Before Bangabandhu's return to Dhaka on 10 January 1972, only India and Bhutan had recognised Bangladesh in December 1971. On his return, country after country accorded recognition to Dhaka. Only those countries that suffered strategic defeat along with Pakistan in the Liberation War remained out of the race. Erstwhile foes are now friends of Bangladesh, one even turned to be 'trusted.' It only proves that in interstate relations, there is no

permanent friend or foe, the only permanent thing is the national interest. East Pakistan was used as a strategic point by Pakistan and China in their bid to contain India with whom both had a number of issues to settle. China challenged material, political and diplomatic support of India behind Bangladesh Liberation by extending similar support to Pakistan to ensure its national interest. The United States wanted to befriend China against

rival Moscow and exploited its strategic alliance with Pakistan to open a window to China. Pakistan became a conduit between Washington and

Beijing. Henry Kissinger made his secret journey from Islamabad to Beijing in 1971. National interests of China and the United States converged to keep Pakistan united over the selfdetermination of the East Pakistanis in 1971. 

Slice wise power foolish

This is a sequel to Farid Bakht's article (DS: April 02) and a front page report (DS: April 04) on the vagaries of investment in power proposals. One wonders if these reports at all even prick the thick hide of officialdom? The need for power generation for progress and development is endlessly spelt out by our powers to be. Unfortunately, it is all talk and no action by the government, except cancelling old proposals and going for new ones. In contrast, none but the deprived users talk about loadshedding. Rarely, when the powers to be talk about it; it is to restrain us from using electricity with
