Pakistan to upgrade nuke capability

Tests long-range missile

President Pervez Musharraf vowed yesterday to further upgrade Pakistan's nuclear capability but with a "strict adherence" to nonproliferation as he watched the testfiring of a long-range missile which can carry a nuclear warhead.

"The nation's nuclear capability, which enjoyed the broadest national consensus, was developed for Pakistan's own security and will continue to receive the highest national priority," a military statement quoted Musharraf as saying.

The military ruler allayed apprehensions about the future of the programme after the fresh disclosures about the activities of disgraced nuclear scientist Abdul Qadeer Khan.

"The capability was here to stay, will continue to go from strength to strength and no harm will ever be

allowed to come to it," he said.

Pakistan admitted last week that Khan had supplied Iran with centrifuges, used to enrich uranium for atomic warheads. It said the government was not involved but has refused to give him up for questioning by other countries.

Khan, who is considered a national hero in Pakistan and is the father of its nuclear bomb, confessed in February 2004 to leaking secrets to Iran, North Korea and Libya after a government probe into nuclear proliferation.

He was pardoned by Musharraf but has been living under virtual house arrest in Islamabad.

"The president reiterated Pakistan's policy of consolidating and strengthening its minimum deterrence needs, as well as strict adherence to non-proliferation, the statement said.

Saturday's firing of the Shaheen 2

(Hatf VI) surface-to-surface missile was successful, the statement said.

"This missile system, which incorporates advanced two-stage solid motor technology, can carry all types of conventional and nuclear warheads to a range of 2,000 kilometres (1,243 miles)," it said.

Fresh row at ACC over transfer order

A new conflict surfaced between the chairman and a commissioner of the Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) over the recent 'controversial' transfer order of eight officials of now-defunct Bureau of Anti-Corruption (Bac).

ACC Commissioner Maniruzzaman Miah questioned the transfer order because it was issued by Lt Col Abdul Hannan Mridha, a former Bac official. Mridha himself holds no position in the ACC and presently is a reserved employee of the govern-

When Miah met ACC Chairman Justice Sultan Hossain Khan on Thursday to talk about the issue, Sultan assured him of changing the transfer order. But yesterday, the chairman told Miah that the order will not be changed.

"I don't think there is any legal basis of this transfer order," Miah told The Daily Star.

On the other hand, the chairman told The Daily Star, "There has been no irregularity.

The transfer order was issued on Thursday under which seven former Bac officials of Dhaka have been posted to different places outside Dhaka and one Bac official from outside was deputed to the ACC's Dhaka office.

All the former Bac officials are now the government's reserved employees but the ACC last month unilaterally decided to attach them temporarily. This decision was conveyed to the Cabinet Division, but the government has not yet given its consent to it.

Following last month's decision, Miah named a dozen officials for attaching them with him and sought the chairman's approval. But soon after his requisition, Mridha issued the transfer order of eight officials, seven of them were sought by Miah.

"It seems that this transfer order was issued to make me functionless," Miah quipped. "I suspect that at a later stage, accusations may be raised against me for not having performed important functions."

"I have explained to the chair man the legal implication of this order. Because after the abolishment of the bureau, its staff do not belong to that organisation -- nor are they our officers and employees as was made very clear by a decision of the Cabinet Division." Besides, Miah argued, even if

such a decision is taken -- that should be done at a meeting of the commission. "I have talked to the chairman. Unfortunately he is not SEE PAGE 15 COL 1

Father, son die in freak accident

Mother in critical state, daughter injured

Two members of a family were killed and two others injured when a tree fell on the CNG-run three-wheeler they were in at Tejgaon yesterday

The dead were identified as Anwarul Kabir, 48, a civil engineer, and his 11-year-old son Sadmarn Kabir. The injured were Kabir's wife Jinat Roksana, an assistant director (training) of Education Bhaban, and her seven-year-old daughter Raisa Kabir.

The four were returning to their house at Baily Road government quarters when a trunk of a tree fell on a running bus right in front of the three-wheeler near Tejgaon Police

Post at about 6:45pm, said a witness. After hitting the back of the bus, the trunk rolled onto the three-

wheeler, said Billal, assistant of a human-haulier stationed nearby when the accident occurred.

Locals rushed to the place at once and dragged the bodies out of the vehicle. The four were taken to Al-Razi Hospital, but finding the condition of the couple and their son critical, doctors referred them to Dhaka Medical College and Hospital (DMCH).

Doctors at the DMCH declared Anwar and Sadmam dead on arrival. Jinat was said to be still in a critical condition at ward No. 30 of DMCH as of 9:00pm.

Raisa, undergoing treatment at Al-Razi hospital, needed a couple of stitches in the head, said a doctor at the private hospital.

The driver of the three-wheeler also suffered minor injuries.
