8 BNP men made the attack

Political dominance motive, mastermind unknown

A high-powered government probe has identified eight BNP men as responsible for the January 27 grenade attack on Awami League meeting at Baidder Bazar in Habiganj that killed five people including former finance minister Shah AMS Kibria and injured 70 others.

In their analysis, the investigators said the attack was aimed at

establishing dominance in the local politics of Habiganj as well as at securing the local constituency. But, they failed to identify the master-

Of the eight activists of ruling BNP and one of its front organisations, six are now behind bars and the rest two on the run.

Tax dodgers' list may be published

The government is contemplating publishing a list of tax defaulters in the same way the loan defaulters are exposed, Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman yesterday said.

The minister revealed the plan while replying to questions from reporters at a discussion of the Economic Reporters Forum (ERF) in

Askéd if the government would face any political problem in pub-lishing such a list, Saifur ruled out such possibility. "Rather some of you may face problems," he told the

National Board of Revenue (NBR) sources said the NBR will soon submit a proposal to the government to enact a law in the next budget session under which a list of tax defaulters can be published.

"We've not changed our attitude. But the nature of Bangladesh's aid relationship that existed in 1972 or 1980 no longer exists. 
Saifur referred to a recent aid meeting in Paris where Bangladesh presented a position paper on aid, and said the donors accepted the paper in which he hammered away at the idea of 'performance-based aid,

rather than condition-based one.

A performance-based aid has specific target achievement indicators, while a condition-based aid carries with it donors' diktats on how the government should utilise it, he explained.

"Donors sometimes try to impose their own policies and programmes," the finance minister noted. "But dictating conditions for aid is not acceptable." According to him, "If performance-based aid is given, we expect to get more loans."

In support of the prime minister's parliament speech, Saifur said, "In the name of handing out bilateral aid, it's inappropriate to interfere in the political process of a country."


