Chaktai Khal becomes big issue in city corporation polls

Promises to end sorrow of port city

The Chaktai Khal (canal) issue dominates the Chittagong City Corporation (CCC) election campaign. It is one of the major issues after the 'Third Karnaphuli Bridge' that comes up once again to the fore in the campaign to persuade the people to vote for the two major mayoral contestants in May 9 polls.

The Chaktai Khal is known as the sorrow of the port city.

Both Awami League (AL) backed Nagorik Committee candidate ABM Mohiuddin Chowdhury and the ruling Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP) four-party alliance candidate Mir Mohammad Nasiruddin have already made a number of promises to relieve the city dwellers of grievances for the 5.6-kilometere canal if they are elected in the upcoming election.

Mohiuddin included the 'Chaktai Khal' issue in his 40-point election manifesto for the development of Chittagong to win the voters' supports.

He said "A sluice gate will be set up on the entry point of the canal to make it fit for plying boats again as well as bringing back the natural flow."

His main rival Mir Nasiruddin, who was mayor for over two years, alleged that Mohiuddin Chowdhury in his 10-year tenure as mayor has cheated the city

dwellers in the name of developing Chaktai Khal.

And Mir Nasir promises to bring back the natural flow of the canal and take steps for its development if he is voted.

No matter, many promises have already been made and many more will be made before May 9 election, the reality is that the fate of Chaktai Khal will not be changed much. And the sufferings of the people who live on the banks of the canal which flows zigzag through the prime locations of the city, will not end.


Illegal encroachment, erection of illegal structures and slums and random dumping of household wastes have caused an obstruction against the natural flow and release of water of the canal.

The CCC, very often, takes action and evicts encroachers but they come back in full force.

For the last few weeks, the grabbers have constructed many structures, mini slums and shops at the Chawk Bazar, Bakalia, Chaktai, Bohaddarhat and Khatunganj points of the canal but no one is there to take any action against them.

"As the city is caught up in an election fever, who will dare to annoy the valuable voters," said Ashraful Islam, a banker from Bakalia.

The rainy season comes as a curse for around five lakh city dwellers living on the banks of Chaktai. Even a moderate shower during the monsoon causes inunda-

tion in the adjoining areas. The people are worried again as another rainy season is about to come.

The canal has lost its original depth due to constant siltation and rampant dumping of garbage and waste over the years. It has now a depth of only five feet from its original depth of 20 to 25 feet 20 years ago. Huge money has been spent in the name of its excavation.

The areas along the canal where people suffer most are Chawk Bazar, Bakalia, Katalganj, Kapashgola, Bohaddarhat, Chandgaon, Patharghata, Chaktai, Khatunganj, Asadganj, Firingee Bazar, Sholoshahar and

The canal has a catchment of 6.5sqm. The catchments absorb 8.5 crore cft water in monsoon while its water releasing capacity is only 1.4 crore cft per hour. The remaining 7.1 crore cft of water mainly cause deluges, CCC sources said.

The Ministry of LGRD approved a Tk15 crore project for the CCC to excavate and concrete the canal bed two years ago to cope with the inundation in the future. But, the city corporation has so far received a very scanty amount and could do little with the task, sources said.

"Fund shortage has constantly kept us helpless to start development and remedial works," one official seeking anonymity said.

Jobbarer Boli Khela ends, reliving rich heritage

Marmasing, Didar retain championship title

Jobbarer Boli Khela, the centuryold traditional wrestling competition of the port city, was held with its special characteristics and charms here on Monday.

Forty wrestlers took part in the competition. The defending joint-champions Marmasing Tripura, 26, of Khagrachhari and Didarul Alam Didar, 26, of Cox's Bazar retained the championship title jointly for the second time.

It once again swayed the Chittagong people with merriment side by side with reminding

them of a rich cultural heritage.

A prominent local merchant Abdul Jabber Sawdagor of Andorkilla Badorpati Road of the city introduced the wrestling with a view to inspiring and organising the local youths for the anti-British movement in 1909 (Bengali year 1316).

Since then the descendants of Abdul Jabber with the support of local people and the administration organise the competition titled "Abdul Jabber Memorial Wrestling Competition" at Laldighi Moidan on Baishakh 12

(the first month of Bengali year).

here from different areas, particularly from the far- flung coastal areas and offshore islands in Chittagong and adjoining districts on this day. The event helps them as well as the spectators, particularly the elderly ones, remember a history of unique tradition and 'nostalgia.'

Marmasing, a cop of Razarbag police line in the capital, clinched the champion's title for the third consecutive time since his very first appearance at the competition in 2003.

On the other hand, Didarul, a wrestler from Omkhali under Ramu upazila in Cox's bazar, became the champion in the competition for the fourth time. Didarul, a small businessman, also won the championship title

(jointly with the then defending champion Siddique Boli of Ukhiya) in 2001. He also retained the title in 2002 and lost it to Marmasing in 2003 before regaining it for two consecutive years in 2004 and 2005.

Apart from the two champions, 38 other wrestlers fought in 19 bouts.

Of them, the bout between two elderly wrestlers - Ayub Ali, 55, of Rangunia Rajanagar and Mafiz, 52, of Hathazari, was the most exciting one. Ayub Ali, won

the bout.

The participants like elderly Ayub Ali, Mafiz or young Abdul Gafur talked about the people's love and compassion for the competition as well as

Abdul Gafur, a youth from Gandamara of coastal Banshkhali upazila, was seen to bring something out of his mouth after winning the bout.

Gafur said that it was a "Tabij" (paper having Quranic verses inscribed on it). His mother gave the Tabij asking him to hold it between the jaws during the bout.

A two-day 'Baishakhi Mela' was also held as usual centering on the wrestling competition.

The fair continued for more than three days as the vendors from different parts of the region opened their makeshift shops since Saturday, one day before the formal opening of the fair, to wind up after the official closure of the event.
