Musharraf in India for peace, prayer, cricket

Pakistani President Pervez Musharraf yesterday arrived in India on a landmark visit, offering prayers for peace and progress between the nuclear rivals as New Delhi announced a set of seven confidence-building measures.

Musharraf, accompanied by his wife Sheba and the foreign, commerce and information ministers, flew to Jaipur, capital of Rajasthan state, from Islamabad. From there he went to the holy city of Ajmer and offered prayers at the shrine of Sufi saint Khwaja Moinuddin Chisti.

The military strongman offered a 'chadar' or a piece of cloth to lay over the tomb of the Sufi saint. The shrine authorities also presented him with

flowers and two 'chadars' to be handed over to two major Sufi shrines in Pakistan

After the visit to Aimer Sharif, Musharraf, flanked by his wife and Foreign Minister Khurshid Mehmood Kasuri and Information Minister Sheikh Rashid, told reporters he had prayed for peace between India and Pakistan and resolution of differences between them.

He also said he had prayed for progress in the two neighbouring countries, adding that progress can be achieved only if there is peace between them. "I hope my prayers are accepted," Musharraf said. His visit to the shrine assumed significance as he could not make it during his last visit to India four years ago following the breakdown of his sum-

mit meeting with then Indian premier

Atal Bihari Vajpayee in Agra.

The Pakistani president yesterday pointed out himself before his departure for India that the atmosphere between India and Pakistan is much different from the Agra summit as "it is conducive and friendly."

India, for its part, has unveiled a set of new confidence-building measures, which proposes more bus links between the two countries setting up points across the divided Kashmir where relatives on both sides of the Line of Control can meet and promotion of cross-border trade in the region.

Other confidence-building steps include promotion of cross-border cultural interaction, joint promotion of tourism in Jammu and

ACC Act challenged

HC asks govt to explain some provisions

The High Court in a rule yesterday ordered Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) as well as the government to explain why the ACC Act sections that deal with the selection and appointment of ACC commissioners and the appointment of the ACC secretary should not be declared illegal.

The High Court bench also asked them to explain on which legal grounds Justice Sultan Hossain Khan is holding the position of ACC chairman.

Besides, the bench asked the government and the ACC to explain why an ACC notice served on a school headmaster in Chapainawabganj should not be declared illegal.

The court issued the rule following a writ petition filed last week by Supreme Court lawyer Advocate Saleem Ullah and Chapainawabganj-based school headmaster Toriqul Islam. In the petition they challenged sections 7,8, and 16 of the Anti-Corruption Commission Act (ACCA), 2004, appointment of Sultan as ACC chairman, and the ACC notice issued on the school-

ACC chairman, two commissioners, cabinet secretary and home secretary are among the eight respondents of the rule, which asks them to reply within eight weeks.

The petitioners said that section 7 of the ACCA violates the constitution as it provides for two judgesone from the High Court division and the other from the Appellate division of the Supreme Court -- to be included in a five-member selection committee to choose ACC commissioners. The petitioners argued that if a judge spends even a minute in any other job he is in breach of the constitution [articles 94 (2), (3) and (4)] as well as the oath he has taken as a judge.

The petitioners said that section 8 requires the commissioners to have 20 years of experience in certain disciplines, but it does not specify educational qualifications or age restrictions -- making it [section

20th extension gives govt six more months

Responding to the government's 20th plea for giving it four months 'extra time' to separate the judiciary from the executive, the Supreme Court (SC) yesterday gave it six

The government filed a petition in August last year after it failed to comply with the SC directive to separate the judiciary by July 19, 2004, which was the 19th extended

The latest deadline expires on October 17 this year.

The full bench of the SC Appellate Division headed by Chief Justice Syed JR Mudassir Husain granted the government this additional time to implement the 12-point SC direc-

tive for separation of the judiciary. The SC issued the directive to the separation of the judiciary.

In late last year, the SC asked the government to submit the draft rules and other documents related to the separation When some of these were sub-

mitted, the court brought contempt charges against nine government officials, saying that they distorted the SC directives in the draft rules. The SC also reprimanded the government for killing time.

Yesterday Attorney General Hassan Ariff informed the court that on February 16, the law ministry had forwarded all related rules and

documents to the president for his Ariff, however, said he is not aware of the developments after that.



outlined the new strategies mainly focussing on collecting information on the emerging and re-emerging life-threatening diseases and approaches to tackle them, sources

Newly emerging diseases like dengue and nipah first broke out in 1999. The country presently lacks proper facilities to detect such viral attacks, but the new move would enable the existing public health laboratories to gather firsthand information on them.

The first-ever such drive aims at identifying the country's disease patterns, location, mode of transmission and population at risk, and to combat the diseases using modern technology with technical help from World Health Organisation (WHO) and the International Centre for Diarrhoeal Diseases and Research, Bangladesh (ICDDR.B), a senior official at the health ministry
