in a statement described the incident as unfortunate. They called for the Speaker's intervention to take immediate actions against the policemen responsible for the misconduct

Threats against press freedom 'spiked' in Asia

Threats against press freedom in Asia "spiked" last vear, as authoritarian regimes in North Korea and Myanmar kept a tight grip on the media while the Philippines remained the deadliest place in the continent for journalists, a USbased media rights group said

Despite having "one of the freest presses in Asia," the Philippines was the second deadliest country in the world after war-wracked Iraq, where 23 journalists were killed, according the Committee to Protect Journalists' annual survey on worldwide press freedom.

At least eight Philippine journalists, mainly rural radio broadcasters, "were gunned down in retaliation for their work," according to CPJ's report titled "Attacks on the





Dozens of people arrested this month in a crackdown on illegal immigrants in Malaysia are to be iailed and caned, local media reported vesterday. Two magistrates' courts in the

capital Monday sentenced 57 Indonesian illegal immigrants to be iailed for up to three months and 16 of them to be caned once, the Star In northern Perak state, 14

Indonesians, two Indians, a Bangladeshi, a Thai and a Chinese national were sentenced to one stroke of the cane and jail terms

ranging from three to six months. the paper said. In Klang, in central Selangor

state, 10 illegal immigrants -- eight Indonesians and two Indian nationals -- were sentenced to up to 12 months' imprisonment. One of the Indonesians was

ordered to receive two strokes of the cane while the others were to get one stroke each, the Star said. Malaysia launched a nationwide

blitz on March 1 to weed out hundreds of thousands of illegal immigrants after the expiry of a fourmonth amnesty which had been extended twice at Jakarta's request. SEE PAGE 15 COL 8
